Falmouth, October 25.

He 23 inftant imported here the Falcon Frigat from the Streights, from whence the came with about 24 Sayl of Merchant men under her Convoy, five of which were bound from Scanderone and Smirna, vi?. the London, the Mary and Martha, the Levant, the Speedwell, and the Pearle, and the reft from other places in the Streights; the Dragon loft Company of this Fleet the 22 inftant, off the Northern Cape in bad weather; fince we hear that the Speedwell was on Munday laft driven alhoar near the Lizard, the beft part of the Goods having been faved, though molt of the men endeavoring to favethe Ship, and others to get afhoar, were unforunately drawned; we are likewife told, of a Newfoundland man loft near the Lizzard, all her men, having had near 70 on board, excepting eight, ha-y ving perifhed together with the fhip.

ving perished together with the ship. Plymouth, Octob. 27. The Rupert Frigat, who say-, led out of this Port the 17 instant for the Streights, having met with much fowle weather, and being somewhat disabled thereby, is returned hither with several of his Convoys. The 24 arrived here the Fortunate Mary of London bound for Burdeaux, together with some other Merchant men bound for several parts abroad.

Waymouth, Octob. 28. There is arrived in Portland Road a very confiderable Merchant man of above 7 hundred Tuns, bound from Holland to the Eaft Indies; they have besides their Company of Seamen near 200 Soldiers aboard to be left in those parts; the Master says, that he is to be suddainly followed by five or fix more manned in the same manner.

Madrid, Octob. 14. Here is lately dead Don Louis de Antequera, one of the Kings Priefts, and Confessor to the Queen Regent; in whose place her Majesty hath made choice of Father Iuan Martines, of the Order of St. Dominico, and formerly Confessor to the late King Philip the Fourth.

From Cadiz they write, that the Galions defigned for the. West Indics, would not part thence till December or fanuary next; that Don foseph Centeno y Ordonnes, General of the last New Spaine Fleet is still kept in Custody there by the Queens Order.

By an Expsels from Barcellona we have advice, that the Duke de Seffa Vice-Roy of Catalonia was extream ill, infomuch as they did much despair of his recovery.

Florence, Octob. 19. The Cardinals Chigy and Rospigliofi continue still at Siena, where there are likewile lately arrived the Cardinals Bichi and Corfini. The Cardinal Leopold de Medicis mends apace, and gives great hopes of a speedy recovery. The Abbe Gondi is gone for France, in quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Great Duke to his most Christian Majesty.

From Turin they write, that the Duke of Savoye continues still at Moncalier, and that besides the Leavies for Horse, his Highnels hath permitted the

railing a Regiment of Foot for his most Christian Mar jesties service within his Territories, to consist of 400 Men, one hundred of which, is, as is said, to be drawn out of his Highness his own Guards.

Rome, October 19. This Court feems fome, what diffatisfied with the Republick of Venice, in that they have obliged the Colledge of Jeluits at Venice, to attend the Duke, as the other Religious Orders do on all publick occasions, contrary to what hath been ever practifed in other places; which they have, as is faid, kept hitherto from his Holinets knowledge, as fearing he would be much dilpleafed at it.

The Spanish Ambassador omits nothing which may in in any ways advance the promotion of Father Navitard to be Cardinal, which affair, it is faid 3 he must accomplish, before he can depart for his Gory vernment of Naples; in the mean time the Bishop of Laon continues likewise his instances to be publickly declared Cardinal, which this Government feem unwilling to do, till they can also gratify the House of Austria in their pretences.

Bruffels, Ottob. 20. His Excellency is now upon r his return from Gclderland: on Tuesday night he lodged at Venlo, where the Deputies of the City, of Gologne waited on him, who were received very kindly, and difmiffed as is faid, much to their fatisfaction. At Venlo the Duke de villa Hermofa parted from his Excellency and went for Holland, r out of curiofity, as is given out, to fee those Provinces, we are told of Deputies who likewife met his Excellency on his journey from the City of Lieged defiring his Excellencies protection, in cafe their Prince fhould attempt any thing against thera. Yefterday his Excellency was at Leeuwe, where he gave orders for the finishing that Cittadel, and in z day or two is expected here.

It is faid, that he has given order for the Regiment of Horfe of the Prince of Baden, and a Regiment of Foot to march towards Cologne, for the reinforcement of that Garrison, in case of any suddain accident. The Bishop of Munster is raising of Men, and will have very suddainly a considerable Body together; we discourse much here of some French Forces drawing down towards Cologne.

We are told of a great fumme of Money lately returned to his Excellency from Spaine by the way of Antwerp, and that we shall have an Army of 40000 Men on foot in these Countries in the Spring.

Genoua, Octob. 21. The 17 inftant arrived here the Dragon Frigat from Leghorne, and may fayl again in a day or two, with the Viner Merchant man under her Convoy. This Senate hath not as yet confented to the French Leavies, though they are much preffed to it.

Dantzicke, Ottob. 24. Our last Letters of the to instant from Lemburgb tell us, that the King continued fill there, having lately had advice of the great success of his affairs in the Ukraine, even beyond hope and expectation, the very report of the approach of the Polish Army into those parts, having occasioned such a terror amongs the Rebel Coslacks, as to leave them destitute of any resolution, in order to their defence: That Hanenke, who bath hitherto.

adhered to this Grown, was thereupon marched with the Collacks under his Command towards Biallagrod, which place he had taken by forme, and fallen into the Quarters of those Tartars, who, have of late to much infefted this Kingdom, and, taken from them fome Thousands of Norie and Cattle, fo, as to leave them utterly difabled from attempting anything of the like nature, (at leaft) for fome time; that *Hman* with feveral Towns and Caftles have submitted to him; that for the farther profecuting this fucces, he had defired the Crown Generals to joyn with him, who accordingly were advanced towards Barrie, and in their way had Nicholow and Bre flaw furrendred to them'; the f instant they were to joyn, and then intended to march for Czekryn, whither Dorofensko is retreated, though without much hopes of being able to relift the Forces of this Crown, his Mendayly forfaking his fervice; fo that we are full of hopes to fee fuddainly zhofe Countries finally reduced.

