**W**E humbly beg Leave, with others of your Majesty's loyal Subjects, to congratulate you upon the happy Discovery your Majesty has made of a horrid Conspiracy against your Person and Government, which makes us with Joy to reflect upon the many Blessings of your auspicious Reign, so signally owned of God, who has hitherto so visibly displayed his Almighty Power and Goodness, in defeating the wicked Designs of your Enemies, and remarkably prospering your wise Administration in Spite of all Opposition, and given just Occasion to all Men to observe, That the Lord saveth his Anointed.

Next to our glorious Reformation, we esteem the late happy Revolution, under the Conduct of King William of ever Glorious Memory, our most remarkable Deliverance from Popery and Slavery, and your Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, our chief Security, under God, of our having these dearest Blessings of Religion and Liberty preserved to this and succeeding Generations.

As your Majesty reigns by the justest Title, the only lawful Sovereign of these your Dominions; so your Government, ever since your happy Accession, has been so remarkably distinguished by its Wisdom and Justice, by its Steadiness and Clemency, that it is surprizing your Majesty should have one Enemy remaining amongst all your Subjects.

But since our Times are so unhappy, as to produce a Race of degenerate Men, who forgetting all Regard to True Religion, and Duty to their Country, have entered into a Traiterous Conspiracy against your Majesty's Royal Person and Government, in Favour of a Popish Pretender, bred up in all the Maxims of Arbitrary Government, and a Vassal to the Roman Antichrist, we cannot but declare our utmost Detestation of their horrid Design: A Design so execrable in its Nature, and so dreadful

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ful in its Consequences to us and all the Protestant Churches, that we tremble at the Thoughts of it.

'Tis not to be wondered at, that Professed Papists devoted to the See of Rome, and Members of a Church long inured to Rebellion and Massacres, should be engaged in such a Hellish Enterprize; but that Protestants should concur with them, is so strange, that it would be altogether incredible, if Experience did not shew it to be true.

As for us, Great Sir, we account it the Honour of the Church of Scotland, that we have never been so much as suspected, either by Friends or Enemies, of Disloyalty to your Majesty, nor Disaffection to the Protestant Succession in your Royal Family; and that we have so often had your Majesty's gracious Approbation of our Zeal for the Interest of your Government, From this Principle we have always judged a loyal Behaviour towards your Majesty, a necessary Qualification of a Minister of this Church; and have not failed to cast out from amongst us, the few who at any time have acted otherwise.

As no Danger, nor Hatred from your Majesty's Enemies, has hitherto deterred us from our Duty in our Stations to your Majesty; so we should be utterly unworthy of the sacred Character we bear, as well as false to the many great Obligations we are under to so gracious a Sovereign, if we did not at all Times, and more especially now when your Enemies are so insolent, exert ourselves with the utmost Zeal, in asserting your Majesty's just Title, and inculcating upon the People under our Care, the most firm and unshaken Loyalty to the best of Kings.

And whereas your Enemies, amongst other vile Artifices, make use of impudent Lies and Falshoods to disparage your Person and Government, and to alienate the Hearts of some of your unwary Subjects from the Duty they owe unto your Majesty, we shall always make it our Business to oppose such Practices by undeceiving them,

and encouraging their Loyalty, both by our Doctrine and Example.

That God may eminently bless and prosper your Majesty, and long preserve you, to be the Support of the Reformed Interest in Europe, and the Guardian of your People's Religion and Liberty; that he may continue to discover and defeat all the evil Designs of your Majesty's Enemies, and give you the Hearts of all your Subjects; that your Royal Family, in all the Branches of it, may more and more flourish; that their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, and their Royal Issue, may be long preserved and signally blessed; that after your Majesty has long served God, and promoted the Good of Mankind on Earth, you may be crowned with a glorious Immortality in Heaven, is and shall be the Prayer of,

The humble Address of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers, of the three Denominations, in and about the Cities of London and Westminster.

May it please your Majesty,  
WE have so often return'd Thanks to Almighty God, for your Majesty's peaceable Settlement upon the

the British Throne, and so heartily prayed for the Continuance of your happy Government, that we must of all People be the most inconsistent with ourselves, if we should not be very sensibly affected with the Kindness of divine Providence, in discovering the vile Designs of those, who in Defiance of all even the most sacred Engagements, have been, and are still fighting against their own Happiness, and striving to make themselves and the whole Nation miserable.

It grieves us that our Native Country should produce such Monsters of Ingratitude and Perfidiousness. We are at a loss to express how much we abhor their Practices: And as for the Principles that lead into them, we cannot but account them as foolish as they are impious.

To imagine that a Protestant Kingdom should flourish under the Influence of Popish Counsels, or our Religious and Civil Liberties be best secured, by sacrificing them to the avowed Enemies of both, are Absurdities too gross to be digested, by any that know the Value of either.

We assure your Majesty, that we as Ministers of the Gospel of Peace, are fully determined, always to recommend Loyalty and Fidelity to your Majesty and your Government. *Stockholm, Oct. 24, O. S.* Since the King of Sweden's Return hither, his Majesty has been present in the Senate almost every Day. The Russian Minister has renewed his Application to his Majesty and the Senate, that they would consent to give the Title of Emperour to the Czar his Master: He has not yet had a positive Answer, and it is thought will not have it till the States of the Kingdom meet. Baron Sparre sets out from hence the next Week for Cassel, where he will stay till he has the King of Sweden's Orders to go to Paris, which he will have as soon as the Notification of the King of France's Coronation comes hither. Baron Sparre is to proceed from the Court of France to that of Great Britain.

*Cadix, Nov. 10, N. S.* The eight Spanish Ships of War lately returned hither from the Streights, are disarming in order to be laid up. His Britannick Majesty's Ship Panther, Captain Atkins Commander, is arrived from Newfoundland, as is also the Drake Sloop from England, Captain Lingen Commander.

*Paris, Nov. 23, N. S.* The Day for the Departure of Mademoiselle de Beaujolois for Spain is not yet fixed; but the Duke Regent presses it may be the End of this Week or Beginning of the next. The Ambassadour of the Order of Malta has certain Advices from Constantinople, that the Naval Armament of the Turks is designed for the Siege of Malta; and that this Resolution was taken in the Divan, where the Musli's Party carried it against the Admiral's. The French Knights of that Order have received Summons to be in a Readiness, and are preparing accordingly for their Journey to Italy, thence to proceed to Malta on the next Summons from the Great Master: His most Christian Majesty has been pleased to contribute a good Sum towards their Expences on this Occasion.
