ER Royal Highness the Princess of Wales lying in at the Time of Her Birth Day the 1st of March, the Celebration of that Day at Court was then put off, and is appointed to be To morrow the 3d lostant.

Cadiz, March 16, N. S. Preparations are making here for transporting to Ceuta a confiderable Body of Troops, with a Train of Artillery and Stores, to attack the Moors who beliege that Place, and to make new Works for the Defence of the Spanish Garrison. These Forces are to be transported in Saitias and other small Boats, for there are no Ships hired for this Service. The Want of Rain in these Parts gives us Apprehensions of a bad Harvest: Corn is very scarce and dear all along this Coast of Andalousia.

Lisbon, March 18, N. S. On the 11th Instant the Fleet from the Rio de Janeiro, confifting of 15 Merchant Ships, under the Convoy of two Men of War, arrived in this Harbour. Their Cargoes are principally Sugar, Hides, and Elephants Teeth, besides Gold, which appears by the Register to amount to the Value of Eight Millions of Crusado's, or One Million Sterling; of which two hundred and nine thousand Pounds are for the King of Portugal, and the Remainder is on the Account of private Persons. There are befides on Board, two hundred and fifty thoufand Pieces of Eight, and a confiderable Quantity of unregistred Gold. The British Men of War now in this Port are the Colchester, the Leopard, the Falmouth, and the Lime Galley. The last Letters from Malaga advise, that besides the Troops and Ammunition already fent to Ceuta, which is very closely be fieged by the Moors, the Spaniards intend to form an Army to be fent over into Africa, for the Relief of that Place; and for that Purpose were making Preparations in the Neighbourhood of Malaga, for Quartering the Troops designed for that Expedition, in which it was thought they would meet with great Difficulties, there being a very great Scarcity of Corn in those Parts.

Pifa, March 24, N. S. The Quarantain between Leghorn and Genoa is taken off, which will very much facilitate Commerce on the Coast of Italy, particularly with relation to British Ships. Three of the Great Duke's

Gallies are preparing to put to Sea next Month, and Captain Ricci is gone to Leghorn, to provide all the necessary Stores for that purpose. It is not yet known whether they will go directly to Malta, or whether they are only designed to crusse, to protect our Coasts from the Corsairs of Barbary.

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Paris, April 2, N. S. The Count de St. Estevan Ambassadour Penipotentiary of the King of Spain, arrived here on the 31st past, and is to return to Cambray as soon as he has made the King his Master's Complements to his most Christan Majesty on his Coronation and Majority; for which purpose he expects an Audience in a Day of two.
