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Falmouth, October 16.

THe 14 instant came in here a Yarmouth Vessel from Milford, the Master speaks of many wracks he saw all along that Coast, and that another Vessel belonging to the same place, was by the violence of the weather sunk by his side. The same day imported here the *Ruth* of Plymouth from Port O Port, from whence the Master tells us, he came in Company with the *Swallow* of London a stout Merchant man, and mounted with 18 Guns, Captain *Bartchson* Commander; that off of the Rock of *Lisbonne*, they met with an *Argiers* man of War of 30 Guns, who immediately engaged the *Swallow*, and had twice boarded her, being as often bravely beaten off, when the night coming on, the Vessel lost Company, and made the best of her way home, it is hoped, that by the favor of the night, the *Swallow* may likewise have got clear of the Tulk, and be on her way home.

Burnstable, October 17. The 14 instant put into this Port by contrary winds the *John of Bristol*, laden with Trayn Oyle and Fish, together with four other Vessels of this place from the same parts, and laden with the same Commoditie.

Plymouth, October 17. Here are at present some ships in Port arrived from, or bound to several parts abroad. Yesterday the *Rupert* Frigate set sail from this Port, having several Merchant men under her Convoy for the *Streights*.

Venice, October 9. From *Ragusa* we have Letters, which wholly contradict what our advices from *Vienna* seemed to mention, of the Revolt in the Ottoman Territories being quieted; but on the contrary, that the Grand Signior, together with the Grand Visier were on their way towards *Buzia*, where the Grand Signior would continue with his Court, and the Visier proceed to joyn with the Forces that were sent before towards *Mecca*. There are other Letters which speak of a rencounter between some of those Forces and a party of the Rebels, in which the latter had been worsted, inasmuch, that several of the principal Authors of this disturbance had been taken prisoners, and were now bringing to *Constantinople*; but of this we must expect a farther certainty. From *Dalmatia* they write, that they suddenly expected there the new Plenipotentiary from the Port.

Legbarne, October 12. The 5 instant imported here the *Dragon* Frigate, Captain *Herbert* Commander from *Cadix*, having under his Convoy the *Martin* from London, and the *Leopard* from *Lisbonne*, both bound for *Venice*, together with the *Simon* and *Francois* from *Westchester*. The 9 arrived the *African* a small English Pink in 9 days from *Tunis*, where an Algerine had carried in prize a *Messina* Ship laden with Gunpowder for *Spain*; Three French men of War were then before that place, but had as yet attempted nothing upon it.

Danzicke, October 15. From *Leopol* they write, that the King arrived there the second instant, having been received near that place by 10000 Men, who were ready there to attend his Majesty in his

march towards the *Ukraine*; from whence they tell us, that the Cossacks under the Command of *Dorofensko*, finding the King so resolutely to persist in his intentions of visiting those parts, begin to loose some of their courage, and that *Dorofensko* himself, seems now to desire things may be fairly accommodated, and not brought to the last extremity; so that it is not doubted, but that the Kings presence there, will meet with the desired success of resetting those Countries in an entire Obedience to this Crown. Here are Letters this week from *Moscow*, which tell us, that the affairs of those Countries begin to have a more pleasing aspect then formerly, and that it is hoped, a short time may restore them to a general peace and quietness; though our Letters from *Vienna* continue to tell us, that the disturbance near *Mecca* is wholly appeased, and that the Forces that were sent that way, are countermanded back, yet our advices from other parts still speak the contrary, and that the disorders there increase daily.

Cologne, October 16. Some days since Monsieur *Verjus*, his most Christian Majesties Minister in these parts, delivered our Magistrates a Letter from his Master, in which his Majesty assures them of his good intentions, and of his readiness to do them all good Offices, in order to the begetting a good understanding between them and their Elector.

The Marquis de *Grana* hath lately received new Orders from the Court at *Vienna*, together with Bills of Exchange for 10000 Rycks-Dollers, for the payment of his late raised Regiment. We are told here that Colonel *Stoupe* hath obtained leave to raise two Regiments more in *Switzerland*, for the service of the Crown of *France*.

Yesterday went hence several Deputies of this Town towards *Gelderland*, where they are to meet his Excellency the Count de *Monterey*, Governor of the Spanish *Neatherlands*, to Compliment his Excellency on the part of these Magistrates, as likewise farther to confer with him, concerning the present posture of affairs; with them is likewise gone the Marquis de *Grana*, together with the Baron *Risaucourt*. The Count de *Conningsmark* raises men apace, and hath compleated several of his Troops, which he sends to quarter in *Alstria*. Several Passengers arrived from *Dorsten*, and other parts thereabouts, tell us of above 100 Wagons of Ammunition met on their way to *Dorsten* from *Keyferswaert*; it is said, as if the Bishop of *Munster* was suddenly expected at *Breuil*, to confer with the Elector of *Cologne*.

Cologne, October 20. Yesterday the Bishop of *Munster* arrived at *Herl* near *Mullem*, attended by 200 horsemen, whither the Bishop of *Strasbourg* likewise went the same day; and it is said, that our Elector is also expected there this day. Our Elector continues to buy up vast quantities of Grain, and stops all Corn which is going to Market here, which some people would look upon as an act of Hostility.

