We do therefore most thankfully adore the Good-ness of God, who has enabled your Majesty to make fuch Dicoveries of this barbarous Undertaking, as will, we kope, not only prevent the Execution of it, but lay the Foundation of our future Tranquillity, and more firmly establish your Throne, which we pray may be very long filled by your Majesty, and tor ever hereafter by one of your House.

The Principal Officers and Commiffioners of His Majefty's Navy observing in the Comptrolling the Payments of Skips now paying upon the Lists of Arrears, that fe-veral Letters of Aitorney and other Powers of old Dates, are produced for the receiving Seamens Wages; and it being probable that many of the Parties who executed the fame are dead, as well as fome to whom the faid Letters of Attorney, &c. were made; to prevent there-Letters of Attorney, Grc. were made; to prevent there-fore for the future, as much as pollivle, any Abules His Majelly or His Subjects may be expoled to thereby, or by falle Powers, feveral of which have been detected: These are to give Notice, that no Wages for any Man's Service in His Majelly's Ships will be paid, where the Perfon does not appear himself, (or the Witneffes to his Letter of Attorney) by any Power but fuch as shall be witniffed by two or more Commiftion or Warrant Officers of His Majelly's Ships in which they ferve, or by two or more of the Officers of His Majelly's Tards; or by the Mayor, or two or more of the Magistrates of fome Corporation; or by the Minister and Church-Wardens of the Parish (where the other cannot be had;) or here in London by a Publich Notary, or fome of the Officers or Clerks of the Navy. And all Attornes are to give good and fufficient Prof, that the Perfons are living for whom they receive the Money by Virtue of fuch Powers, whom they icceive the Moncy by Virtue of fuch Powers, or produce new Letters of Attorney from fuch living Perfons, attefted in the Mannir aforefuid.
