Madrid, February 14, N. S.

ON the 10th Instant the Count de Almiras, assisted by the Kings of Arms and Heralds, and accompanied by a great Number of the Nobility on Horseback, performed the Ceremony of Proclaiming the Prince Lewis King of Spain, in the usual Places of this City; and afterwards the Count gave a very magnificent Entertainment to the Nobility who accompanied him on this Occasion.

Kinsale, Feb. 14. On the 12th Instant one of our Fishing-Boats brought Advice, that a large Ship was about seven Leagues from this Harbour, having lost all her Masts, and was in great Distress for Provisions and Hands: Upon which five or six Fishing Boats well manned and with Provisions were sent out, as also a Pilot, who the next Day brought the Ship safe into this Harbour. She is called the King William of London, Burthen 400 Tons, Captain Nehemiah Winter, from Buenos Ayres, belonging to the South-Sea Company, and very richly laden. She will take some time to refit.
