N humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, and other the Principal Inhabitants of the Borough of Sc. Ives in the County of Cornwals, has been presented to His Majessy by Sir John Hobart, Bart. and Henry Knollys, Esq; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Bolton. Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously, and they had the Honour to kis His Majesty's Hand,

Constantinople, Oct. 1. The last Advices from Persia say, that the Chief Rebel Mirveiz Prince of Candahar was still encamped with his Army near the Suburbs of Ispahan, and that the Sophy in order to quiet those Troubles, had substituted one of his Sons in his Place, with full Authority to act as King pro Tempore, which it is faid is no unufual thing in that Kingdom; and this Sbn had so managed Matters, that by the Pro mises he made Mirveiz of a large annual Pen-sion he had prevailed with him to agree to a Sufpension of Arms; so that People here begin to be of Opinion this young Prince will put an End to the Rebellion, and bring about by Negotiation what could not be effected by Force of Arms. In the mean time the Porte has sent Orders to the Aga who was going with Letters to the So-phy and the Chief of the Rebels, to return hither without executing his Commission, upon a Suspicion the Porte has conceived, that the Court of Persia has a private Understanding with the Czar, whose Expedition upon the Caspian Sea has drawn off all their Attention from Persia, and makes them every Day more uneasy; the Porte having received of late frequent Couriers from the Tartar Han to inform them of the Czar's great Deligns in those Parts. Those Advices contain in Substance, that the Czar had landed his Troops between Schamachia and Derbent, of which Places he had made himself Master, and had begun to build a Fortress there to secure that Conquest. That Mir-Mahomet Prince of the Conquest. That Mir-Mahomet Prince of the Province of Daghestan, of the Mussulman Religion and under the Protection of the Porte, had drawn some Militia together, and was incamped upon the Mountains, but that no Astion had yet passed between him and the Russians: But what chiefly alarms this Court, is the Advice they received from the Tartar Han two Days ago, that the Russians not contenting themselves with possessing the Borders of the Caspian Sea, are advanced into the Province of Georgia dependent on Persia, and have taken Tessis the Capital City of it; that it was apprehended the Czar had a further View of taking the Provinces of Mingrelia, Imerete, and Guriel, which all border upon the Black Sea, have good Ports, and are inhabited by Christians of the Greek Church, though tributary to the Porte, who it is feared will receive the Czar with open Arms. Upon these Proceedings of the Czar, the Porte has taken the Resolution to send a Capigh Bashi with Letters to him, accompanied by a Muscovite Druggerman, who is first to go to the Tartar Han to be informed by him of the State of Assairs, and then to proceed to execute his Commission to the Czar. He is ordered to assure the Tartar Han, that the Porte will espouse his Cause and Interest with Vigour. This Capighi-Bashi is to set out in a few Days. The Turkish Fleet did some time since return to Scio, and will come into this Port with the first fair Wind: The Commander is blamed for having demanded the Liberty of the Turkish Slaves of the Great Master of Malta in such a harsh Letter, without being able to put his Threats in Execution. The Polish Envoy departed from hence a few Days ago.
