AN humble Address of the Governour, High Sheriff, Deputy-Governour, Justices of the Peace, Grand-Jury, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Monaghan, having been transmitted by the Lords Justices of Ireland to his Grace the Duke of Grafton Lord Lieutenant of that Kingdom, has by him been presented to His Majesty, who was pleased to receive it very graciously.

Hague, March 30, N. S. We have Letters from Constantinople dated the 20th of February last, which advise, that the Port had received a particular Account of the Revolution in Persia from the Pasha of Babylon, importing, that the King had been obliged to submit to the Rebel Mirveiz by Famine, which was so extreme that the Inhabitants of Ispahan mutinied, and the great Men about the King pressed him so hard to yield, that they prevailed with him to send Deputies to treat with Mirveiz: With those Deputies a Treaty was made, by which it was agreed that Mirveiz, as Conquerour, should be declared King, and the other deposed on Condition no Hurt should be done to his Person. Hereupon the King marched out of Town in Person to meet Mirveiz when he made his Entry, and afterwards invited him to a great Feast, at which he publicly declared, that he submitted to the Will of God, who had made Mirveiz the Conquerour, and deposed him, telling the People they should acknowledge him for their King for the future: Having made this Declaration he retired, and according to the Intelligence the forementioned Pasha of Babylon had received, still lived in one of the Royal Palaces, very strictly watched, but not confined to a Chamber. Thus Mirveiz took upon him the Royal Government, by the Name of Schach or King Mahomud, and exercised it without any Opposition, for there was no more Talk of the deposed King's Son, who was said to be raising Forces at Casbin, in order to support his Title. In the mean while the Pasha of Babylon had submitted it to the Consideration of the Port, whether an Army should not be employed to dethrone him before he be well settled; this the said Pasha judged to be so easy an Undertaking, that he had offered to execute it with the Troops of his own Government and that of Erzerum, without asking any more Men or Money of the Grand Signior. What Resolution the Port will take upon this Proposal, was not yet known: But these Letters from Constantinople tell us, that besides the Province of Daguestan (formerly mentioned to be taken under the Protection of the Port) the Chans

of Tauris, Teflis, and of the other Countries which compose the Greater Armenia, have also since resorted to their Protection; and they have resolved to grant it to them, though these are all Provinces belonging to Persia. We learn likewise by these Letters, that the Czar having left a Garrison in Derbent, which is the only Place of Strength in the Province of Daguestan, and another in the new Fortrefs which he has built near Tarkou, the Port was waiting with Impatience to hear from the Capigi-Bashi, who was some Time since sent to the Czar about those Proceedings, to take a final Resolution. On the 12th of February a fourth Son was born to the Grand Signior, whereupon publick Rejoicings and Illuminations were made throughout Constantinople by his Command, for four Days and four Nights; and the Vizier having notified in Form this young Prince's Birth to all the foreign Ministers at the Port, they distinguished themselves by their Illuminations on that Occasion.
