Geneva, April 19, N. S. Accordingly they gave Judge-ment the 17th Inftant, that Major Davel should have his Hand and his Head cut off. An Express was sent to Berne, to acquaint the Regents with the Sentence passed, and their final Determination concerning him is daily expected.
