THE following Address has been presented to His Majesty by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Durham, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty, The humble Address of the Bishop, Dean and Chapter, and Clergy of the Diocese of Durham.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects the Bishop, Dean and Chapter, and Clergy of the Diocese of Durham, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty upon the timely Discovery of some late Wicked and Treasonable Designs concerted in Favour of the Pretender.

We think our selves more particularly affected by the Consequences of such Attempts, and are therefore bound in Interest, as well as Duty to your Majesty, to abhor them; we are persuaded that the Security of our Established Church, under God, depends upon the Safety of your Person, the Preservation of your Government, and the Continuance of the Succession in your illustrious Line, and that all Changes in our Establishment must be prejudicial to our Religion, Laws, and Liberties.

It hath been, ever since the Reformation, the distinguishing Mark of the true Members of our Communion, to profess and teach Loyalty to their Sovereign; in pursuance of which we shall make it our Endeavour to possess our several Flocks with the same Sentiments, and to discourage all groundless Discontents against your Government.

That your Majesty's steady Cares and faithful Endeavours for the Protestant Interest Abroad, and our Establishment at Home, may meet with all just Returns of Affection and Respect from your loving Subjects, and that you may long Reign over a happy and free People, are our Wilhes and Prayers.

An humble Address of the Lieutenant-Governour, the Judge-Delegate, the Jurats, the Clergy, the King's Procurator, and the Constables, being the Estates of His Majesty's Island of Guernsey, Part of His ancient Dutchy of Normandy, assembled the 19th of September 1722, has been presented to His Majesty by Lieutenant-General Harvey, Governour of that Island, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, Grand Jury, and other Freeholders assembled at the Quarter-Sessions of the Peace held for the County of Essex the 2d Day of October, in the Ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, has been presented to His Majesty by John Comyns, Esq; Serjeant at Law, Chairman at the said Quarter-Sessions, and Robert Honeywood, Esq; one of the Represent-

tatives in Parliament for the said County, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in the Absence of the Earl of Thomond Lord Lieutenant of the said County.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Common-Council, Freemen, and Inhabitants of the City of Rochester, has been presented to His Majesty by Sir John Jennings one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Cadiz, Sept. 29, N. S. His Britannick Majesty's Ship Falmouth is arrived here from Gibraltar, on her Voyage Home.

Lisbon, Oct. 4, N. S. The three Maltese Men of War which came some Days ago into this River, are, one of 64 Guns, another of 58, and the third of 50; they are compleatly manned, with French and Italians; their Commodore the Bailly of Langon a French Knight of Malta, with 50 other Knights of that Order, have been admitted to an Audience of the King of Portugal, and have received from his Majesty several Marks of Favour and Distinction.

Stockholm, Sept. 19. On the 13th Instant the King and Queen of Sweden arrived at Orebroc, and on the 15th their Majesties came to the Palace of Kongfore. The King is since gone towards Upsal, in order to review his Life-Guards and some other Regiments; and in the mean time the Queen has chosen to reside at the Palace of Grypsholm, about seven Swedish Miles from this Place. The Weather has of late been fair, and warmer than it usually is at this Season, so that the Corn is generally got in in a pretty good Condition, inso-much that instead of a Dearth which was once greatly apprehended, there is now rather Plenty of Grain in most Provinces of this Kingdom.

Paris, Oct. 21, N. S. On the 17th Instant the most Christian King and his Court set out from hence for Rheims: In the Coach with him were the Duke of Orleans, the Duke of Chartres, the Duke of Bourbon, the Count of Clermont, the Prince of Conty, and the Duke of Charost. The Infanta Queen is to reside at Versailles till his Majesty's Return. Madame the Dutchess Dowager of Orleans, who is at Rheims, is fallen sick. The Duke of Orleans is to entertain the King and all his Retinue at Villers Cotteretz, both going to and coming from Rheims: Above 4000 Beds are sent to that House and those in the Neighbourhood, for lodging the Persons who accompany and attend his Majesty. The principal Entertainment there is to be in the King's Return. The Duke of Bourbon designs to give the like Entertainment to the King and his Attendants at Chantilly, and his Preparations for it are very great. Some Information has been

been given here of fraudulent Practices in those who pay the Troops, which has occasioned the sending of Orders into all the Provinces where there are Treasurers for the Extraordinaries of War, to have their Chests sealed up, and their Accompts immediately examined. The following Extract of the Advice relating to the Plague received by the Court the 12th of October, has been communicated to the foreign Ministers.

M. le Bret in his Letter of the 4th of October, writes, that Marseilles remained in a good State of Health, and that the new Disinfection lately begun there was continued. M. de Rothe in his of the 5th of October advises, that for 42 Days no Accident had happened at Mende. On the 28th of September, the cleansing and perfuming all the Houses of the Town and Suburbs of Mende was begun, after which the Inhabitants were to perform a Quarantain. All continued to go well in the rest of the Gevaudan and throughout the Countrey with which Communication had been prohibited. The Town of Alais was publicly declared to be in a perfect State of Health on the 4th of October, and in Consequence the Churches were opened. M. de Bernage writes the 5th of October, that the Disinfection of Mende was almost finished; the Walls of the Houses were washed with Water in which Lime had been slaked, and the Timber and Wood-Work with Vinegar. The Physicians of Mende had given their Opinion, that the Inhabitants needed not undergo a rigorous Quarantain, but that one of 20 Days might be sufficient.

Whitehall, April 16, 1722.
