Falmouth, October 25.

THe 23 instant imported here the *Falcon Frigate* from the *Streights*, from whence she came with about 24 Sayl of Merchant men under her Convoy, five of which were bound from *Scanderone* and *Smirna*, viz. the *London*, the *Mary* and *Martha*, the *Levant*, the *Speedwell*, and the *Pearle*, and the rest from other places in the *Streights*; the *Dragon* lost Company of this Fleet the 22 instant, off the Northern Cape in bad weather; since we hear that the *Speedwell* was on Munday last driven ashore near the *Lizard*, the best part of the Goods having been saved, though most of the men endeavoring to save the Ship, and others to get ashore, were unfortunately drowned; we are likewise told, of a *Newfoundland* man lost near the *Lizzard*, all her men, having had near 70 on board, excepting eight, having perished together with the ship.

Plymouth, Octob. 27. The *Rupert Frigate*, who sailed out of this Port the 17 instant for the *Streights*, having met with much fowle weather, and being somewhat disabed thereby, is returned hither with several of his Convoys. The 24 arrived here the *Fortunate Mary* of *London* bound for *Burdeaux*, together with some other Merchant men bound for several parts abroad.

Waymouth, Octob. 28. There is arrived in *Portland Road* a very considerable Merchant man of above 7 hundred Tuns, bound from *Holland* to the *East Indies*; they have besides their Company of Seamen near 200 Soldiers aboard to be left in those parts; the Master says, that he is to be suddainly followed by five or six more manned in the same manner.

Madrid, Octob. 14. Here is lately dead Don *Louis de Antequera*, one of the Kings Priests, and Confessor to the Queen Regent, in whose place her Majesty hath made choice of Father *Iuan Martin*, of the Order of *St. Dominico*, and formerly Confessor to the late King *Philip* the Fourth.

From *Cadiz* they write, that the Gallions designed for the *West Indies*, would not part thence till *December* or *January* next; that Don *Joseph Centeno y Ordonnes*, General of the last *New Spaine* Fleet is still kept in Custody there by the Queens Order.

By an Expsels from *Barcelona* we have advice, that the Duke de *Sessa* Vice-Roy of *Catalonia* was extreem ill, inasmuch as they did much despair of his recovery.

Florence, Octob. 19. The Cardinals *Chigy* and *Rospigliosi* continue still at *Siens*, where there are likewise lately arrived the Cardinals *Bichi* and *Corsini*. The Cardinal *Leopold de Medicis* mends apace, and gives great hopes of a speedy recovery. The *Abbe Gondi* is gone for *France*, in quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Great Duke to his most Christian Majesty.

From *Turin* they write, that the Duke of *Savoye* continues still at *Moncalier*, and that besides the Levies for Horse, his Highness hath permitted the

raising a Regiment of Foot for his most Christian Majesties service within his Territories, to consist of 400 Men, one hundred of which, is, as is said, to be drawn out of his Highness his own Guards.

Rome, Octob. 19. This Court seems somewhat dissatisfied with the Republick of *Venice*, in that they have obliged the Colledge of Jesuits at *Venice*, to attend the Duke, as the other Religious Orders do on all publick occasions, contrary to what hath been ever practised in other places; which they have, as is said, kept hitherto from his Holiness knowledge, as fearing he would be much displeas'd at it.

The Spanish Ambassador omits nothing which may in any ways advance the promotion of Father *Nizard* to be Cardinal, which affair, it is said, he must accomplish, before he can depart for his Government of *Naples*; in the mean time the Bishop of *Laon* continues likewise his instances to be publicly declared Cardinal, which this Government seem unwilling to do, till they can also gratify the House of *Austria* in their pretences.