We have a report of some Troops expected here from the Spanish *Neatherlands*. Our Treaty seems now to be wholly at a stand, and no discourse but of a rupture, occasioned by the dayly gathering together the

ther of Forces in these parts; we are just now told, that the Bishop of *Munster* is expected this afternoon at *Breuil*, where there will be a Conference held between our Elector, that Bishop, the Bishop of *Straßburg*, and Monsieur *Verjus*, Agent for his most Christian Majesty in these parts.

Hague, Octob. 22. Notwithstanding the approach of the winter season, we begin to hear from abroad, of nothing but preparations for War, which occasions a discourse here, that these States are likewise about raising of more Men, having already as is said, written to the several Provinces, to have their advices therein; as also concerning the paying the Subsidies which yet remain due from this State to the Crown of *Denmark*.

We are in great expectation of the conclusion of the matter concerning the forbidding the Importation of French Wines by the States General, it being hoped, that they of *Zealand*, will at length condescend to the reiterated instances of the rest of the Provinces, and agree with them in this particular.

The interchanging of the Ratifications of the Treaty between these States and the Elector of *Cologne* concerning *la Rochette*, hath been hitherto upon some particular Reasons deferred, notwithstanding the Minister at present here on the part of that Elector, seems dayly to press them to it. The Heer *van Haren* designed Ambassador to the Crowns of *Sweden* and *Danemark*, will, as soon as his dispatches are ready, return again for *Friesland*, from whence he is to begin his journey for *Sweden*. His Highness the Prince of *Orange* is expected here in a day or two from *Zuylesteyn*.

Disso, Octob. 28. Yesterday arrived here Expresses from *Gelderland* and *Zealand*, with the consent of the States of those Provinces, in the matter concerning the French Wines, &c. so that it is now thought, this affair may be concluded in few days, in the Assembly of the States General; yesterday the Velt-Marshal *Wurtz* went hence for *Utrecht*, with intentions to be back here on Wednesday or Thursday next; Here hath been lately much discourse of new Levies, and that the States will be suddainly extraordinarily assembled thereupon; though others are of opinion, that there will not be any thing done in it, till the next Session of the States of *Holland*, which will be about the middle of the next Month.

Part of the baggage of his Highness the Prince of *Orange* is arrived here, together with some of his Servants, his Highness himself being expected here this evening. The 24 instant we are told, the *Rhyngrave* parted from *Maestricht*, and to morrow is expected here in Town. The Heer *van Haren* having received his Instructions, in order to his Embassy to *Sweden*, will part hence to morrow for *Friesland*, and thence proceed with all imaginable speed towards *Stockholme*.

At *Amsterdam* the Magistrates have given notice to the Inhabitants, of the great likelihood there was, that the matter concerning the French Wines, &c. would be in few days brought to the desired conclusion, and therefore warned them from employing any more Moneys in that Commerce.

Brussels, Octob. 23. On Tuesday last his Excellency the Count de *Monterey* parted from *Antwerp*, (where his Excellency had received the last resolution of the States assembled there, concerning the raising the 1200 thousand Gilders) for *Rurmonde* in *Gelderland*, where great preparations have been made by the Prince de *Mamnes* Governor of that Province, for his Excellencies Reception and entertainment during his stay there.

The Magistrates of *Cologne* have sent one of their Burgermasters, accompanied by the Marquis de *Grana* thither, to meet his Excellency at his arrival there, with the Compliments of that Town, as likewise with instructions to discourse with his Excellency, concerning the affairs of those parts of the *Rhine*.

The Sieur *Massette* Governor of *Enguien* is still here, forbearing, as is said, to return to his Government as yet, by reason of what hath lately passed between him and the Governor of *Ath*. It is said, that his Excellency will upon his return from *Gelderland*, give out Commissions for the raising 10,000 Walloons, as also some Troops of Dragoons; besides which we are told, of 5000 Spaniards and 3000 Italians, that are raising in *Spain* and *Italy*, for the service of these Countries. We speak here of 3000 Men which lyeready to march upon the first orders towards *Cologne*, for the assistance of that place, in case of necessity.

Paris, Octob. 24. From *Porto Ferina* we have advice, that the Chevalier de *Tourville*, Commander of one of the Kings men of War, arriving through contrary winds on his return from *Malthe* before *Souzza*, where there were then in Port 12, Turkish Vessels, had attempted to burne them in the night, which he endeavored to effect, by arming out two Boats (as being unwilling to hazard the Kings ship in this exploit, in respect of the great danger to which this enterprise must necessarily have exposed it) on which he went in person, and by the favor of the night got into the Port, according as he had designed, where notwithstanding the warm Salutes he received from the Enemies great Guns, as well from on shoar, as from on board the Ships, he boarded a Polack, which after having made himself Master of, and set on fire, he returned with his men, together with some Slaves he had taken to his Boats, not doubting but the Flames of this would likewise have reacht the other Vessels which lay near her, and involved them in the same ruine; but by the assistance of an *Algerine*, which rid close to her, the Fire was quenched, contrary to all expectation, to the miscarriage of the design.

From *Nancy* they write, that the 17 instant the Marechal de *Crequi* arrived there from the Camp at *Bouffonville*, in order to the disposing of his Troops into their winter quarters, according to the directions he had received from hence to that purpose.

Whitehall, Octob. 21. Yesterday in the afternoon His Majesty, accompanied by his Royal Highness, and attended by several of the principal of the Nobility and other persons of quality of His Court, returned hither from *Newmarket*.
