

# The London Gazette.

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Naples, October 13.

**W**Hilst we seem secure from all attempts of the Turks, our Governor Don Pedro d'Arragon hath given Orders for removing the Troops, which were in Garrison most of this Summer in the Port-Townes of this Kingdome, to their former Quarters. This week arrived here from Genoua, Dom Rafael de Villasa in order to his taking possession of the place of President of the Royal Chamber here, which the Queen Regent hath been lately pleased to bestow upon him.

Don Pedro d'Arragon is preparing for his returne from this Government, upon whose departure, we may expect the Marquis d'Astorgas, our new Vice-Roy to arrive here from Rome: The Banditi continue to occasion much disorder in these Countries, to the great disturbance of Travellers, and the interruption of our Commerce; for the redressing of which, some Forces are ordered out, to endeavor to intercept them.

Rome, Octob. 24. On Thursday last the Count de Prado, Ambassador from the Court of Portugal, had his last Audience of his Holiness, by whom he was received with much kindness and esteem; the said Ambassador having now satisfied all his Creditors, to their general content, may in few days begin his journey overland for Portugal.

This week arrived an extraordinary Courrier from France, with Letters to the Bishop of Liann, who immediately after receipt thereof, was with his Holyness, as afterwards with the Cardinal Patron, to acquaint them with the contents of them, of which we have not as yet an account. Great preparations are making for the performance of the Ceremony, of Contracting the second Daughter of the Princeess Rossano, to the Prince Doria, which the Marquis d'Astorgas will perform as Proxy, in the name of that Prince, who is now at Genoua, where the Marriage will be Consummated with much Solemnity. The Popes Gallies are safely arrived at Civita Vecchia. The Pope is somewhat indisposed.

The Cardinal Landgrave of Hesse is preparing for his journey towards Germany, in order to his going to take possession of his Government of Silesia, and of the Archbishopsrick of Breslaw in that Country. It is not certainly said, whom the Emperor may appoint his Ambassador at this Court, the general report being, that the Constable of Colonna is designed for it, though without any great certainty as yet. Signior Nerli is not yet arrived from Vienna, but is dayly expected.

Vienna, Octob. 26. The 24 instant arrived here a Turkish Chiaus, who hath since had Audience of the Emperor and the Count de Montecuculi, President of the Council of War, to whom, after the assurances of a perfect and inviolable Friendship on the part of the Grand Signior his Master, he represented, as we are told, several matters, which have divers years continued undecided, concerning the Frontiers, &c. adding, that he hoped the Port would not be obliged by farther delays in this affair, to prosecute their right by force of Arms, which the Bassa of Offen would have certainly orders to do, if they

had not quick Justice, as they pretend, done them herein.

Several persons who have been long Prisoners at Presburgh, concerning the late Rebellion in Hungary, have at length obtained their pardons, and are discharged out of Prison, though, it is thought, the Count de Tattenbach will be, upon the same account, condemned to a perpetual imprisonment.

Upon Prince Abassi's having refused to deliver into the hands of the Imperial Commissioners, several fugitive Hungarians, as likewise upon the report we have had, as if the Port had promised to assist the Rebels of Hungary, more Forces have been ordered to march that way, to be ready upon any occasion that may happen there.

Vienna, Dicta 30. The Turkist Envoy hath had an other Audience of the Count de Montecuculi, from whom he received, as is said, a sharp answer, to what he had in his former Audience, proposed to him, concerning the Frontiers, &c. since he hath had his last Audience of the Emperor, and is now returning home with very considerable presents.

We are told of several practices, which have been discovered of some of the Hungarian Nobility, for raising new troubles in those Countries; and that in case the unexpected Revolt in Arabia had not hindered the Port, from sending them the promised assistance, they would ere this have had some new design on foot, which it is hoped, whenever they go about to put into execution, will meet with no better success, then they have hitherto done.

Ravenna, Octob. 30. Our advices from Turkey tell us, with much assurance, of the continuance of the disorders in the Ottoman Territories near Mecca, and that those disturbances will certainly employ all the Grand Signiors Forces in those Quarters, for some time at least. In the mean time our affairs in Dalmatia advance apace, insomuch, that Procurator Nani, in his Letters to this Senate, seems not to doubt, but to see that business wholly determined yet before Christmas.

Here is a report of an Ambassador designed hither from Savoye, though without much certainty as yet. The French Ambassador is preparing for his return home, and may depart hence about the middle of the next Month at farthest; this Duke is returned out of the Country, where he hath been some time, perfectly recovered of his late indisposition.

The Christian Gallies have of late very much disturbed the Navigation and Commerce of the Grand Signiors Subjects in the Archipelago, so that the Grand Visier hath given directions for the equipping 30 Gallies more against Spring, to be employed for the security of those parts. We are told, that the Divan at Constantinople hath very much complained to the French Ambassador of his Masters Fleet having been in the Archipelago, and of some had usage those Inhabitants had received from him. Here is returned Signior Giorgi, late Ambassador from this State at Vienna.

Dantzick, October 30. Our Letters from Lemburgh tell us, of the daily confirmation they receive, of Hanenke's great success against the Rebel Gossack

in the *Praine*: That since his having joyned with the Polish Army, several Townes who had before held out with much oblinacy, were surrendered: That *Dorosensko* was retired none knew whether destitute of all hopes of assistance from the *Tatars*, who observing the happy progress, the Arms of this Crown have made in those Countries, begin to withdraw themselves, and not only quit the interest of those Cossacks, but to offer their assistance to this Kingdome for the further subduing them, though, as may be easily imagined, with no great sincerity: In the mean time *Hanenko* lies encamped with the Forces under his command, between *Kobrita* and *Czekryn*, which Places hold out still, but will not, as is thought, do so long, seeing the straits they seem to be already reduced to, and the little assistance they can expect from their General *Dorosensko*, will doubtless be a means to persuade them to submit in time; and not by an obstinate and desperate wilfulness, expose themselves to the last extremities, which they cannot avoid but by a timely surrender.