Brussels, Octob. 20. His Excellency is now upon his return from *Gelderland*: on Tuesday night he lodged at *Vento*, where the Deputies of the City of *Cologne* waited on him, who were received very kindly, and dismissed as is said, much to their satisfaction. At *Vento* the Duke de *villa Hermosa* parted from his Excellency and went for *Holland*: out of curiosity, as is given out, to see those Provinces; we are told of Deputies who likewise met his Excellency on his journey from the City of *Liege*; desiring his Excellencies protection, in case their Prince should attempt any thing against them. Yesterday his Excellency was at *Leeuwe*, where he gave orders for the finishing that Cittadel; and in a day or two is expected here.

It is said, that he has given order for the Regiment of Horse of the Prince of *Baden*, and a Regiment of Foot to march towards *Cologne*, for the reinforcement of that Garrison, in case of any suddain accident. The Bishop of *Munster* is raising of Men, and will have very suddainly a considerable Body together; we discourse much here of some French Forces drawing down towards *Cologne*.

We are told of a great summe of Money lately returned to his Excellency from *Spaine* by the way of *Antwerp*, and that we shall have an Army of 40000 Men on foot in these Countries in the Spring.

Genova, Octob. 21. The 17 instant arrived here the *Dragon Frigate* from *Leghorne*, and may sayl again in a day or two, with the *Viner Merchant* man under her Convoy. This Senate hath not as yet consented to the French Levies, though they are much pressed to it.

Dantzicke, Octob. 24. Our last Letters of the 10 instant from *Lemburgh* tell us, that the King continued still there, having lately had advice of the great success of his affairs in the *Ukraine*, even beyond hope and expectation, the very report of the approach of the Polish Army into those parts, having occasioned such a terror amongst the Rebel *Cossacks*, as to leave them destitute of any resolution, in order to their defence: That *Hanenko*, who hath hitherto adhered

adhered to this Crown, was thereupon marched with the Cossacks under his Command towards *Bi-allagrod*, which place he had taken by Storme, and fallen into the Quarters of those Tartars, who have of late so much infested this Kingdom, and taken from them some Thousands of Horse and Cattle, so, as to leave them utterly disabled from attempting any thing of the like nature, (at least) for some time; that *Uman* with several Towns and Castles have submitted to him; that for the farther prosecuting this success, he had desired the Crown Generals to joyn with him, who accordingly were advanced towards *Barre*, and in their way had *Nischolow* and *Breslaw* surrendered to them; the instant they were to joyn, and then intended to march for *Czerkyn*, whither *Dorofensko* is retreated, though without much hopes of being able to resist the Forces of this Crown; his Men daily forsaking his service; so that we are full of hopes to see suddenly those Countries finally reduced.

Hamburg, Octob. 30. From *Stockholme* we have advice, of the arrival there of Mr. *Coventry*, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Brittain*; and that the Baron *Sparre* designed from thence in the same quality to the Court of *England*, may in a short time be ready for his departure for that Embassy; that Monsieur *Pompono* was in daily expectation of the arrival of Monsieur *Courtin*, to succeed him as Ambassador from the Crown of *France*, in order to his return home.

Hague, Novemb. 4. The States General having at length upon the receipt of the consent of the Province of *Groeningen* in the matter of the French Wines, come to a resolution in that affair, having published a Placaet to this effect; That they forbid all persons whatsoever to import, after the publication of the said Placaet, which is to be the 11. of this Month, in all places within the Territories of the seven Provinces, whither by Sea or Land, any French Wines, Vinegar, Canvas, Paper or Chestnuts, on forfeiture of the said Wine, Vinegar, &c. so imported or brought into any place within the Dominion of these States; likewise a penalty of 600. Guilders for every piece of French Wine, or pack of Paper, Canvas, &c. imported contrary to this Placaet; farther forbidding all Masters of Vessels, Carriers, &c. to bring any French Wine, Vinegar, &c. in their Vessels or Waggon, into the Dominion of these States; on forfeiture of 100. Guilders for every piece of Wine, &c. pack of Paper or Canvas so brought in. And whereas there may be at present remaining in Merchants hands, great quantities of French Wine, Vinegar, &c. the States General have thought fit to permit the selling and disposing of any French Wines, Vinegar, &c. already imported, till the last day of *April* next, in the Year 1672 inclusive. Farther willing that it be free for all French Wines, Vinegar, &c. which shall arrive in any Port of these Countries, within six weeks after the publication hereof, that is, till the 23. of *December* next, to be exported again into any Forreign parts without any molestation, provided the Merchant do not land or bring ashore any of the French Wines, Vinegar, &c. which shall so arrive under penalty as above is.

