**A**N humble Address of the Mayor Capital Burgeses and Assistants of Tiverton in the County of Devon, has been presented to His Majesty by Thomas Bere, and Arthur Arscott, Esqs; their Representatives in Parliament, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

*Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.*

*Vienna, Nov. 28.* By Letters from Constantinople of the 15th of October this Court has Advice, that from all the Intelligence the Porte had received it appeared the Czar had been invited to come into Georgia by the Prince of Teflis, and by another Prince called Erghill, both Tributaries to the Persians; which Princes observing the Disorder of the Persian Empire, and being Christians of the Greek Church, pressed the Czar to lay hold of that Opportunity to free them from Persian Servitude, and take them under his Protection and Government. Accordingly the Czar having concerted the Enterprize with them came thither, under Pretence of revenging the Affront received at Schamachia, with an Army of 50000 Men, one Part of which went by Water along the Caspian Sea, and the other to the People's great Surprize passed a Desert of 12 Days March, where neither Provisions nor Water were to be found, every Soldier carrying his own Provision of Victuals and Drink for so many Days. This Desert begins at Terki, the last Frontier-Town of the Province of Astracan belonging to the Muscovites, reaches to Teflis on one Side, and on the others borders upon the Country of several Tartars, particularly those of Komak, who are dependant on the Persians, but who either by Inclination or by Force have submitted to the Czar, and have yielded up to him their two maritime Towns called Tarku and Enghi. The Czar having landed his Troops that came by Sea near Derbent, and marched another Body of them through the said Desert, being joyned by the two Georgian Princes at Teflis, and having in his Way made himself Master of the said two maritime Places belonging to the Tartars of Komak, he advanced with his Army towards Derbent, which it was believed at the Porte would fall into his Hands, though they had not yet any Account of its having done so; and Schamachia being an open defenceless Place, it was not doubted it would soon follow the Fate of Derbent. Thus the Czar is in Possession of all the Persian Georgia, and of all the Ports on that Side of the Cas-

pian Sea, and has been received as a Delivered by the Georgian Princes who are of the Greek Church. The only Opposition he has hitherto met with, is from the Prince of the Province of Dagestan, a Mussulman, who it is said has a very numerous Militia under his Command, and advanced with about 5000 Men to attack a flying Camp of the Czar's which he forced to retire, but a great Body of Muscovite Troops coming up to support them, those of Dagestan were obliged to fly to the Mountains, not daring to meet the Muscovites in the open Field.

The Tartar Han and the Prince of Dagestan have represented to the Porte in so warm a Manner the imminent Danger of losing the Turkish Georgia, as well as the Persian Part of it, and of seeing 400000 Mussulmen carried into Slavery by the Muscovites, if they are not supported by the Porte, that in the Beginning of October the Vizier was obliged to assemble a Divan or great Council at Constantinople, to which he communicated those Representations. After several Debates, it was resolved, that for the Security of the Ottoman Empire, the Pasha of Erzerom should be declared Seraskier; that several other Pashas upon that Frontier should raise the Militia in their respective Districts, and be ready to joyn him as Occasion should require; and that Letters should be written to those Georgian Princes who had submitted to the Czar, to intimate to them, that if they do not desist from their Rebellion against their lawful Prince, which is understood to be very Prejudicial to the Turkish Empire, they should be reduced by Force. And as for the Czar, a Capighi-Bashi was some Days after the holding of that Divan, dispatched to him, with Instructions to represent to him, that his coming with an Army into those Parts, the Protection he gives to the Persian Subjects, and his making himself Master of several Places belonging to them, are so many Breaches of the Peace between the Porte and him, and to declare that the Grand Signor cannot sit still and see so many People of the Mussulman Faith exposed to such Dangers and Calamities.

These Letters add, that it was not doubted from the Vizier's peaceable Disposition, he will use his Endeavours to prevent a War; but the Advices that came daily with Alarms of the Czar's Progress, the strong Solicitations of the Tartar Han and of the Prince of Dagestan, joyned to the loud Clamours and Murmurs of the People of Constantinople, seemed to render it impossible for him to hinder it, unless the Czar should desist from his Enterprizes and restore what he has taken; of which there is no Likelyhood, after having

wing advanced so far with so great an Expence, and so much Success.

