MR. Chamberlaine, the British Consul here, having represented to our Viceroy at Palermo, that at Leghorne and Naples all Ships coming directly from Great Britain, are admitted to free Pratick, in the same Manner as before the Plague happened in France; has obtained an Order, that all Ships from Great Britain shall be admitted into any Port of this Kingdom as formerly: And three English Ships now in this Port, laden with Woollen Goods and other Merchandize for the Fair here, which began Yesterday, are the first that enjoy this Benefit.

Hague, Sept. 10, N. S. Rear-Admiral Godin, of the Admiralty of Zealand, is nominated by the States General to command the Squadron which is to sail the End of this Month for the Mediterranean. The States General have passed a Resolution to send an Ambassador to the Court of Spain, for which Employment the States of the Province of Holland have proposed M. Vander Meer, who 'tis believed will be approved by their High Mightinesses.
