Stockholm, Aug. 15, O.S. The Weather continues still very unsettled, and few Days pass without more or less Rain: Yet People are now every where reaping their Corn, and most Accounts agree, that what they have hitherto been able to get in, proves tolerably good; so that it is now hoped the Crop will be generally much better than was ex-

pected.

Turin, Sept. 12, N. S. The 6th Instant in the Asternoon his Sardinian Majesty arrived here from Rivoli, as did the Prince of Piedmont the same Evening. The 9th Instant (being a Day of Thanksgiving observed annually, to commemorate the rai-fing of the Siege of Turin) his Majesty, with the Prince, went in Procession with the usual Solemnity, and in the Evening went to the Veneria. The 19th Instant all his Majesty's Horse encamped about five Miles from this Place, chiefly for the Divertion of the Prince and Princess of Piedmont. They consist of two Regiments of Horse and three of Dragoons,

and do not exceed 2500 Men.

Paris, Sept. 19. The following Extract of the Advices received by the Court relating to the Plague, has been communicated to the foreign Ministers.

The Duke de Roquelaure, M. de Bernage, and M. de Rothe, in their Letters of the 7th of September, advise, that a Man died almost suddenly of the Plague the Ist of this Month, in a House near the Town of Monde where he was a Servant; all the Houshold-Goods and Cloaths in that House were burnt: That House was separated by a Garden from his Master's; all the Persons in the Master's House with whom that Servant had conversed, were put under Quarantain. There was but one sick in the Instrument at Mende, and that Person was on the Recovery. According to the Letters of the commanding Officers in the several Places of the Gevandan, all the rest of that Country was in a good State of Health; as were al-so those Parts of the Dioceses of Viviers, Uzes, and Alais inclosed within the Lines.

M. de Miron Brigadier of Foot at Mar-feilles, in his of the 5th of September Writes, that from the 17th of August that City had enjoyed per-fest Health: The Hospital for Persons lick of the Plague was cleared, none dying or falling fick of contagious Diftempers. The first Quarantain in the neighbouring Country ended the 5th, without any Suspicion of Insection. M. de Langeron was giving Suspicion of Insection. M. de Langeron was giving Orders for performing the general Disinsection, pursuant to the Directions he had received: If no contagious Sickness happen during that Performance, this Kingdom and Foreigners may trade to Marseilles with all Sasety. M. le Bret in his of the 6th of September writes, that nine Persons who remained in the Hospital called la Charité at Marseilles, were growing quite well, and ready to go out of it; there remained likewise sour Men and one Woman under Quarantain: In general, the State of Health there was never better. was never better.

The Comtat and the Principality of Orange. M. de Vedrille writes the Accounts from Avignon agreed, that for feveral Days there had none fallen ill or had died of the Contagion: They were very carefully disinfecting the Houses where the Distemper had been, and perfuming the others; the like was done in the Houses in the Country, though for a long Time no Accident had happened. It was likewise advised, that there was no insectious Distemper at Vedenne, and that by the Care of M. Toncaud Monteux it would soon be as clear as all the rest of the Country, which is in perfect Health. M. de Vedrille has sent a Letter from a Physician at Orange, advising, that that Town would speedily be put into a Condition not to sear any Relapse, by the Care of M. de Charses.
