

# The London Gazette.

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*Falmouth, October 9.*

**O**N Friday last happened here a most violent storme, in which some Vessels were lost, and many driven ashore, and it is feared, that we shall not be without hearing from other places of the like effects of this tempestuous weather. The 7 instant came in here the *London Merchant* from that Port, to lade Pilchards for the *Canaries*, together with the *Robert* and *John* of *Colchester*, bound for *St Lucar*.

*Rome, Sept. 26.* The difference lately happened between the Cardinals *Chisy* and *Rospigliosi* and the *Portugal* Ambassador, in the matter of precedence between their respective Coaches, which were appointed to accompany the Spanish Ambassador as he went in Solemnity to *St Maries Maggi re*, having been wholly accommodated by the interposition of the Spanish Ambassador, and the said Cardinals obtained the Popes Bull, remitting unto them all Penalties, which by their presuming upon that occasion to Arme Men (as they did in order to the righting themselves of the affront they pretended to have received in that rencounter) they had incurred, the said Cardinals are parted hence on their way to *Florence*, as well to salute the Great Duke, as to confer, as is thought, with the Cardinal *de Medicis*, concerning some particular affairs.

We are told of another Courier arrived here some days since from *France*, with Letters from his most Christian Majesty, to his Holiness and the Cardinal Patron, earnestly pressing His Holiness to a publick declaration of the Bishop of *Laon's* being promoted to be Cardinal; It is said, that the Duke d' *Estrees* Brother to that Bishop, may yet come hither in quality of Ambassador extraordinary from the Crown of *France*.

The Cardinals *Grimaldi*, *Picolomini*, *Boncompagno*, and *Bonnelli*, are at present very much indisposed, insomuch that here are already parties making for their Caps, in case of any of their decease. Signior *Nerli* is dayly expected out of *Germany*.

*Rome, Octob. 3.* This week the Marquis d' *Astorgas*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Crown of *Spain*, received by an Extraordinary Courier from the Court at *Madrid*, Letters from the Queen Regent, in which her Majesty seems not at all to discommend the proceeding of this Ambassador, as had been here expected her Majesty would have done, in the occasion of the late promotion, but is pleased to add several farther Instructions how he may proceed in this matter; whereupon his Excellency had immediately desired Audience of his Holiness, of whom it is said, he obtained a very favourable answer to what he had desired in the name of the King his Master:

By the same Conveyance his Excellency received his Commission to be Vice-Roy of *Naples*, in the room of *Don Pedro d' Arragon*, upon which he hath since received the Compliments of the Cardinals, and other the persons of quality of this Court. From *Sicily* we have the confirmation of the death of the Cardinal *Visconti* at his Archbishoprick in that

Kingdom, which amongst others, gives occasion to the Emperors Minister here, to renew his solicitations for a Cardinals Cap, in favor of the Prince of *Baden*.

The Count *de Prado*, Ambassador here from the Crown of *Portugal*, is upon his departure from this Court, in order to his return home.

*Venice, Octob. 3.* By a Vessel imported here from *Smirna*, we have advice, that the Plague continues very hot and violent in those parts, almost to the ruine of their Trade, the Neighbouring Countries fearing upon that score, to have almost any Correspondency with them.

The Commander of this Vessel brings us the news, we have for some days had here, of an Engagement between the *Maltha* Galleys, and part of the Turkish Fleet, in which, the latter was worsted so far, as to lose several Galleys, which were either sunk or taken; this the said Master, tells us, he learned of some ships he met at Sea, though it seems here hardly to be believed, till a farther confirmation; however, that which makes this advice the more probable, is, that we are certainly told, that the Squadron of *Maltha* Galleys are passed towards the *Levant*. The report continues still about Town, of the *Baillo de Molino's* death, not without great likelihood of truth; however, whilst there is not any particular advice thereof to the Senate, his Relations continue to hope this may be only some false allarme.

Procurator *Nani* notwithstanding his earnest applications, as well by his own Letters to the Senate, as by his friends here for his return hither for some time, till the Grand Signior shall have appointed another Plenipotentiary for the determining the matters of the Limits, hath not been able to obtain any other answer from them, then that the State of their affairs in those parts, cannot well dispence with his absence as yet.

*Florence, Octob. 5.* The Cardinal *de Medicis*, the Great Dukes Uncle, continues still very much indisposed, to the great trouble of this Court. From *Genoua* they write, of the conclusion of the Marriage between the Prince *Doria*, and the second Daughter of the Princess *Rossano*; and that the French Galleys were still in Port there.

From *Turin*, That that Duke being perfectly recovered, was gone to divert himself for some time in the Country; that the *Sieur du Clô* was there, ordering the Leavies which he hath in hand, for the service of his most Christian Majesty. From *Milan*, that the Duke d' *Offuna*, Governor of those Countries, had written to the Court at *Madrid*, desiring he might be recalled from that Government.

*Leghorno, Octob. 5.* The third instant sailed hence the *Scanderoone* ships, under the Convoy of the Princess *Frigat*, Sir *William Jennings* Commander. This day arrived the *Fonathan Ketch* in 34 days from *Foye* in *Cornwall* laden with Pilchards.