London, Octob. 30.

The City and all its publick Buildings being by His Majesties especial Favor and Influence, recovered out of the late deplorable Ruines, to a condition of greater Beauty and Splendor then before, presumed to offer an Invitation to their Majesties, to Honor their Feast at the *Guildhall* on the Lord Mayors day; which their Majesties received very gratefully, and accordingly this being the Lord

Mayors day, His Majesty was pleased from His Palace of *Whitehall*, to see the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs, followed by the Masters, Wardens, and Liveries of the Companies, and other Attendants in their several Barges, set out with Banners, Streamers, Colours, Escutcheons, and other usual Ornaments, in their passage on the *Thames* to *Westminster*, not without remarkable signs of a gracious regard & favor to them as they rowed by *Whitehal*.

Their Majesties were farther pleased to Honor the City with their Royal presence, first at the Show in *Chapside*, (sitting in a Balcony under a Canopy of State, near the Standard till the whole Cavalcade were passed) and afterwards in the *Guildhall* at Dinner. Their Majesties coming accompanied by his Royall Highness the Duke of *Tork*, and his Highness Prince *Rupert*, and attended by many principal Lords, and Ladies of Honor, and a great Retinue of the Court. Their Majesties, with the Duke of *Tork*, the Lady *Mary* and the Lady *Anne*, daughters to his Royal Highness, Prince *Rupert*, and many of the Great Ladies, Dined at a Table raised upon the Hurlings at the East end of the Hall; the Forreign Ambassadors, the Lords of the Council, and others of the Peerage and Nobility at the two next Tables raised on each side of the Hall.

The rest of the Hall was ordered as is usual on this Solemnity, The Aldermen dining at a Table raised at the West end of the Hall, and the Citizens of the Liveries at several Tables, which filled the whole Body of the Hall. The Lords Chief Justices, Lord Chief Baron, Mr. Attorney and Solicitor General, the rest of the Justices of both Benches, and Barons of the *Exchequer*, and all the Sergeants at Law, habited in their Scarlet Gowns, in the Old Council Chamber. The Aldermens Ladies and other Ladies and Gentlewomen that were invited, at several Tables raised in the Mayors Court, and the rest that could not have place there, at several other Tables upon a descent on each side in the same Room. All the rest of the Rooms (except the Council Chamber and Gallery; which were kept for withdrawing) were filled with Tables for Knights, Gentlemen and other Guests, and for the Gentlemen and Attendants of Noblemen, &c.

The Lord Mayor beginning the several Healths of His Majesty, the Queen, and Duke of *Tork*, the whole Hall was filled with Shows and Acclamations at the naming of every Health.

The whole Service was managed with as good order, quiet and decency, as the Place and Number of people could possibly admit; and nothing omitted by the City, that might express their duty to their Majesties, and the humble sence they had particularly of this Gracious condescension.

Before Dinner His Majesty was pleased to conferr the Honor of Knighthood upon those well-deserving Gentlemen, *Jonathan Daves*, and *Robert Claytons* Esquires, the present Sheriffs, and returned in the Evening to *Whitehall*, extremely pleased at the great Respects with which the City received the Honor of His Presence; which was accompanied with the universal Joy and Acclamations of the People, who had on this Occasion thronged all the Streets where their Majesties passed, in most incredible Numbers.
