

Charlottenburg, Oct. 9, N. S. The King of Great Britain set out the 7th Instant from Herrenhausen, and arrived at Spandau Yesterday about Six in the Evening. His Majesty was received there with the proper Honours, the Garrison being on this Occasion under Arms, and the Cannon of the Town and Citadel being thrice discharged: From Spandau His Majesty, attended by the Lord Viscount Townshend and the Lord Carteret who were got thither before, and by other Persons of Distinction, proceeded to this Place, without going to Berlin, which is about a League distant from hence. His Majesty was received here by the King and Queen of Prussia with all imaginable Demonstrations of Respect and Affection, their Prussian Majesties being accompanied by the Prince Royal and the four young Princesses, the two Margraves Albert and Christian Ludwig his Prussian Majesty's Uncles, the Margravine Widow of the late Margrave Philip, and the Margravine Consort to Margrave Albert. - A very splendid Entertainment was prepared for His Britannick Majesty, who sat at Table between the King and Queen of Prussia, the Princes and Princesses of the Prussian Family being at the same Table, as were also the Lords Townshend and Carteret, and several other Persons of eminent Rank. The Room was crowded with the Ladies of the Court, and other Persons of Distinction, richly dressed. The Diversions of the Evening were a little interrupted, by His Britannick Majesty's being taken with a sudden Indisposition towards the End of Supper, which was imputed to the Heat of the Room occasioned by so much Company, and to His Majesty's having travelled that Day 18 German Miles, which is reckoned about 100 English, without taking any Refreshment. But this Indisposition went off so soon, that it did not hinder His Majesty from going with the Company to the Drawing-Room, leading the Queen of Prussia. His Majesty having had a very good Night's Rest, and finding himself perfectly recovered, walked in the Gardens a long time this Morning with the King of Prussia, and afterwards dined in Publick. His Majesty's Reception and Entertainment by this Court, is with the greatest Magnificence and with all possible Demonstrations of Joy.
