God Save the King.

Madrid. March 6, N. S. The King has given Orders for settling the Household of his Brother the Infante Don Philip, and has named for his Governour the Marquess del Surco, one of the Gentlemen of his Majesty's Bed-Chamber. The Infanta, Consort of the Prince Don Carlos, was present at the Auto de Fé held the 20th past in the Church of the Convent of St. Domingo, when the Sentences passed by the Tribunal of the Inquisition upon 21 Persons were read. The Effigies of Six of them, who had died in the Prisons of the Inquisition, were, with their Bodies which had been taken out of the Ground where they had been interred, delivered over to the Secular Arm to be burnt. A Man of 80 Years was delivered over to be burnt, but he declaring himself penitent, was first strangled, and then his Body was burnt. A Woman of 55 Years being also delivered over to be burnt for Judaism, was converted on her Way to the Fire, and was therefore first strangled and then her Body was thrown into the Flames. But a young Man of 19 Years of Age, who was likewise delivered over to the Secular Arm, being impenitent and obstinate, was bound to a Stake and burnt alive. Four Deputies of the Royal Spanish Academy have attended their Catholic Majesties, and in a Speech congratulated them on their Accession to the Throne. The Marquess de Monteleone having obtained Leave from King Philip to wait on him at St. Ildefonso, went thither last Week, and is expected back in a Day or two. The Marshal de Tessé arrived here the 27th past, and in the Evening had Audience of the King and Queen, and of the Infantes. His Majesty has promoted to the Rank of Major General, the Count de Taboada, who is with his Regiment at Ceuta. The Duke of Liria is likewise made a Major-General. It has been re-

solved that Members of His Majesty's Cabinet-Council shall receive severally the Propositions of every Foreign Minister, and make Report thereof: The Marquess de Lede is assigned for M. Stanhope the British Ambassador, the President of Castile for the Marshal de Tessé Minister of France, the Marquess de Valero for the Pope's Nuncio, and the Archbishop of Toledo for the Venetian Minister.

Cambray, March 17, N.S. On the 13th Instant the Lord Polwarth one of his Britannick Majesty's Ambassadors Plenipotentiary, gave a splendid Entertainment to all the foreign Ministers and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes of this Town and the adjacent Places, on Occasion of the Princess of Wales's Birthday. The Spanish Plenipotentiaries having received by Express from Madrid his Catholic Majesty's Ratification of their Receipt given to the Imperial Plenipotentiaries for the Investitures of Tuscany, Parma, and Placentia, in favour of the Prince Don Carlos Infante of Spain; the said Spanish Ministers delivered on the 14th Instant that Ratification to the Imperial Ministers, in the Presence of those of Great Britain and France.

Paris, March 18, N. S. On Wednesday Night the 15th Instant, a Courier arrived at Versailles from Rome, with an Account that Pope Innocent the 13th was on the 6th Instant drawing to his End: Another Courier has since brought an Account of his having departed this Life the 7th, about three in the Afternoon. All the French Cardinals are making Preparations to repair with all Expedition to the Conclave. The Duke of Orleans has desired his most Christian Majesty's Leave to marry the Princess of Baden; and having also imparted to the Princes of the Blood his Design of Marrying her, he has received their Compliments upon it.

St. James's, March 13. An humble Address of the Grand-Jury at the General Sessions of the Peace held for the Body of the Island of Barbadoes, the 10th, 11th, and 12th Days of December 1723, having been transmitted hither by Henry Worsley, Esq; Governour of that Island, has been presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

St. James's, March 13. The Honourable Samuel Shute, Esq; Governour of New-England, being introduced to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has had the Honour to deliver to His Majesty a Belt of Wampom, being a Present from the Heads of some of the Tribes of Indians in North-America; which His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.
