Paris, April 14. N. S. Yesterday a Person who came Post hither, and went to the House of M. Heliffan a Banker of this City, was seized as he entred the Door, and being immediately searched, there were found upon him 1000 Counterfeit Louis d'Ors. Search is made for his Accomplices. It is expected, that M. de Fleury Bishop of Frejus, formerly the King's Preceptor will shortly be made a Cardinal, this Court having recommended him to the Pope for the next Promotion. Some Persons have made an offer to the Council of the India Company of Five Millions of Livres a Year for the Farm of Tobacco.

Hague, April 16, N. S. On the 11th Instant an Express arrived from Maestricht, with an Account of the Death of Count Tilly, Governour of that Place. On the 12th the States General nominated Prince William of Hesse-Cassel to succeed him in that Government; Notice of which being sent to that Prince, who is now at Cassel, he is expected here in a few Days to take the usual Oath for that Employment. The said Prince is succeeded in his Government of Breda by M. de Rechteren, whose Government of Tournay is given to M. de Pallant, and that of Venlo from which the latter is removed, to Collonel Ginkel, Son of the late Earl of Athlone. The States of the Province of Overyssel are now assembled, and the Advices from thence tell us, they have under Deliberation the conferring the Stadtholdership of that Province on the Prince of Nassau, the Deputies of three Towns having declared for him. It has been resolved to send a Squadron of five Men of War this Summer to the Streights, and the Captains of them are already nominated.