The following Advices are come from Jamaica.

*Kingston, September 3.*

On the 28th. past we had here a violent Hurricane: It began at Eight in the Morning, and continued untill Ten at Night: The Height of it was from Eleven at Noon till One; during which Time it rained very hard, and the Wind often shifted: Near one half of the Houses are thrown down, or shattered to such a Degree, that they are irreparable, and few or none have escaped without some Damage; insomuch that the Town appears in a ruinous Condition: Several People are wounded; but we hear of no more than three Persons who lost their Lives. The Wharfs are all destroyed, and most of the Sugars and other Commodities that were there, are washed away. From Liguania we hear, that most of their Works and Houses are blown down, and a Plantation intirely destroyed by a vast Quantity of Sand being washed into it. We likewise hear, they have sustained great Damages at St. Mary's, Wagwater, St. David's, and St. Thomas's in the East; but we have not the Particulars. We are informed the Hurricane began at some of those Places about Seven the Night before; and the Damage they received, was between that Time and Eight the next Morning, when its Violence abated.

*St. Jago de la Vega, Sept. 3.* We have received considerable Damage in our Buildings in the late Hurricane, particularly the King's House, and Secretary's Office: But we hear of very few that are any ways hurt in their Persons. It is remarkable, that those Houses which were built by the Spaniards sustained very little Damage, though 'tis now 87 Years since the Conquest of the Island; consequently those Buildings are of much older Date: From whence we may reasonably conclude, that they had met with Accidents of the like Nature, that put them upon that Manner of Building. We have an Account from Old-Harbour, that the Houses and People there are all destroyed except two, and that most of their Works and Houses at the Plantations are thrown down: They have likewise suffered very much at Sixteen-Mile-Walk, and St. Thomas's in the Vale. Yesterday his Excellency sat in Council; and this Day was published the following Proclamation.

### A PROCLAMATION,

WHEREAS we are given to understand, that several wicked Persons, taking Advantage of the Misfortunes of our Subjects, occasioned by the late terrible Storm, have barbarously plundered Ships, and other Vessels run on Shore, or stranded on the Coast of our said Island; and that the Goods of the Sufferers of our Town of Port-Royal, and other Places, have been in the most scandalous manner secreted and embezzelled; and we having nothing more at Heart, than the Security of the Rights and Properties of our good Subjects, for whose late Losses we are sensibly afflicted; and to discourage the said Practice, which is so abhorrent to Humanity and Justice, and to the end

that Restitution may, as far as in us lies, be made to the rightful Owners, or their Representatives: We have out of our Princely Compassion for the Miseries of our Subjects, thought fit, by the Advice of our Council of our said Island, to issue this our Royal Proclamation, hereby commanding our Provost-Marshal-General of our said Island, to seize upon and take into his Possession, all such Goods as shall be found either on Shipboard or on the Shore; and which were either Part of the Cargo of any Ship or Vessel stranded or run on Shore as aforesaid, or were by the Overflowing of the Sea, or Rivers, washed out of any Dwelling-House, Store-House, or Wharf, and cast on other Parts of our said Island, and the better to enable our said Provost-Marshal to observe our Commands herein; We do hereby impower him to go on Board of, and search, all Merchant Ships and Vessels in any of the Harbours or Rivers of our said Island, as also to administer an Oath to any Person, or Persons, whom he shall have Cause to suspect, to have received, or still do detain or conceal such Goods as are herein before described. And in case of any Person's Refusal to deliver any of the said Goods, or to take such Oath concerning the said Goods, or any Part thereof, then to take him, her, or them, into his Custody, there to be safely kept until further Order. And we do further authorize our said Provost-Marshal, to impress Slaves, Wains and Boats, in the Execution of our Commands herein. And for the more speedy Redress of our Subjects; We do hereby direct our said Provost-Marshal to publish an Inventory, with the Marks or Numbers of all such Goods as shall come into his Hands, by Virtue of these Presents, which upon Affidavit or other Proof of the respective Owner or Owners Right of Property thereto, to the Satisfaction of our said Provost-Marshal, upon his Order be immediately delivered to the said Owner or Owners. And we do strictly charge and command all our Justices, Coroners, Officers of our Customs, and other our Subjects, to be aiding and assisting to our Provost-Marshal in the Execution of the Premises. And to the end that wicked Transgressors may also suffer the other Penalties inflicted upon them by Law; We do enjoin all our Officers and Subjects to put in Execution, in the most rigid manner, (as far as the same regards our said Island) one Act of Parliament passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of the late Queen Anne, Intituled, *An Act for the preserving all such Ships, and Goods thereof, which shall happen to be forced on Shore, or stranded upon the Coast of this Kingdom, or any other of Her Majesty's Dominions.* Witness his Excellency Sir Nicholas Lawes, Kt. our Captain-General, and Governour in Chief in and over our said Island at St. Jago de la Vega, the 3d Day of September, in the Ninth Year of our Reign, Annoq; Dom. 1722.

