Paris, June 23.

THE King does not remove to Versailles till the Middle of August next. On the 21st Instant, the Duke of Orleans returned to the Palace Royal, and in the Evening the last new Tragedy called Ines de Castro, written by M. de la Motte, a Member of the French Academy, was performed there before a numerous Auditory. M. de la Jonchere who is Prisoner in the Bastille was Yesterday brought to his own House, to be present at the taking off the Seals put there at his first Commitment, after which he was carried back to Prison; 'tis said, that the Red Ribbon which he used to wear in Quality of Treasurer to the Order of St. Lewis, has been demanded of him, and that his Employment of Treasurer-General of the Extraordinaries at War, will be given to M. de Betz, Farmer-General. Yesterday in the Afternoon M. de Morville, Secretary of State for Marine Affairs, was admitted a Member of the French Academy in the Room of the late Abbot Dangeau, and the Speech he made on that Occasion was generally applauded; M. Mallet, Chancellour of the Academy who officiates for the Marechal de Villars as Director, answered M. Morville's Speech, and the Cardinal du Bois, together with a great Number of Persons of distinction, were present at the Assembly. His Eminency had some slight Returns of his Fever on Sunday last, but came hither from Meudon on the 21st, and returned thither Yesterday about Six in the Evening. The Duke of Orleans likewise returned thither Yesterday in the Evening.

Hague, June 25 The States General have caused a Placard to be published, by which the Subjects of these Provinces are forbid under the severest Penalties to contribute by Subscription, or otherwise, towards the Establishment of an East India Company in the Austrian Netherlands. Prince William of Hesse is sick of a Fever at Amsterdam. The King of Prussia is short expected at Cleves, and 'tis reported that his Majesty designs to make a Tour to these Provinces.
