Ome Weeks ago arrived in this Port 2 Imperial Men of War of 70Guns each, with three Merchant Ships under their Convoy: The latter belong to a Company for Commerce lately formed at Tricke in the Empetour's Dominions on the Adriatick, and were laden with Plank, a small Quantity of Iron and Steel manufactured, some Italian Silks, and about 800 Bags of Rice; and if they find the Market answer, they propose to settle a regular Trade with this Kingdom. They were a long Time on their Voyage, having lain at Messina 40 Days; they likewsse touched at Naples, where the two Men of War joined them. These two Men of War were built at Naples, and are fine sout Ships; two of the Merchant Ships were built at Triefte, and the other bought of the Venetians. These Trading-Ships mest with but indifferent Encouragement here; their Plank and Part of their Iron they have fold to the King of Portugal's Yards; but the rest of their Cargoes remains yet unfold. from Cadiz of the 16th Instant, advise, that the Harvest in the Province of Andalousia proving short of what was expected, the Governour of Cadiz (for preventing Inconvenien-cies which might happen for want of Bread) had iffued ftrict Ordere, that the Foreignere as well as Natives reliding in that City, should provide themselves forthwith with sufficient Quantities of Wheat for the Ule of their Families.

Hague, Dec. 10, N. S. Advice being come from Hanover, that the King of Great Britain defigns to fet out from thence the 16th Inftant, in order to imbark for England on His Majefty's Yacht the Carolina, now lying with the other Royal Yachte and Convoy at Helvoetfluye; the States have given Directions for

Guards to be disposed at proper Stations, to attend His Majesty from Delden in His Jontney down to the Coast.
