**A**N humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, and Freeholders of the County of Corke, assembled at a General Assize the 22d of March last; also an humble Address of the Mayor, Sheriffs, Recorder, Justices of the Peace, Aldermen, Grand Jury, Freemen, and other Inhabitants of the City of Corke, at a General Assize and Goal Delivery held for the said City on the same Day; having been transmitted by the Lords Justices of Ireland to his Grace the Duke of Grafton Lord Lieutenant of that Kingdom, have by him been presented to His Majesty.

*Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.*

*Madrid, May 1, N. S.* It is advised from Andalusia, that having lately had Rain in those Parts, they have the Prospect now of a good Crop of Corn. The 24th Instant being the King's Birth-Day, the Grandees and other Persons of Distinction went to Aranjuez, where the Court has resided for some Time, to make their Compliments to their Catholick Majesties; on which Occasion Mourning was laid aside: The Court is expected to return hither in a few Days. The Franciscans having lately purchased the Liberty of a good Number of Captives, and brought them hither from Algiers, they passed Yesterday in Procession before the Royal Palace, the Duke of Fernandina bearing the Standard before the Nobility who were invited to assist at the Procession. Letters from Cadiz give an Account, that the Intendant Patino had given publick Notice for all the Ships which are allowed to form the Flota for New-Spain, to be ready to take in their Lading the Beginning of this Month; on the Penalty to such as should not then be in Readiness, of having their Licences taken from them. A French Vessel which was come into Cadiz from Martinico had brought an Account, that a Spanish Ship from Caracas named the Sea-Horse (which was given over for lost) had put into an Harbour of that Island. Don Balthazar de Guevara, who had the Care of the last Galleons, having waited on their Catholick Majesties at Aranjuez a few Days ago, was very favourably received, and is to command that Flota which is designed to be fitted out about the End of August next.

*Turin, May 12, N. S.* On the 5th Instant in the Evening Madame Royale was taken very ill, which prevented his Sardinian Majesty's Departure for the Veneria. His Majesty has ordered all his Troops to change their Garrisons: On the 8th General Deport's second Battallion and Count Saluce's Battallion, which were in Garrison in this Town, were relieved by the Regiment of Foot Guards, and one Battallion of Savoy, who are to remain here this Summer. On the 10th Instant Madame

Royale being recovered, his Majesty set out for the Veneria; and in the Evening, her Majesty with the Duke D'Aouste, and the rest of the Court, went thither, in order to pass the Summer. The same Day the Prince of Piedmont set out for Pignerol, where he designs to review his Regiment of Dragoons, and then to return to the Veneria. The Marquess de Belljoyoso is arrived from Milan, with Orders from his Imperial Majesty, to congratulate the Prince of Piedmont upon the Birth of the young Prince, and at the same Time to condole with his Royal Highness upon the Death of the Princess.

*Paris, May 19, N. S.* The greatest Part of the Prelates and of the Deputies of the Clergy from the several Provinces of the Kingdom, are arrived here, to assist at the Assembly of the Clergy which is to be opened here the 25th Instant at the Grands Augustins. It is said the Marquess d'Aligre, Lieutenant-General, will shortly be created a Duke and Peer; which Honours are to descend to his Grandson the Marquess de Rupelmonde, who is then to take on him the Name and Arms of Aligre. The Infanta Queen, with the Ladies her Attendants, is to go next Month to reside at Meudon.

*Navy-Office, May 10, 1723.*

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Treasury having appointed Money for paying of Half Pay to the Sea Officers, from the 30th of June, to the 31st of December last, according to His Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf; these are to give Notice, that the said Payments will begin to be made at the Treasurer of the Navy's Office in Broad-street, on Monday the 20th Instant for the Captains, Tuesday the 21st for the Lieutenants, and Wednesday the 22d for the Masters, that all Persons concerned may then and there attend to receive what may become payable to them, and not only bring with them the Affidavits required, touching their not having enjoyed the Benefit of any Publick Employment whatsoever, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they were to be paid the said Half-Pay, but also produce Certificates (if they have not done it already) that they have subscribed the Test, and taken the Oaths required by the late Act of Parliament; and in case any of the said Officers shall not be able to attend themselves to receive their Money, but employ Attornies for that Purpose, that the said Attornies may produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Person they are employed by.