*Vitenna, Octob. 1.* The Nobility of *Upper Hungary* having continued notwithstanding the Emperors reiterated Orders to that purpose, to refuse to provide Provisions for the Imperial Garrisons in those parts, several Troops of Horse had been sent that way, to oblige them to their duty in this particular,

to, to which they have, as we hear, since submitted. We have some Letters from the Port which tell us, that the disturbance about *Mecca*, had been appeas'd by a certain summe of Money, which had been privately sent from the Grand Signior, to some of the chief Abettors of it, together with their pardon for what was pass'd; and that all the Forces which were order'd to march into *Asia*, were countermarch'd back to their former Stations; however, we do not hear giving any absolute credit to this advice, till we hear further, and that more certain. Their Imperial Majesties continue still at *Ebersdorf*, from whence we are told of an Express lately arriv'd there from the Marquis *de Grana*, giving his Imperial Majesty an account, that the Deputies at *Cologne* are endeavoring to make a Treaty, by which that Town should be oblig'd not to admit of any Foreign succors, and that on that condition the Circle of *Westphalia* would keep on foot 15000 Men for the defence of that place in case of any occasion; but that those Magistrates did not at all incline to embrace their proposals in this particular. Signior *Nerlis* is gone hence on his way to *Rome*.

*Heydebergh, Octob. 4.* On Wednesday last was perform'd here the Ceremony of Marriage between the Electoral Prince Palatine, and the Princess of *Danemarck*, with all extraordinary Splendor and Magnificence, nothing having been wanting which might add to the pomp and glory of that Solemnity, which was concluded with Feasting, Dancings, and all other kinds of publick mirth and rejoycings.

*Cologne, October 13.* The Treaty between our Elector and this Town, is still kept on a foot; in the mean time several Proposals have been made by the Bishop of *Strasburgh*, relating to the present Treaty, which our Magistrates have not as yet returned any answer to.

*Dantzick, Octob. 7.* From the Polish Court they write, that the King had declar'd his intentions of marching in person towards the *Ukraine*, and to that end, had order'd all the Forces to be brought together, as well out of *Lithuania* as this Kingdom, his Majesty intending to march in the head of them for the subduing that Country; in which design the Poles seem to promise themselves all the success they can desire; notwithstanding our last Letters from thence tell us, that *Dorofenko* having received very considerable assistance from the Tartars, had taken heart again since his last defeat, and had for the encouraging his Soldiers, given out, he would meet the Forces of this Crown, when ever they should come into the *Ukraine*; they farther writ, that the Grand General *Sobieski*, finding as well the Court, as the greatest part of the Army, and the people in general to be very much dissatisfied with his conduct of affairs, was about quitting that command, which several of the Kings Friends were not wanting by all means possible to persuade him to, as desiring to see that Command in the hands of *Demetrius Wisnomitski* the Kings Uncle, Under-Generall of the Crown.

*Hamburg, Octob. 12.* Several Passengers arriv'd here from *Brunswicke*, tell us, of the great dissatisfaction there seems to be amongst those Inhabitants, by reason of the great Garrison that is continued there by the Duke of *Wolfembute*, to the great charge of that place.

The Dukes of *Lunenburg* are raising of Men, as is likewise the Bishop of *Munster*, which occasions much discourse, especially considering with what earnestness this latter continues his Fortifications at *Dorsten*. From *Warsaw* they tell us, that that King was marching with all the Forces he could bring together into the *Ukraine*, resolving not to return

from thence, till he had absolutely subjected those people to the Obedience they owe the Crown; in which attempt it was not doubted, but his Majesty would meet with all the success he could promise himself, especially at a time when the Rebel Cossacks, notwithstanding what they give out to the contrary, are much dejected, as well through the civil dissensions amongst them, as the little hopes they have of being able to maintain themselves against the Forces of this Crown.

*Copenhagen, Octob. 4.* Some days since arriv'd here the Sieur *de Bloemendael*, Envoy from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, and yesterday had his first Audience of his Majesty, what his errand may be, is not yet said. The Princess *de Hessen-Cassel*, may, as is said, continue here most part of the approaching winter, and in the mean time is treated here with all the respect imaginable, as well by their Majesties as the rest of this Court; her Son, who as was said, was on their way hither taken ill of the small pox, is not yet arriv'd here, that Princess desiring he may be thoroughly recovered before he come hither.

From *Gottenburgh* they write of the 30<sup>th</sup> past of the arrival there of Mr. *Coventry*, Ambassador from His Majesty of *Great Brittain* to the Crown of *Sweden*, over Land, from *Longsand* in *Norway*, where his Excellency had first landed, and that he was proceeding from thence, on his way to *Stockholme* accordingly.

*Marseilles, Octob. 13.* We hear from *Spain* that there are at present four *Argiers* men of War at Sea, that they have steer'd their course towards the *Streights-mouth*; and that eight more were fitting out at *Argiers*, with all imaginable diligence; we have farther advice here of Sir *Edward Spragges* being with a Squadron of men of War before that Place.

*Brussels, Octob. 14.* The Magistrates of this place are dayly assembled, in order to the raising of the 300 Thousand Guilders desired by his Excellency, towards the carrying on the Fortifications of this place. His Excellency the Count *de Monterey* is at present at *Antwerp*, where he intends to continue as yet for some days, and then begin his journey towards *Gelderland*.

*Hague, Octob. 12.* The rest of the Provinces having approved the nomination of the Heer *van Haren* to go Ambassadors to the Crowns of *Sweden* and *Danemarck*, his dispatches are drawing up accordingly.

The Heer *van Zulichem* is returned hither out of *England*, where he was left by his Highness the Prince of *Orange*, to take care of his concerns there. From *Cologne* they write, that the respective Deputies there, continue their endeavors with all the diligence imaginable, in order to the reconciling those matters.

*Hague, Octob. 15.* At *Amsterdam* is arriv'd the Count *de Rantzou* from *Danemarck* on his way to *France*, whither he is going in quality of Ambassador Extraordinary on the part of that Crown. The Heer *Velt-Marschal Wuris* is still here, but may in few days part for *Utrecht*. His Highness the Prince of *Orange* continues still at *Zuytlestein*.
