Gibraltar, August 10, O. S.

Admiral Grave with the Squadron of Dutch Men of War he commands arrived here from the Mediterranean the 3d Instant: He left the Spanish Admiral with nine Men of War at Alicant ten Days ago, ready to sail for the Coast of Algiers; where he is to remain till the End of September, to prevent the Algerines sending Ships to join the Turks; and is then to return to Cadiz. All our Accounts from Barbary agree, that that Country is in perfect Health, and has not had any contagious Distemper.

Cadiz, Sept. 1, N. S. The Commerce between North and West France and Spain, for Linnen, is opened under certain Restrictions. One Man of War of the Dutch Squadron is arrived here, with some Sallee Slaves on board, which are to be sold here on Shore: The Admiral is cruising off the Capes. The Spanish Squadron is retired from Algiers to Alicant, having suffered much Damage in their Masts by bad Weather.

Genoa, Sept. 8, N. S. On Friday the 4th Instant His Britannick Majesty's Ship Dorsetley Galley commanded by Captain George Purvis, set Sail for Gibraltar: The same Day arrived here the Cornwallis Packet-Boat in five Days from Port-Mahon.

Stockholm, Aug. 22. The Letters of the 17th Instant which came Yesterday from Malmoe give an Account of the King and Queen of Sweden's being there, and that their Majesties had been received both at that Place and Christianstadt, with very great Magnificence: The Burghers appeared all in Arms, and Triumphal Arches were erected at the Gates of the Town, and at several other Places where their Majesties passed.

Stockholm Aug. 29. By the Accounts which came Yesterday from Helsingborg, dated the

24th Instant, we learn the Swedish Court was then at that Place, but designed to set out for Engelholm the next Day; and on the last of this Month the King and Queen are expected at Gottenbourg, tho' his Majesty having been there last Winter, did not intend to go thither now again; but as the Review of some of his Troops is appointed at Warberg, which lies a few Leagues from Gottenbourg, the Governour and Magistrates of that City sent an humble Invitation to their Majesties, who thereupon resolved to honour them with their Royal Presence. During the Court's Stay at Malmoe, the King of Denmark sent the Great Marshal of his Court, with a splendid Retinue, to compliment their Swedish Majesties on their Arrival in that Part of their Dominions; and when the Court came to Helsingborg, Lieutenant General Ranck was sent over to Copenhagen to return the Compliments of the King and Queen of Sweden to their Danish Majesties. The Weather is at present, and has for the last ten Days been mostly fair and pretty warm, so that it is reckoned the Rye and Wheat is now tolerably well got in every where; which has made the Prices of most Grain fall to almost what they were when the Prospect was fairest for a good Crop.
