ON the 12th Instant in the Evening, Mr. Stanhope, the British Ambassadour, returned hither from Arnedillo, where he had been some Weeks to use the Waters for his Health, and has found great Benefit by them. On the 14th, his Excellency receiving Dispatches by a Cabinet Courier from Paris, went to the King at St. Ildefonso, and delivered to his Majesty the Draughts of the Investitures of Tuscany, Parma, and Placentia, as agreed to by the Emperour in the Form desired by this Court. The same Courier has been sent back with his Catholick Majesty's Approbation of those Draughts.

Lisbon, Nov. 27, N. S. On the 20th Instant, the Victoria, a Portuguese Man of War that sailed from hence about three Weeks ago to guard the Coast, brought in an Algerine Cruiser of 26 Guns, 10 Patereroes, and 250 Men, which she took the 13th 40 Leagues to the Westward of Cape Mondego, after an Engagement in which 26 of the Algerians were killed, and 6 wounded, with the Loss on our Side of 2 Men killed, and 6 wounded. On board were found 19 Christians of several Nations, four of whom are Portuguese; the Moors taken in her have been since put into the Gallies here. His Portuguese Majesty found himself out of Order the 18th and 19th Instant; his Indisposition was thought Aguish, but the Fit had no Return, and he is now perfectly recovered. The Sickness here, God be thanked, grows daily less; and the melancholly Apprehensions People have been under on that Account, are passed. The Day is not yet fixed for the Publick Entry of the Spanish Ambassadour, though the House in which his Excellency is to be entertained upon that Occasion is already prepared for his Reception Yesterday His Britannick Majesty's Ships the Deptford and Solebay arrived in this Harbour from Newfoundland: They parted with the Dover the Day before, who went for Cadiz.

Hanover, Dec 7, N. S. His Majesty has declared His Intention to set out on His Return to England the 16th Instant. The Marquess of Caernarvon went away the 5th, and the Marquess of Blanford set out to Day, for Holland.
