Leghorn, August 5.

AN English Vessel is arrived here in two Days and a half from Barcelona; which is reckon'd to be as swift a Passage as has been known. We have an Account that the Marquis Mari is arrived at Porto-Longone with four Spanish Men of War and 16 Transports, in order to relieve the Garrison of that Place. Commodore Scot, in His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Dragon, is arrived here, and intends to sail with the first fair Wind for Algiers.

Port-Mahon, July 15. Spain and Genoa having again opened Commerce with Marseilles, Colonel Kane our Lieutenant Governour, has done the same for this Island. He has given Orders, that when our Packet-Boat returns from Genoa, she shall be sent to Marseilles with and for our Letters.

Whitehall, August 12. It is hereupon thought proper to give Notice, that all Letters for Port-Mahon be for the future directed by the Way of Marseilles.

Marseilles, Aug. 9. A Ship arrived here Yesterday from Port Mahon: Our Trade is now open with the Island of Minorca.

Stockholm, July 24, O. S. On Thursday the 18th of this Month the Nobles met, and came to a Resolution that the Diet should not be prorogued, but continue sitting till the most necessary Affairs were dispatched; and that then it should be dissolved and not be summoned again until the usual Time, except the King's or the Nation's Affairs required a speedier Meeting. The other Bodies of the States have consented to this Resolution. The Clergy indeed, at first, made some Difficulty, and were for the Diet's being prorogued till January: They thought by that Means to prevent a Committee's being appointed to examine into Ecclesiastical Affairs. Yesterday Sentence was pronounced against M. Daleen and Captain Prang, who were accused of having tampered with the Peasants, and of having put them upon Measures tending to introduce an Arbitrary Government here. M. Daleen is condemned to have his Head cut off, and his Body buried under the Gallows: The Captain to live upon Bread and Water for a Month, to be banished the Country, and to have his Name Stuck upon the Gallows. The Diet has this Day confirmed the Sentence.

Paris, Aug. 18. To-Morrow the Body of the late Cardinal du Bois will be interr'd in the Church of St. Honoré, with great Pomp and Solemnity: Two Cardinals are to officiate

at the Funeral; at which are to be present two Archbishops and two Bishops deputed from the Assembly of the Clergy of which his Eminency was Chief President. This Morning that Assembly will perform a solemn Service in the Church of the Grands Augustins for the said deceased Cardinal. M. de Morville begun Yesterday at Versailles to give his weekly Audiences to the Foreign Ministers.
