Whitehall, June 7.

THE following humble Addresses to His Majesty have been transmitted hither by the Lords Justices of Ireland to his Grace the Duke of Grafton Lord Lieutenant of that Kingdom.

An humble Address of the High Sheriff, Nobility, Justices of the Peace, and Gentlemen Freeholders of the County of Waterford, assembled at the General Sessions of the Peace held for the said County at Dungarvan the 23d Day of April 1723.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Common Council of the County of the Town of Drogheda, the 3d of May 1723.

Cadiz, May 25, N. S. The British Consul here having solicited the Governour of this Place to exempt the British Ships from paying any longer the Charges of being visited by the Officers of Health, and from other late Impositions, the Governour hath actually given the proper Orders for that Purpose; so that the Trade here from the North is in every respect as free as before the Plague at Marseilles, and on the same footing as immediately before the late War with Spain. All continues very quiet in these Parts.

Stockholm, May 15, O. S. Little has been done in the Dyer this last Week, except that by Order of the States several Persons have been taken into Custody on Suspicion of their having tampered with the Peasants, and induced them to press for an Alteration in the present Form of Government. A Committee consisting of a certain Number of each Order, has been appointed to examine into that Affair: The Peasants who are Representatives for Dalecarlia and Sudermania spoke very warmly on this Occasion: They said, as they understood the Matter, the Business of the Committee was to examine certain Persons for having put Projects into the Peasants Heads, which they thought was to no Purpose, for they could assure them in the Name of all their Brethren, that the Peasants were of themselves resolved to be governed by the antient Laws of Sweden only, without Regard to the new Form of Government. This bold Discourse very much surprized the other Members of the Committee, who thought fit immediately to acquaint the other States with it; upon which the Nobility, Clergy, and Burghers sent a Deputation to the Peasants, to demand those two Members of their Body. The Peasants at

at first made some Difficulty, but were at last prevailed upon to deliver them up. The Deputy for the Peasants of Sudermania has endeavoured to make his Peace, but the Dalecarlian stands firm. On the 13th all the Dalecarlians in and about Stockholm, who get their Livelyhood by their daily Labour, repaired to the Assembly of the Peasants, to inquire the Reason of the Imprisonment of their Countryman and Deputy. They came thither with their Axes, and other Instruments which they use in working, and made such pressing Instances, that the Body of the Peasants sent a very numerous Deputation to the King, to desire that their two Members who were under Arrest might be set at Liberty, for that their whole Body would Answer for their Persons. The King referred this Affair to the States. This Morning between Twelve and One a-Clock, happened a most terrible Tempest of Hail Rain and Snow intermixed, with Thunder and Lightning. Four Churches, in distant Quarters of the Town, were all at once set on Fire by the Lightning. The Church of St. Jacob in the Heart of the Town (with Part of a large House of Count de la Gardie's, and several other Houses adjoining) in two Hours Time was quite consumed. The two Churches in the Extremities of the Town were also burnt in the same Space of Time. The Church of St. Nicholas took Fire in the Chancel, but by good Help the Fire was extinguished before it got to a Head. The Consternation was general, no Body knowing whither to fly for Safety. His Swedish Majesty was the whole Time on Horseback giving Directions.

Stockholm, May 22, O. S. Two Expresses from Petersbourg arrived here on Monday Night, and brought the News of the Duke of Holstein's being contracted to the Princess of Muscovy. M. Bestuchef and M. Bassewitz had Yesterday a Conference with Count Horn, and acquainted him with this News. A Russian Frigate is come up this River this

Afternoon, and has brought Letters for his Swedish Majesty, who is gone into the Country; Prince Maximilian of Hesse Cassel being expected here Tomorrow, his Swedish Majesty is gone to a Place called Werbey to meet him.

Paris, June 12, N. S. The 6th Instant an Express arrived at Meudon, with an Account, that Prince Leopold-Clement, eldest Son of the Duke of Lorraine, died on the 4th of the Small Pox, in the 17th Year of his Age, after five Days Illness: On this Occasion the King will go into Mourning for three Weeks. On the 10th M. Pelletier des Forts and M. Fagon, Councillours of State and of the Royal Council, M. Dodun Comptroller General of the Finances, and the Count de Maurepas Secretary of State, Commissioners, appointed by the King for this Purpose, went to the Assembly of the Clergy, and acquainted them that his Majesty expected from them a Free-Gift of Eight Millions of Livres, to be collected and paid between this and the next Assembly which is to be held in 1725. The Commissioners withdrawing, the Assembly came unanimously into a Resolution to raise the Sum required; and a Deputation of Eight Prelates going to the Apartment whither the Commissioners had withdrawn, communicated to them the Resolution passed by the Assembly. The Prince of Pons is nominated to go to the Duke of Lorraine, to make his most Christian Majesty's Compliments of Condolance on the Death of the Prince his eldest Son.