Hamburgh, Offob. 30. From Stockholme we have advice, of the arrival there of Mr. Coventry, Amu bassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great ' Britaine; and that the Baron Sparrdesigned from thence in the same quality to the Court of England, may in a short time be ready for his departure for that Embaffy; that Monsieur Pompone was in dayly expectation of the arrival of Monsieur Courtin, to fucceed him as Ambassador from the Crown of Fhance, in order to his return home.

Hague, Novemb. 4. The States General having 'at length upon the receipt of the confent of the Pro vince of Groeningen in the matter of the French Wines, come to a refolution in that affair, having published a Placaet to this effect, That they forbid all persons whatsever to import, after the publicazion of the faid Placaet, which is to be the II. of this Month, in all places within the Territories of the feven Provinces, whither by Sea or Land, any French Wines, Vinegar, Canvas, Paper or Chefnuts, on forfeiture of the Taid Wine, Vineger, &c. fo im-ported or brought into any place within the Dominion of these States ; likewile a penalty of 600: Gilders for every piece of French Wine , or pack of Paper, Canvas, Gt. imported contrary to this Pla-caet; farther forbidding all Masters of Vessels, Carriers, Gc. to bring any French Wine, Vineger, Or. in their Vellels or Waggons, into the Dominion of these States; on forseiture of Too Gilders for every piece of Wine, Ge. pack of Paper or Canvas fo brought in. And whereas there may be at prefent remaining in Merchants bands, great quantities of French Wine, Vineger, Gc. the States General have thought fit to permit the felling and disposing of any French Wines, Vineger, Gr., already imported, till the last day of April next, in the Year 1672 inclufive. Farther willing that it be free for all French Wines, Vineger, Ge. which shall arrive in any Port of these Countries, within fix weeks after the publication hereof, that is, till the 23 of December next, to be exported again into any Forreign parts without any moleftation, provided the Merchant do not land or bring ashoar any of the French Wines, Vineger, Oc. which shall fo arrive under penalty as above 15.

London, Octob. 30. The City and all its publick Buildings being by His Majefties especial Favor and Influence, recovered out of the late deplorable Ruines, to a condizion of greater Beauty and Splendor then before, presumed to offer an Invitation to their Majesties, to Honor their Peast ar the Guildhall on the Lord Mayors day; which their Majesties received very gratiously, and accordingly this being the Lord

Mayors day, His Majesty was pleased from His Palace of Whitehall, to fee the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs, followed by the Masters, Wardens, and Liveries of the Companies, and other Atten-Hants in their feveral Barges, fet out with Banners, Streamers, Colours, Efeocheons, and other usual Ornaments, in their passage on the Thames to Westminster, not without remarkable signs of a gratious regard &'favor to them as they rowed by Whitehal.

Their Majesties were farther pleased to Honor the ity with their Royal prefence, first at the Show in beapfide, (fitting in a Balcony under a Canopy of Sate, near the Standard till the whole Cavalcade were paffed) and afterwards in the Guildball at Dinner. Their Majeflies coming accompanied by his Royall Highness the Duke of Tork, and his Highness Prince. Rapert, and attended by many principal Lords, and Ladies of Honor, and a great Retinue of the Court. Their Majeflies, with the Duke of Tork, the Lady Mary and the Lady Anne, daughters to his Royal Highnels, Prince Rupers, and many of the Great Ladies, Dined at à Table raifed upon the Huftings at the East end of the Hall; the Forreign Amballadors, the Lords of the Couricel, and others of the Peerage and Nobility at the two next Tables raised on each fide of the Hall.

The reft of the Hall was ordered as is usual on this Solemhity, The Aldermen dining at a Table railed at the Welf end of the Hall, and the Citizens of the Liveries at leveral Tables, which filled the whole Body of the Hall. The Lords Chief Justices, Lord Chief Baron, Mr. Attorney and Sollicitor General, the reft of the Juffices of both Benches, and Barons of the Exchequer, and all the Sergeants at Law, habited in their Starlet Gowns, in the Old Council Chamber. The Aldermens Ladies and other Ladies and Gentlewomen that were invited, at feveral Tables raifed in the Mayors Court, and the reft that could not have place there, at feveral other Tablesupon a descent on each fide in the fame Room. All the rest of the Rooms (except the Council Chamber and Gallery; which were kept for withdraw-ing) were filled with Tables for Knights, Gentlemen and other Guests, and for the Gentlemen and Attendants of Noblemen, Ge.

The Lord Mayor beginning the feveral Healths of His Majefty's the Queen, and Duke of Tork, the whole Hall was filled with Showts and Acclamations at the naming of every Health.

The whole Service was managed with as good order, quiet and decency, as the Place and Number of people could possibly admit; and nothing omitted by the City, that might express their duty to their Majefties, and the humble fence they had particularly of this Gracious condescension.

Before Dinner His Majefty was pleased to conferr the Honor of Knighthood upon those well-deferving Gentlemen, Jonathan Dames, and Robert Glayton, Esquires, the present Sheriffs, and returned in the Evening to Whitehall, extremely pleafed at the great Respects with which the City received the Honor of His Presence; which was accompanied with the universal Joy and Acclamations of the People, who had on this Occasion thronged all the Streets where their Majesties passed, in most incredible Numbers.
