The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.
His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased
to appoint *John Skipp, Esq;* Sheriff of the
County of Warwick.

St James's, Feb. 3. His Majesty has been
pleased to appoint his Grace the Duke of Ancas-
ter to be Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotulo-
rum of the County of Lincoln, and of the City
of Lincoln and County of the same.

Cadix, Jan. 11, N. S. The Galleons for
New Spain sailed from hence some Days ago,
under the Convoy of two Men of War of 64
Guns each and two Frigates commanded by
the Marquess Grillo, having on board the Vice-
roy of Peru, a Bishop, and several Officers.
Three Men of War and two Frigates are fit-
ting out here, to cruise against the Algerines,
under the Command of the Marquess Mari.

Turin, Feb. 2, N. S. On the 13th past died
the Count de la Roque, Knight of the Annon-
ciada, Lieutenant General, Governour of this
Citadel, Steward of the Household to Madame
Royale, &c. in the 63d Year of his Age: He
had distinguished himself by his Bravery in
the late Wars, had great Abilities and Accom-
plishments, and is generally lamented. On
the 15th his Body was carried in Funeral Pro-
cession from the Citadel, to be deposited in the
Church of the Convent of the Augustins; a
Number of Priests and Orphans singing, the
Servants of all the Knights of the Annonciada
carrying Torches, the Artillery Company with
three Pieces of Cannon, and a Battallion of
the Guards, giving their Attendance. The

King has been pleased to bestow a Com-
manderie possessed by the late Count de la
Roque on the present Count his Son: It is
worth 6000 Livres of Piemont yearly. And
the Baron de St. Remi Palavicini Major Ge-
neral has obtained the Government of this Ci-
tadel, vacant by the Death of the said Count:
But the Office of Steward of the Household to
Madame Royale, is not yet disposed of. The
Small-Pox and Measles are rife here: Several
Persons of Quality who have those Distempers
in their Families, forbear coming to Court, on
account of the Duke d'Aouffe. On the 24th
past his Sardinian Majesty declared the Offi-
cers, and appointed the Detachments from se-
veral Regiments to be embarked on board the
Gallics in the Spring at Villa-Franca, in order
to relieve the present Garrisons in the Island
of Sardinia: The whole Number amounts
to about 1500 Men, and is to be comman-
ded by the Marquess de Suza as Colonel.
On Sunday last the Prince of Piemont went to
the Italian Comedy, which is the first Ap-
pearance his Highness has made at any pub-
lick Diversion since the Decease of the Princess
his Consort. The Marquess Scipio Maffei of
Verona, eminent for his Learning and Writings,
being come hither to plead for Part of a Grant
which fell to him by Inheritance, but was late-
ly resumed by the King; his Sardinian Majesty
has not only made him a Present of the Estate
he sued for, but has appointed him Gentleman
of his Bed-Chamber.

Paris, Feb. 9, N. S. The Funeral of the
late Duke of Orleans was performed at St. De-
nys the 4th Instant, with all proper Pomp and
Solemnity. The Duke of Orleans, Son of the
deceased, was chief Mourner, supported by the
Count de Clermont and the Prince of Conty
Princes of the Blood. The Courts of Parlia-
ment

ment and of Justice were present: The Archbishop of Rouen said High Mass in pontifical Vestments, being assisted by the Bishops of Mendoc and of Verdun. The Bishop of Angers pronounced the Funeral Oration. And Divine Service being ended, the Body of his late Royal Highness was interred with the usual Ceremonies.
