

Satisfaction which still continues upon other scores between these Princes; in the interim the Letters from the *Ukraine*, seem every day more and more to call for the King to come immediately in the head of what Forces he can get together, into those parts, by telling him how the Rebel Cossacks loose heart daily; fearing the severe usage they may well expect from the Forces of this Crown.

*Ditto*. Some Passengers arrived lately from *Led-foo*; tell us, that the King was still there, conferring with the principal Officers of his Army, concerning his march into the *Ukraine*, but that the many Factions which still are in that Senate, daily start so many difficulties, that no one thing can be agreed on; insomuch, that it is feared, that at present all, there will be hardly any thing done this year in the *Ukraine*, especially considering the winter season is so near at hand, that the Soldiers begin to think of their winter quarters. The King hath appointed a Dyet to be held at *Warsaw* the second of *January* next.

*Hamburg*, *Octob. 16*. From *Westphalia* they continue to tell us, of the Leavies that are making in many parts, by Commissions from the Dukes of *Lunenburgh*, as likewise from the Bishop of *Munster*, who we hear, is lately gone for *Bonne*, to discourse more particularly with the Elector of *Cologne*, concerning the affairs of the Empire; it is hoped he may with his presence much forward the Treaty between that Town and the Elector, if his intentions are really what some would willingly believe.

*Venice*, *Octob. 16*. On Sunday last went hence, Provost General *Vallier* towards *Corfu*, in which Government he succeeds General *Bernardo*, who upon his arrival there, will return upon the same Gallies, hither. From *Dalmatia* they write, that the Turks were making all needful preparations for the reception of the new Bassa of *Rosnia*, Plenipotentiary on the part of the Grand Signior, for the regulating the matter of the Limits with this Republick, whom they now very suddenly expect to arrive there; the Grand Signior being willing this affair may after the long delay it hath met with, be determined with all imaginable speed.

*Cologne*, *Octob. 23*. The 20 instant the Bishop of *Munster*, went from *Hert* to *Saxenrick* near *Bren-til*, and about a League from this place, the 21 the Marquis de *Grana* went likewise thither, as did the next day one of our Burgermasters, accompanied with the Heer of *Ammerongen*, Envoy from the States General of the United Provinces, conveyed by a party of Horse of Colonel *Bampfields* Regiment, and this day they returned again from thence. Our Elector, by putting Men into all the places near us, as if he had intentions to block us up. We talk here, of some *Lorraine*, which are coming down hither.

*Ditto*. The Bishop of *Munster* and Bishop of *Strasburgh* have daily conferences, as they tell us in order to the accommodating the differences with our Elector, the Marquis de *Grana*, who in secret respects, as was said, with the Deputies of this Town, to complement his Excellency the Count de *Nerrey* Governor of the *Spain* in *Nassau* and at his arrival at *Rurmonde* in *Germany*, hath been in conference with that Bishop, since his arrival in these parts concerning the affairs of this Town.

The Deputies from the Circle of *Westphalia* continue here, and have daily meetings as well concerning *Ammer*, and other differences, still depending between the Duke of *Wolfenbuttel* and the Bishop of *Munster*, as those that relate to this place.

*Hague*, *Octob. 30*. Since the arrival of the con-

sent of the Province of *Zealand*, for the forbidding the Importation of French Wines, &c. we are in daily expectation of the final conclusion of this affair, in the Assembly of the States General. The 28 instant his Highness the Prince of *Orange* returned hither from *Zuylycseyd*, and was some hours after in the Assembly of the Council of State. The Heer *Rhyngrave* is likewise here from *Maastricht*. The Ambassador de *Haren* is going within a day or two at farthest for *Friesland*, but so, as to be back here, before he set forward on his Embassy to *Sweden*.

The 26 instant about ten at night, was fought a Duel in the *Pell Mail* here by Torch light, between the Heer *vander Myle*, and the Count de *Warsufe* on one side, and the Counts de *Dona*, two Brothers, on the other, in which the Heer *vander Myle* was desperately wounded, insomuch, that it is feared, he will hardly recover; the others concerned in this action are since fled.

It is reported that the *Sieur Canon* is coming hither on the part of the Duke of *Lorraine*, what his errand may be, is not yet said; The Velt Marshal *Wurts* is returned hither from *Utrecht*. From *Cologne* they write, that those parts fill apace with Soldiers; that the Bishop of *Munster* is still at *Kendernich* near *Brenil*, and that after all, it is much feared, the endeavors for an accommodation will have but little effect.

*Brussels*, *Octob. 28*. The 23 instant his Excellency the Count de *Monteroy* was at *Rurmonde*, from whence he intends for *Limburgh*, &c. and is expected here again, about the fourth of the next Month, when it is thought, the Commissions for the New Leavies may be given out.

*Paris*, *Octob. 28*. We had some time since a hot report here of several French men of War lost in the South Sea, which is now contradicted, as a very improbable story, in regard we have advice of Monsieur de *Hayes* being sick at *Madagascar*, the onely Squadron we have abroad beyond the Line. Our Letters from *Alexppo* speak the disturbance in *Arabia*, not so great as we have it from other hands.

*Plymouth*, *Octob. 22*. This day arrived here the *Flying Falcon* of *Amsterdam*, from whence she went the first of *January*, in the Year 1669 upon discovery; the Master (who is himself very sick, having in this voyage lost 18 Men of 21, which he carried out, but had the good luck to meet with some men abroad) tells us, that he was 50 Degrees Southward, that he made the *Maine Land*, and discovered two Islands in the South Sea, on which were men of an extraordinary stature, being 11 foot in height, and all hairy; that he hath sailed out and home 12 thousand nine hundred Dutch Leagues, &c.
