The affairs of Cologne are dayly more and more embroiled; they tell us from thence, of 4 Regiments that are coming down out of Bavaria, to joyn with the rest of their Electors Forces; they likewise speak of some French Troops that were marching that way under the Command of Monsieur de Chamilly.
