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Whitehall, September 14.

AN humble Address of the Mayor, Burgesſes, Freemen, and other Inhabitants of the Borough of Lyme-Regis in the County of Dorſet, has been preſented to His Majesty by John Burridge, Jun. Eſq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viſcount Townſhend one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Which Address His Majesty was pleaſed to receive very graciouſly.

Stockholm, Aug. 15, O. S. The Weather continues ſtill very unſettled, and few Days paſs without more or leſs Rain: Yet People are now every where reaping their Corn, and moſt Accounts agree, that what they have hitherto been able to get in, proves tolerably good; ſo that it is now hoped the Crop will be generally much better than was expected.

Turin, Sept. 12, N. S. The 6th Inſtant in the Afternoon his Sardinian Majesty arrived here from Rivoli, as did the Prince of Piedmont the ſame Evening. The 9th Inſtant (being a Day of Thankſgiving obſerved annually, to commemorate the raiſing of the Siege of Turin) his Majesty, with the Prince, went in Proceſſion with the uſual Solemnity, and in the Evening went to the Veneria. The 10th Inſtant all his Majesty's Horſe encamped about five Miles from this Place, chiefly for the Diverſion of the Prince and Princeſs of Piedmont. They conſiſt of two Regiments of Horſe and three of Dragoons, and do not exceed 2500 Men.

Paris, Sept. 19. The following Extract of the Advices received by the Court relating to the Plague, has been communicated to the foreign Miniſters.

The Duke de Roquelaure, M. de Bernage, and M. de Rothe, in their Letters of the 7th of September, adviſe, that a Man died almoſt ſuddenly of the Plague the 1ſt of this Month, in a Houſe near the Town of Mende where he was a Servant; all the Houſhold-Goods and Cloaths in that Houſe were burnt: That Houſe was ſeparated by a Garden from his Maſter's; all the Perſons in the Maſter's Houſe with whom that Servant had converſed, were put under Quarantain. There was but one ſick in the Infirmary at Mende, and that Perſon was on the Recovery. According to the Letters of the commanding Officers in the ſeveral Places of the Gevandan, all the reſt of that Country was in a good State of Health; as were alſo thoſe Parts of the Dioceſes of Viviers, Uzès, and Alais incloſed within the Lines.

Provence. M. de Miron Brigadier of Foot at Marſeilles, in his of the 5th of September writes, that from the 17th of Auguſt that City had enjoyed perfect Health: The Hoſpital for Perſons ſick of the Plague was cleared, none dying or falling ſick of contagious Diſtempers. The firſt Quarantain in the neighbouring Country ended the 5th, without any Suſpicion of Infection. M. de Langeron was giving Orders for performing the general Diſinfection, purſuant to the Directions he had received: If no contagious Sickneſs happen during that Performance, this Kingdom and Foreigners may trade to Marſeilles with all Safety. M. le Bret in his of the 6th of September writes, that nine Perſons who remained in the Hoſpital called la Charité at Marſeilles, were growing quite well, and ready to go out of it; there remained likewiſe four Men and one Woman under Quarantain: In general, the State of Health there was never better.

The Comtat and the Principality of Orange. M. de Vedrille writes the 4th of September, that all Accounts from Avignon agreed, that for ſeveral Days there had none fallen ill or had died of the Con-

gion: They were very carefully diſinfecting the Houſes where the Diſtemper had been, and perfuming the others; the like was done in the Houſes in the Country, though for a long Time no Accident had happened: It was likewiſe adviſed, that there was no infectious Diſtemper at Vedenne, and that by the Care of M. Toncaud Monteux it would ſoon be as clear as all the reſt of the Country, which is in perfect Health. M. de Vedrille has ſent a Letter from a Phyſician at Orange, adviſing, that that Town would ſpeedily be put into a Condition not to fear any Relapſe, by the Care of M. de Charſes.

This is to ſignify in His Majesty's Name, that if any Perſon or Perſons ſhall hereafter apprehend any one or more Highwaymen, who from and after the Date hereof ſhall have robbed any of the Mails, or ſhall have been concerned as Accomplices in the robbing of any of them, ſuch Perſon or Perſons ſhall have a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender, who ſhall be convicted thereof, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Poſt-Office, over and above the Reward directed by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Perſon hereafter concerned in robbing any of the Mails ſhall make a Diſcovery of the ſame, ſo that his Accomplices or Accomplices ſhall be convicted thereof, ſuch Perſon ſhall have His Majesty's moſt gracious Pardon, and alſo receive the Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender ſo convicted, to be paid as aforeſaid.

Whereas in Order to prevent any Frauds or Abuſes that may happen by the Concealment of the Death of any of the Out-Penſioners of Chelſea Hoſpital, or otherwiſe, His Majesty hath thought fit to direct, that all the Out-Penſioners (as well Lettermen as others) belonging to the ſaid Hoſpital, reſiding in London, and Weſtmiſter, or in the ſeveral Counties of Berks, Buckingham, Bedford, Cambridge, Eſſex, Southampton, Hereford, Huntington, Kent, Leiceſter, Middleſex, Northampton, Norfolk, Oxford, Surry, Suffex, Suffolk, Wilts, and Warwick, or any of them, do appear before a Board of Commiſſioners appointed for this Purpoſe, who will meet in the Great Room at the Horſe-Guards, on Tueſday the 18th of this Inſtant September, and will ſit there every Tueſday, Thuſday, and Saturday, from and after the 18th Day of September, to the 6th Day of October next, at Ten of the Clock in the Forenoon on each of the ſaid Days. All the Out-Penſioners reſiding in any Part of Wales, or in the ſeveral Counties of Cornwall, Devon, Dorſet, Glouceſter, Hereford, Monmouth, Salop, Somerſet, and Worceſter, or any of them, before the Honourable Brigadier General Stanwix at Briſtol, between the 18th Day of September Inſtant, and the 4th Day of October following. All the Out-Penſioners reſiding in the ſeveral Counties of Cheſter, Cumberland, Derby, Durham, Lancaſter, Lincoln, Nottingham, Northumberland, Rutland, Staffor'd, York, and Weſtmoreland, or any of them, before the Right Honourable George Lord Carpenter at Rippon, between the ſame 18th Day of September, and 4th Day of October. All the Out-Penſioners reſiding in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, before the Honourable Major General Sabine at Edinburgh, between the 24th Day of September, and the 10th of October. All the Out-Penſioners reſiding in the Kingdom of Ireland, before the Right Honourable Richard Lord Viſcount Shannon, in Dublin, between the 24th Day of September, and the 20th of October. And ſuch of the ſaid Out-Penſioners as ſhall not appear and ſhow themſelves before ſome or one of the Perſons, at ſome or one of the Places, or on one of the Days before-mentioned, will be taken to be Dead, or otherwiſe provided for by the Government, and will be ſtruck off the Books of the Out-Penſion of the ſaid Hoſpital.