*Hanenko* hath sent to the King to desire some Cloaths and other necessaries for his Soldiers; which his Majesty hath not only promised shall be dispatched to him immediately, but hath given further order, for a present to be sent him of 1200 Ducats together with several rich habits for himself and other principal Officers of his Army.

It is not yet certainly known when the Court will return to *Warsaw* it being generally thought, that his Majesty will hardly remove from *Leopol*, till the Army hath their Winter Quarters assigned them.

*Brussels*, *Novemb. 12.* This day the Prince of *Arenbergh*; and the Duke *de Villa Hermosa* returned hither from *Holland*; which they lately went incognito, out of curiosity, as was given out; to see those parts, though as some say, with Commission from the Count *de Montreux*, to treat with those States, concerning the present affairs.

His Excellency hath deferred his journey to *Cambray*, *Conde*, &c. for some time. In the mean time we talk of nothing but the new Leaves, which will be now suddenly gone about.

*Cologne*, *Novemb. 13.* Every day brings with it new arguments to convince us of the little reason we have to expect an accommodation with our Elector, who, whilst he gives out his desires are, to have all misunderstandings made up and reconciled, continues notwithstanding his preparations, which seem to look quite an other way; with so much earnestness, that we seem likewise persuaded to lay aside all hopes of an agreement, had to make all possible use of our time in the advancing the work of our Fortifications, and putting ourselves in a good posture of defence. At *Nuis* have been lately made a great many Ovens, for the Baking upon any occasion a vast quantity of Bisket; and in the mean time, our Elector continues to buy up extraordinary quantities of Corn, and other necessary provisions for an Army.

*Hunburgh* 2 *Novemb. 14.* Heed is come to this Town Monsieur *Courbin* on his way from *France* to *Stockholm*, upon whose arrival there, it is thought, Monsieur *de Pompon*, will immediately return from thence. All the discourses heard, of the great levies and other preparations making, as well hereabouts; as in other parts of *Germany*; the Bishop of *Munster* is not yet returned from *Cologne*, where it is said, he is endeavoring to conclude an accommodation between that Town and the Elector.

*Paris* *Novemb. 14.* Their Majesties continue still at *Versailles*, where was celebrated the last week the Feast of St. Hubert, with the usual Gallantry of

this Court, the Ladies and the rest of the Nobility and persons of Quality, appearing at the Diversions prepared for the day, in Habits excellent rich and suitable to the occasion.

The King being desirous to have a new Model of Architecture erected, which might be called the French way of Building, hath caused to be published, that his Majesty will bestow on him who shall best succeed in the forming such a Model, his Picture richly set with Diamonds to a great value. The instant his Majesty was pleased to sign the Contract of Marriage, between the Duke of *Orleans* and the Princess *Palatine*, Daughter to the Prince Elector *Palatine*, which had been before signed by that Elector, and the Marquis *de Berwick* in the name of his Majesty and the Duke of *Orleans*, the next day the Ratification of this Contract was sent by an Express to *Strasbourg*, where that Elector is arrived with the Princess his Daughter, who will immediately proceed from thence for *Metz*, whither the Marquis *Duke de Pleffis* *Prussin* is gone, in order to the espousing that Princess, as Proxy for his Royal Highness.

The Sieur *Magalotti* is at present quartered with the Troops he had raised in *Italy* near *Medun*; where he expects the arrival of some better Forces from the same parts, in order to the completing his Regiments. The Abbe *Gondi* is arrived here on the part of the Duke of *Tuscany*, as is also the Conde *de Montora* from *Spain*.

It is said, that the Prince Regent of *Portugal* will give leave for the raising a Regiment in that Kingdom for the Service of this Crown.

*Hague*, *Novemb. 17.* The respective Admiralties are at present assembled, together with the Commissioners appointed for the Maritime affairs, to consider of the number of Ships that will be needful for these States to have at Sea the next Summer; as likewise what may be the most effectual way for the recalling their Seamen from Foreign Service.

On Thursday last the Deputies of the Province of *Utrecht* gave their consent in the name of that Province for the new Leaves, as also for the making an Alliance with some Foreign Princes. Some day's since dyed here the Heer *vander Myte*, the last of that Family, of the wounds he had received in a Duel lately fought between him and the two Counts *de Donha*.

The Heer *de Ameyongen* is at present here from *Cologne*; but may return again in few days towards those parts. The Council of State have as we are told, given in their advice to the States General, for the raising of 14 Regiments of Foot and three of Horse, which all the Provinces have already agreed to; except *Holland* and *Zealand*; the States of *Holland* will now be assembled in a day or two, when it is not doubted, but they will concur with the rest of the Provinces in this particular. The Spanish Envoy *Don Emanuel de Lyra*, hath lately had a Conference with several Deputies to that end appointed by the States General, concerning the affairs of the Spanish Netherlands, the particulars of which we as yet want.

The Heer *van Haren* having received his dispatches for his Embassy to *Sweden*, may in few days go hence for *Trisland*, from whence he will proceed on his journey towards that Kingdom.
