Madrid, January 4.

ON the 29th past in the Evening and 30th in the Morning the King went to the Royal Chapel and was present at the Anniversay Devotions performed on the Festival of Sant Jago; the Knights of that Order assisted there likewise in their Habits of Ceremony. The 30th their Catholick Majesties gave publick Audience to the Marquês de Maulevrier Ambassadour of France, who appeared dressed in deep Mourning, wearing a long Black Cloak, on Occasion of the Death of the late Dutchess Dowager of Orleans, which he notified in this Audience to their Catholick Majesties, who thereupon altered the Time of this Court's going into Mourning on the 7th Instant, by appointing it to begin on the 31st past. The Princess of Asturias's Indisposition continuing, strict Orders have been given not to let any Coach pass near the Palace-Court, lest the Noise might disturb her; but having been twice let Blood, and used other Remedies, she is now much better. The Royal Family's Journey to the Pardo remains fixt to the 7th Instant, from whence they go to Balsain, and set out afterwards for Buirago, the Place appointed for their receiving Mademoiselle de Beaujolois.

Brussels, Jan. 13. Yesterday in the Afternoon arrived here his Royal Highness Don Emanuel Prince of Portugal. He was met at Halle by a Detachment of Dragoons sent from hence by the Marquês de Prié, with four Coaches drawn by six Horses each, which brought hither his Royal Highness and all his Retinue: At the Gate of Anderlecht he found a Company of our Burghers under Arms with their Officers at their Head, and at his Entrance the Artillery of our Ramparts were thrice discharged: As he passed through the

Streets, his Royal Highness ordered a good Sum of Money to be distributed among the Poor; and being conducted to the Marquês de Prié's House was at his alighting there received and complimented by his Excellency, and by the Marchioness his Lady, a great Number of the Nobility in rich Habits attending to be present at his Reception, and to pay him their Compliments. The whole Company was magnificently entertained that Evening with a Supper and a Ball. His Royal Highness has since been complimented by the Magistrates of this City, and during his Stay here will be treated with all the Honours that can be shewed to a Prince of his Rank so nearly related to the Emperour.

Paris, Jan. 16. The King is expected at the Tuilleries about the 8th or 10th of next Month, and 'tis thought will not return to Versailles till some Days after his Majority: His Majesty proposes to see the Opera and Ball, and the Diversions of the Fair of St. Germain, where he has not yet been. The 14th Instant in the Afternoon, the Regent came to the Palais Royal, and set out Yesterday for Versailles, to be present at a Council appointed to be held there. The Cardinal du Bois has been indisposed, but is now pretty well recovered. It is reported that at the Instances of the Dutchess of Orleans the Marquês de Camillac will be recalled from his Exile at Blois, and permitted to come to Beaurepaire, a Place six Leagues from hence. Letters from Rome of the 26th of December, N.S. advise, that the Turks have forced the Republick of Ragusa, to pay in ready Money all the Arrears of the Annual Tribute due from them to the Porte; and that the said Republick makes Instances to the Court of Rome, that the Ecclesiasticks of their City and State may be obliged to an equal Proportion with the Seculars.