*Port-Royal, Sept. 5.* The dreadful Hurricane we had here the 28th of last Month, we were under Apprehensions of the Day before; from the Weather appearing very unsettled, and the Wind often shifting. But the most surprizing Circumstance, which put us under the greatest Consternation, was the prodigious Swell of the Sea: Throwing up several hundred Tons of Stones,

Stones, and Rocks of a large Size, over the Wall at the Eastward Part of the Town, tho' at the same Time there was very little, if any, Wind. In the Night there was some Rain, Thunder and Lightning, which we were in Hopes would have cleared the Air; but before the Morning, the Town was overflowed with Water, occasioned by the Continuance of the Swell of the Sea: About Eight it began to blow with great Violence at N. E. and continued till Ten at Night, during which Time it rained very hard, and the Wind often shifted; but the extrem Part was from Eleven at Noon till One, when the Water was about five Foot high all over the Town, and we expected every Moment to be destroyed. About Three in the Afternoon the Wind abated by degrees, and the Waters fell away; but a more melancholy Prospect scarcely ever was seen, and is not to be described: The Streets being covered with Ruins of Houses, Wrecks of Boats and Vessels, and great Numbers of dead Bodies: The Inhabitants that were preserved, reduced to great Extremity for Want of Water, Provisions and other Necessaries, which were mostly destroyed; insomuch that a great Number must have perished, had it not been for the Assistance of His Majesty's Ships that rid out the Storm. Fort Charles has suffered very much, and the East-End sunk several Foot; most of the Cannon dismounted, and some washed into the Sea: The Church and the Row of Houses to the Eastward of the Town are washed away, insomuch that there is very little Appearance of any Buildings. Near 400 Persons lost their Lives, and above half the Town is destroyed: In short, the Damage is so considerable that it cannot be computed. The Magistrates were very diligent on this unhappy Occasion, in burying the dead Bodies, and preventing Provisions being sold at higher Rates than they were at before the Storm.

The Duke of York, Captain Sanders, of London, cast away near Green Bay, the Master and Men, except three, drowned. The Christabella, Captain Griffin, of London, drove ashore and broke her Back, the Men and Part of the Cargo saved. The King William, Captain Ruddock, of Bristol, stranded, the Men and Part of the Cargo saved. The Frederick, Captain Good, of Bristol, stranded, the Men saved. The Robert and Henry of Bristol, Captain Jones, stranded, Men saved, Cargo lost. The Kingston, Captain Masters, in the Service of the South Sea Company, with 200 Negroes on board, foundered, the Master and most of the Men and Negroes drowned. The Onslow, and another of the Prizes taken by the Swallow on the Coast of Guiney from the Pyrates, are lost; the other called the Ranger, rid out the Storm, after cutting away her Masts. 14 Sloops, most of them belonging to the Island, are lost.

*Kingston, Sept. 10.* We hear from St. Anoe's, they have had the Hurricane in as violent a Degree there, as on this Side of the Island, and have suffered as much in their Buildings and Plantations. The Frost Frigate of London, Captain Hingston, drove ashore and is lost, the Men are all saved. The Bershua, Captain Fry, drove ashore, but got off the next Day, and sails in a few Days for London. The Catherine, Captain Barnett, in the Service of the Country, we are informed got into Davis's Cove, and rid out the Storm. This Calamity we find to be general throughout the Island, though some Pa-

rishtes have suffered in a greater Degree than others: St. Thomas's in the East, and St. Mary's, have sustained the least Damage; and Port-Royal the most, in all Respects.

