Cadiz, December 8, N. S.

TWO Spanish Men of War of 64 Guns each, are ordered to be got ready to serve as Convoy to the Flota which is to go to Vera-Cruz in April next: All the other Men of War of the Spanish Squadron are laid up here. An Advice-Boat arrived three Days ago from Vera-Cruz, with an Account that the Ships with Quicksilver having on Board the Viceroy of Mexico, which sailed from hence, are arrived there; as also that the Galeons were expected at the Havana from Porto-belo and Cartagena in November last, with a very rich Treasure on board.

Madrid, Dec. 14, N. S. The Envoy of Genoa had Yesterday his first publick Audience of their Catholick Majesties, in which he asked Pardon in the Name of his Principals for their Behaviour in the Affair of Cardinal Alberoni. His Majesty's Answer to what the Envoy said upon that Occasion is not yet made publick; but it is known the Queen's Answer was, That she hoped the Republick would for the future avoid giving the King Occasion of being displeas'd with them, and in that Supposition she granted them her Friendship.

Lisbon, Dec. 19, N. S. Yesterday Morning His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Lynn sailed out of this River for Barbadoes, having on board the Governour Collonel Worsley, who has had great Honours shewed him at this Court. His Portuguesse Majesty ordered Provisions of all Kinds sufficient for the Voyage to be put on Board. M. de Mendonça, Secretary of State, dined with him the Day he embarked, accompanied him to the Water-side, and would have gone with him on Board to take Leave of him there, but Mr. Worsley would not permit him. Twenty two Ships are now seen off the Bar, which our Merchants take to be the Fleet from the Bahia. On the 2d Instant His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Colchester came into this River, having sprung her Fore-mast in the late Storm at Sea. Yesterday the Dursley Galley, another British Man of War, arrived here from Gibraltar, having left the Falmouth Men of War on the 13th Instant cruising in the Streights-Mouth.

From on Board His Majesty's Ship the Dragon in the Mole of Genoa, Dec. 11, O. S. His Ma-

jesty's Ship the Lyme, commanded by the Lord Vere Beauclair sailed from hence on the 7th Instant to cruise in the Streights Mouth. The Revolution being now ready for the Sea, Commodore Scot has ordered Captain Stewart in the Winchester to convoy her to Gibraltar, whence it is designed the Falmouth shall proceed with her to England: But in case the Falmouth shall have left that Station, then Captain Stewart has Orders to convoy her Home.

Gibraltar, Nov. 28 1722.
 On the 14th Instant, O. S. the Providence Ship of this Port, John Cunn Maiter, from Port Mahone, being under Quarantine in this Bay, was about Two a Clock in the Morning run away with the said Maiter and Crew, consisting of five Persons, besides three Spaniards (which were put on board at Gibraltar.) and one English woman who came as a Passenger from Mahone; The Maiter is about 35 Years of Age,

middle sized, about five Foot 10 Inches high, of a light brown Complexion, and wears a Perwig, was born near Swatney in Wales, but his last Residence in England was at Stowich near Plymouth (where his Wife now lives;) the Ship is very old, of about 40 Tons Burthen, and was built at Waterford in Ireland, she had two Guns and six small Arms, and was ballasted with 18 Chalders of Welsh Coals, which with the Vessel were the sole Property of Mr. William Sherer, Agent for Admitting this Garrison; there was also on Board her, (besides to other Gentlemen of this Port,) 14 Butts of White Wine, five Chells of Florence Wine, some Pieces of Silks of sundry Sorts, several Pieces of Burdets, one Bale of Linnen, and 50 Pieces of different Sores and sizes.
