AN humble Address of the United Ministers of the Gospel in New-England, has been presented to His Majesty by Jeremiah Dummer, Esq; Agent for New-England, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Geneva, April 19, N. S. By Letters dated Yesterday from Lausanne we have an Account, that the Regents of the Canton of Berne had referred to the Inhabitants of a Street of Lausanne called du Bourg, the Examinations of Major Davel, it being an ancient Privilege of the said Inhabitants of that Street to take Cognizance of and pass Sentence upon Criminals within the Town of Lausanne. Accordingly they gave Judgment the 17th Instant, that Major Davel should have his Hand and his Head cut off. An Express was sent to Berne, to acquaint the Regents with the Sentence passed, and their final Determination concerning him is daily expected.

Copenhagen, April 24, N. S. On the 20th Instant, the Secretary of the Council was with M. Goes the Dutch-Envoy, and told him, that the King, to

shew how much he esteemed the Friendship of the States, and to remove all Occasions of any Misunderstanding between them, had sent Order to his Resident at the Hague to declare to their High Mightinesses that the Merchant Ships of their Subjects might freely traffick in the Baltick; his Majesty leaving the Demands of Arrears due to his Troops which served the States in the late War, to be adjusted in an amicable Manner.

Hague, April 27, N. S. The Merchant Ships bound from Amsterdam and other Ports for the Baltick, having for some time suspended their Voyage, Notice has been given by Order of the States that they may now sail without any further Delay. The sending of a Squadron to the Streights is put off to another Year; only a fourth Ship is to be added to the three of the ordinary Convoy of Amsterdam.

Hague, April 30, N. S. According to the Advices from Amsterdam about 50 Ships have already sailed for the North. The Marquess de Monteleone has delivered to the States General his Master the King of Spain's Letter of Notification of the Prince Don Carlos's Marriage; he has also given like Letters of Notification to several Ministers here, for the respective Princes their Masters. We have Letters from Constantinople of the 23d of March, N. S. which

which advise, that the Ambassadour expected from Mirveiz to ask the Grand Signior's Investiture, was not arrived at the Port, nor was there yet any Account of such Ambassadour's having set out from Ispahan. In the mean while, the Son of the deposed King of Persia, who was at Casbin, had retired to Tauris on the Frontier of Persia, and had sent an Express to the Port to desire Protection and Assistance: But what Regard the Port would have to his Request was not known. The Port had not only raken under their Protection the Province of Daguestan which belongs to the Kingdom of Persia, but had likewise sent Orders to the Palhaw of Erzerum to march with a considerable Body of Troops into Georgia, and to reduce to the Obedience of the Grand Signior the Chan of Teflis who is Governour of that Province, who had Intelligence with the Czar before his Entrance into that Country last Year with his Army, and declared publickly for him on his Arrival.

For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, His Majesty is graciously pleased to promise to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be apprehended, the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, or any one or more of them, a Reward of 50 l. to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs, for each of them so discovered and apprehended, so as he or they may be secured and brought to Justice: And His Majesty is likewise pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any Person concerned in the same, who shall discover his Accomplices in the said Robbery, so as that they may be apprehended and proceeded against according to Law.
