AN humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Capital Burgeffes, Clergy, Gentlemen, and other the Inhabitants of the Town and Borough of Stamford, in the County of Lincoln, has been presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Exeter.

Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Madrid, Sept. 14. The Marquess de Grimaldo being recovered from an Indisposition, brought upon him by Grief for the Loss of his Son who died some Months ago, set out To-Day for Balsain where the Court resides at present, to resume the usual Exercise of his Office of Secretary of State. On the 12th Instant died the Count de Fuen Saldana, Son in Law to the Count d'Aguilar, in the 28th Year of his Age, leaving no Issue behind him. The Duke de Varaguas is preparing to set out for Cambray, on his private Affairs. The Duke of Liria is preparing to go to France, to see the most Christian King's Coronation. They have been under an Alarm in Catalonia, upon a Rumour that the Ottoman Fleet was come into those Seas; whereupon all the Troops in that Principality put themselves in Motion, to guard those Parts of that Coast where Descents may most easily be made.

Stockholm, Sept. 5, O. S. The King and Queen of Sweden arrived at Gottenbourg two or three Days sooner last Week than they were expected, yet their Reception by the Inhabitants was very magnificent. Their Majesties resolved to stay there till the 3d Instant, when the whole Court was to set out for Hioentorp; and when the King has finished the appointed Review there, the Queen is to come to the Palace of Stromholm, and stay there till the King has also reviewed the Regiment of Life-Guards, which is to rendezvous at Upsal the 22d of this Month; and four or five Days after the King and Queen will return hither.

On Sunday last a Muscovite Brigantine arrived here, with about 100 Swedish Prisoners from Peterbourg, whence they came the 14th of last Month. Last Week arrived here also a Ship from Revel, by which we have an Account, that the Muscovites have begun to build some Fortifications at a Place about five or six Leagues from Revel, where there is an Harbour said to be capable of receiving a great Number of Ships of the largest Burthen; and it is reported the Czar has ordered it to be called New Malta.

Turin, Sept. 19, N. S. Sunday the 13th Instant, his Majesty with the Prince of Piedmont arrived here from Rivoli. Last Tuesday Evening his Majesty with the Prince went to the Camp, and the next Day the Prince was declared Colonel of that Regiment of Dragoons distinguished by the Name of Piemontese, at the Head of which his Royal Highness saluted his Majesty, who also rode up to him and returned the Salute; after which the whole Body of the Troops were exercised in his Majesty's Presence, and then his Majesty with the Prince returned to his Head Quarters at Carpené. Madame Royale was taken ill on Wednesday last, but is since recovered of her Indisposition. The Chevalier Vaganego, who transacted Business here for the Republick of Genoa, tho' without a Character, died here the 16th Instant.

Whitehall, Sept. 21. Letters from Lisbon of the 25th of August, N. S. give an Account that the King of Portugal has made a new Alvara or Regulation for preventing the Running of Goods. It bears Date the 9th of the same Month, was published on the 20th, and is as follows.

UPON Information that the Penalties imposed by the Foral Law of the Custom-House, and by the Extraordinary Law of the 6th of September 1705, are not sufficient to prevent the Detriment which my Treasury suffers, by means of Goods run from on board of Packet-Boats, and other Ships, which ought to have been dispatched at the Custom-House, and to have paid their respective Duties: And finding it absolutely necessary to establish new Cautions and Remedies, in order to avoid so prejudicial

judicial a Practice: It is our Pleasure, that no Person, of whatsoever Quality, Estate or Condition, shall be suffered to go on board of Packet-Boats, or any other Merchant Ships, belonging either to Natives or Foreigners, or on board of the Convoys of the Fleets from the Brazils, whilst any of the said Ships are unloading, without special Licence from the Inspector of the Custom-House given in Writing, and specifying that the Person so licensed, shall return directly from the Ship which he is permitted to go to, to the Custom House, there to be examined, if he have brought away with him any Goods, Gold, Silver or Money. And this Form shall be observed with Reference to the Ship from India, by the Procurator thereof: This Prohibition shall not only extend to all Ships when come to an Anchor in this Harbour, but likewise to Ships at Anchor or under Sail, from the Bar of Cascas upwards. And before Ships are come to an Anchor in this Port, it shall be allowable only for the Pilots of the Bar to go on board them, the Vessels in which they go to the Side of the Ship immediately removing from thence, as soon as the Pilot is put on board. Furthermore, Upon Information, that in order to facilitate the Running of Goods, there has been invented a Sort of Boats much lighter than ordinary Frigates, which it is convenient should be prohibited: It is our Pleasure that the said Sort be extinguished, and no longer used in the Ports of this Kingdom; and whatsoever small Vessels of that Nature are in this Harbour, shall be pulled to Pieces within eight Days after the Publication of this Law. And all Transgressors hereof, shall incur the Penalty of Ten Years Banishment to Maranham, besides the Loss of whatsoever Goods shall be run, and of the one half of all their Goods and Chattels. The Persons also who shall be found selling Goods, that have not been dispatched, according to the Foral Law, shall incur the same Penalties. And of the Transgressors of this Law, as also of the Goods run contrary to it, Information may be given either in publick or in secret: And one Third of the Goods seized, as likewise of the Goods belonging to the Criminal, shall be given to the Informer. It is our Pleasure also, that in cases of this Nature, no Bail of any kind be allowed, and that no Privileges be admitted, even of those which are incorporated in our Laws; for as to this Matter, it is our Pleasure that they be all derogated and of no Effect, in the same manner as if they had been here, each of them, specially mentioned. For so it is necessary they should be, for the extinguishing such Practices, and punishing the Delinquents. Furthermore, the Penalties above-mentioned shall be inflicted on all Persons, who shall put any Goods on board, or take any Goods from on board any Ship or Vessel, belonging to Natives or Strangers, after they are dispatched outwards, whether it be done within or without the Bar. And the Captain, Master, or other Officer on board any Ship, who shall receive such Goods, or give Aid or Favour to the receiving the same, shall incur the same Penalties; the same is ordained in case they shall suffer any Goods to be taken out of their Ships. And the Inspectors of the Custom-House and India House are hereby strictly charged not to grant Licences for going on board any Ships, without manifest Cause and Necessity. The Council of Treasury are required to take special Notice hereof, and to see it executed, in the Part which belongs to their Jurisdiction. *West-Lisbon, Aug. 9, 1722.*

The preceding *Alvara* is published, to the Intent all British Merchants trading to Portugal may take Notice of the Rules prescribed therein, and conform themselves thereto, to prevent any Inconveniences or Losses which they may otherwise sustain.

This is to signify in His Majesty's Name, that if any Person or Persons shall hereafter apprehend any one or

more Highwaymen, who from and after the Date hereof shall have robbed any of the Mails, or shall have been concerned as Accomplices in the robbing of any of them, such Person or Persons shall have a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender, who shall be convicted thereof, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Post-Office, over and above the Reward directed by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person hereafter concerned in robbing any of the Mails shall make a Discovery of the same, so that his Accomplice or Accomplices shall be convicted thereof, such Person shall have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon, and also receive the Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender so convicted, to be paid as aforesaid.
