TH E two following Addresses having been transmitted by the Lords Justices of Ireland to his Grace the Duke of Grafton Lord Lieutenant of that Kingdom, has by him been presented to His Majesty, who was pleased to receive them very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty, The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin, at a General Quarterly Assembly held at the Thofell of the said City.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, in the most humble manner, beg Leave, in this great Conjunction, to declare to your Majesty our utmost Detestation of that horrid Conspiracy which has been formed, and is still carrying on against your most sacred Person and Government, in Favour of a Popish Pretender.

When we reflect on the inestimable Happiness we enjoy under your auspicious Reign, and consider that the Preservation of our Civil Rights and Liberties, and the Security of the Protestant Religion, do wholly, under God, depend on the Safety of your Majesty's Person, and the Succession in your Royal House, it raises in us the highest Resentment and Indignation against those ungrateful desperate Traitors, who either through pernicious Principles, or private Discontents and Disappointments, would overturn our most excellent Constitution in Church and State, involve their Country in Blood and Confusion, and, in open Violation of all Obligations Divine and Humane, subject these Nations to the Revenge and Tyranny of a Popish Pretender, over which your Majesty is Rightful and Lawful Sovereign.

We of this City hold ourselves obliged, both in Duty and Gratitude, vigorously to oppose these Enemies of our present most happy Establishment, and beg Leave, in the most solemn manner, on this important Occasion, to renew our Declarations of an inviolable Zeal and Affection for your Royal Person and Family; and with the utmost Sincerity to assure your Majesty, that we are determined to hazard our Lives and Fortunes in Defence of your most sacred Person and Government, and supporting the Succession in your Royal House, against the Pretender, and all other your Majesty's Enemies.

And as the divine Providence has hitherto preserved your Majesty from secret Conspiracies and open Rebellion, and crowned your Councils and Arms with Success, we doubt not but by the Blessing of Almighty God upon your Majesty's Princely Care and Wisdom, the Vigilance of your faithful Ministry,

and upon the ready Assistance of your loyal Subjects, that these Traiterous Designs against your Majesty will be rendered vain and ineffectual, and the malicious Efforts and wicked Machinations of your Enemies will be turned to their own Confusion.

That your Majesty's just and wise Administration may ever meet with suitable Returns of Duty and Loyalty from all your People, that you may Triumph over all your Enemies at Home and Abroad, and after a long and glorious Reign, that you may transmit the Government of these Kingdoms to a lasting Succession of Princes in your own Royal House, are the constant Prayers of us your Majesty's most dutiful, loyal, and faithful Subjects.

In Testimony whereof we have caused the Common Seal of the said City to be hereto affixed this Nineteenth Day of October, Anno Dom. one Thousand seven Hundred and twenty two.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty, The humble Address of the Provost, Fellows, and Scholars of the College of the Holy and Undivided Trinity, near Dublin.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects the Provost, Fellows, and Scholars of the College of the Holy and Undivided Trinity, near Dublin, beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that it is with the deepest Concern we understand, that a dangerous Conspiracy hath been formed against your Person and Government in favour of a Popish Pretender.

And as this wicked Design hath been imparted to your Majesty by the Powers in Alliance with you, we cannot but lament upon this Occasion, that any Number of your British Subjects should want that Affection to your Person and Government which is found even in the Hearts of Foreigners.

We hoped that the signal Infatuation and evil Success of the former Devices and Attempts of your Enemies, added to the most sacred Engagements of Duty to your Majesty, would have so well secured your Government, that Rebellion should no more attempt to disturb your Reign; but are now forced to reflect with Horror upon the abandoned Condition of those Men, whom no Obligations can bind, nor Experience admonish.

Your Majesty's most gracious Resolution of steadily adhering to the Constitution in Church and State, and continuing to make the Laws the Rule and Measure of all your Actions, cannot but be infinitely acceptable to all your Subjects, and is the noblest Foundation of that just Confidence wherewith you repose your self upon the Affections of your People, and the Protection of the Divine Providence, which has so often and so visibly interposed in your Favour.

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
