AN humble Address of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers in Dublin and the South of Ireland, in behalf of themselves and those of their Perswasion, having been transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Grafton Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, has by him been presented to His Majesty.

An humble Address of the Bailiff and Burghers of the Borough of Cokermonth, has been presented to His Majesty by Sir Wilfrid Lawson, Barr. one of their Representatives in Parliament, Groom of the Bed-Chamber to His Majesty, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Constantinople, Aug. 22. The Polish Envoy has had a private Audience of the Vizier, wherein he declared that the Occasion of his coming was only to renew the Assurances of his Master's Design to live in Friendship with the Port, and to demand that the Fortifications made at Choczyn contrary to the Treaty of Carlowitz be demolished; to which the Vizier answered, that it was equally the Intention of the Port to remain in Friendship with the Crown of Poland, but as to the Fortifications of Choczyn they were not made with any View towards Poland, but only to have a Garrison on that Frontier to prevent the Incurfions of the Muscovites, and that those Fortifications were so necessary to the Port, that they would never be demolished unless the Port were compelled by Force of Arms. Upon this the Envoy forbore pressing that Matter any further. He is now solliciting an Audience of Leave, in order to return Home. We have no certain Advices yet of what passes in Persia, nor do we expect any that may be relied on till the Port hears from the Minister they have sent thither; neither does the freshest Intelligence from Tauris say any thing of the Czar's Arrival in those Parts, but that the Georgians had with an Army of 40000 Men driven the Persian Rebels out of Schamachia. The Port has lately given Orders for repairing their Fleet, and building three new Ships.

Stockholm, Sept. 12, O. S. On the 3d Instant the King and Queen of Sweden left Gottenbourg, and on the 7th were to have come to their Palace of Hioentorp, situate 24 Leagues on this Side of Gottenbourg; but as their Majesties were on the Road thither, they had Notice brought them that that Palace was burnt down to the Ground: So that they were obliged to go to a private Gentleman's House in that Neighbourhood. This Accident is supposed to have come by the Carelessness of the Persons concerned in the airing of the Rooms, and making other Preparations for their Majesties Reception. The Building being all of Timber, it was soon consumed: It was reckoned one of the pleasantest Seats in the King-

dom; but being so remote from Stockholm, the Furniture was not very valuable. Great Preparations are making at Upsal to receive the King there on the 23d, where his Majesty proposes to continue two or three Days, and review the Troops which are drawing together to that Place. The Queen, it is said, will stay during that Time at the Palace of Stromsholm; and both their Majesties are expected at Stockholm towards the End of this Month.

Lisbon, Sept. 30, N. S. On the 17th Instant the Marquess das Minas, General of the Portuguese Horse, was basely murdered by one D. Joanno de la Cueva e Mendonça, who is of Spanish Extraction. The King of Portugal, who is much concerned at this unhappy Accident, has offered 10000 Crowns to whosoever shall apprehend the Murderer, or give Information where he is retired; and has signified his Desire to all the Foreign Ministers, that they would not grant him the Protection of their Houses. But it is feared that all the Precautions taken to prevent his getting off have been to no Effect, for some Letters from Spain bring an Account of his being arrived there. The Marquess was Father to the Conde de Prado, who made his Escape about a Year ago from the Castle of Cascais, where he had been confined by the King of Portugal for not paying due Honours to his Patriarch. The Conde went to England, and from thence to Paris, where he is now; but 'tis hoped he will receive his Pardon on this melancholly Occasion, earnest Sollicitations being made in his Behalf to his Portuguese Majesty. On the 27th Instant, three Malteze Men of War entred this River, the largest of which is of 70 Guns, and bears an Admiral's Flag. They are supposed to come with a Compliment from the Great Master of Malta, to the King of Portugal, whose Subject he formerly was; and at the same Time they are to beg his Majesty's Assistance, in case the Turks should renew their Attempts against that Island. His Britannick Majesty's Ships Winchester, Lime, and Dursley Galley, are at present in this Harbour, the former of which sails for the Downs in a few Days.

Paris, Oct. 12, N. S. Yesterday the Count de Morville set out for Cambray, and this Day the Lord Whitworth left this Place to go thither likewise.

St. James's, Oct. 5. This Evening His Majesty returned hither from Kensington, in perfect Health (God be praised.)

Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, came likewise to Town this Day from Richmond.