Milford, Capt. Foy, overset, Men all saved.

Liston, Captain Tate, stranded, the Men and Part of the Cargo saved.

Richard and Mary, Capt. Beal, drove ashore and stranded, Men saved.

Pensilvania Merchant, Captain Gordon, drove ashore and stranded, Men saved.

Dover Galley, Captain Harris, drove ashore and stranded, Men saved.

Dove, Capt. Scot, stranded, Men and Part of the Cargo saved.

*Of Liverpool.*

The Greyhound, Capt. Coppell, drove on dry Land, the Men all lost.

Mary, Capt. Fletcher, stranded, the Men and Cargo saved.

Hannah and Sarah, Capt. Kerfoot, drove ashore, expected to get off.

William and Betty, Capt. Smith, drove ashore and stranded, the Men saved.

William Snow, Capt. Bailie, stranded, the Men saved.

There was likewise in our Harbour 10 Sloops belonging to the Island, seven of which are lost, and three drove among the Mangroves, into a Morass.

Admiralty Office, December 7.

Extract of a Letter to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, from Captain Harris Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships at Jamaica.

From on board His Majesty's Ship the Falkland, in Port Royal Harbour in Jamaica, Sept. 8, 1722.

On the 28th past, about Eight in the Morning, we had a very violent Hurricane which held all the Day, so that of about 30 Sail of Merchant Ships, but two are left Swimming, and but one Sloop of many that were in this Harbour is saved. The Island in General has suffered very much, many of their Houses, Mills, &c. blown down, and I do not hear of any that have escaped being much damaged: One third Part of Port-Royal is intirely destroyed, and many Families lost by the Sea breaking into it. His Majesty's Ships here, viz. this Ship, the Swallow, Weymouth, and Happy Sloop, are safe, but we have lost all our Masts, and parted most of our Cables; our Boats are all gone, as are most of those belonging to the Town, which hinders us very much in looking for our Rafts of Masts, &c. We have got all our Anchors again, and our Ships into proper Births and moored. The Launceston, Adventure, and Mermaid are at Sea. The Naval Storehouse is blown down: I have People there clearing away the Rubbish and securing the Stores in the best manner they can in the Victualling Storehouse, which stands without great Damage. When we can get our Rafts together, we shall endeavour to fix Jury Masts for the Swallow and Weymouth to carry them Home. I shall be getting this Ship masted, and fitted for Sea as soon as possible. The Storm made the Happy Sloop complain so much, that the Captain was obliged to clear his Decks of all his Guns, &c. to preserve her from foundering; but as we have got Masts for her, of some of the Sloops that were lost, we hope we shall get her fit for Sea next Week.

Extract of a Letter to the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, from Sir Nicholas Lawes Governour of Jamaica.

St. Jago de la Vega Sept. 20, 1722.

On the 28th of August last it pleased Almighty God to visit this Colony with a most dreadful Storm, which has blown down many of our Houses, destroyed most of the Shipping in our Harbours; and many hundreds of People, particularly at Port-Royal, have lost their Lives by the Fall of Houses and Inundation of the Sea. The Damage done to the Plantations throughout the whole Country is inconceivable. I have with the Advice of the Council issued Writs for calling a new Assembly, to meet the 22d of October next.

Whereas a short fat Man, about 50 Years of Age, with a round Face and pale Complexion, wearing black Cloaths with a light coloured Frize Coat over them, and a tied Wig, who speaks Latin, Dutch, and English, but the latter very much like an Irishman, and called himself sometimes James Oker, at other times Abraham Whitro, was on the 26th Day of November last apprehended at Hockley near Birmingham in Warwickshire, for uttering treasonable Expressions, and publishing traitterous Libels, and for the same, as also for divers strong Causes of Suspicion of other Crimes and Misdemeanors, was bound to appear at the next General Quarter Sessions for the said County; but has since absconded and fled from Justice, together with Henry Kempson, his Surety, who kept a

Publick House at Hockley aforesaid, where the said Oker alias Whitro lodged: All Persons whom it may concern are desired not to conceal or harbour him or his Bail aforesaid, but to apprehend and carry them before the next Magistrate, in order to their being dealt with according to Law.
