WHereus James Earl of Bute was duly elefted and returned to be one of the sixtaen Reers of Scotland, to sit in the House of Peers of the present Parliament of Great Britain, and is since his blection and Return deceased: In order to the Electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his Room, We do. by the Advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth do. by the Advice of Our Krivy Council, iffue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to affemble and meet at Holy Rood-House, on Thursday the Thirteenth Day of June next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Asternçon, to nominate and thuse another Peer of Scotland, to sit and vote in the House of Peers of the said l'arliament of Great Britain, in the Room of the said James Earl of Bute, deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and the Proxies for such as shall be absent; such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, daily signed before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified by Law And the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively. by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend fuch Meeting, and to administer ste Oaths required by Lucy to be taken there by such Peers, and to take their Votes"; and immediately, after fuch Election made, and duly examined to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the Same in the Presence of the said Reers, and resum such Certificate into our High Court of Chanciry of Creat British And High Court of Chancery of Great British and we firstly charge and command, That this our Royal Proclamation be published at our Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty five Days at least; before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the faid Peers to proceed to such Election.
