Turin, March 18, N. S.

ON the 15th Instant between Seven and Eight in the Evening died the Princess Maria Johanna Baptista of Savoy-Nemours, Daughter to the Duke of Nemours who was killed in a Duel by the Duke of Beaufort his Brother in Law, Wife to Charles Emanuel the Second, and Mother to the present King of Sardinia, Dutchess Dowager of Savoy, &c. She had been Dutchess Regent during this King's Minority, and very much respected by all Crowned Heads, who gave her the Title of Madame Royale. Her great Magnificence, Affability, Politeness, and Charity, gained her the Esteem of all Ranks of People, so that she is generally lamented, and especially by the Poor. She died in a very advanced Age, being born April 11, 1644.

Turin, March 22, N. S. Last Sunday Evening about Seven a Clock, the Corpse of Madame Royale was carried on a state-ly Horse, or Sort of Chariot, drawn by eight Horses, from her Palace to the Cathedral Church of St. John's, and there with great Solemnity interr'd in the Vault of the Royal Family. Her Heart had been conveyed before in a Silver Box to the Convent of the Carmelite Nuns, according to her Will, by which she also has left them a Legacy of 20000 Livres. Her Royal Highness disposed of some other smaller Legacies to two or three Convents besides; and some few to her Principal Servants that attended her during her last Sickness, over and above their Annual Salaries, which she has bequeathed to all her Family during their Lives. His Sardinian Majesty has expressed much Concern, that a Fever accompanied with the Gout hindered him from paying his last Duty to her at her Decease: He is still confined to his Chamber, but proposes to receive the Compliments of Condolance upon this Occasion on Friday next.

Stockholm, March 4, O. S. As the frosty Weather we have had for some time past has stopped the usual Passage over the Bothnick Gulph, the Courier who was dispatched to Petersbourg with the Treaty of Defensive Alliance lately concluded between this Crown and the Czar, has been obliged to take his Way round the said Gulph, which is a Journey of several hundred Leagues. On Saturday last Major General Reichel arrived here from Hambourg, and Yesterday he notified his Arrival to all the foreign Ministers, as Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Holstein.

Hague, March 31, N. S. The States of the Province of Holland separated on the 25th Instant, after having received the Report of their Committee appointed to examine the

Project of the Council of State for an Augmentation of the Forces of this Republick. The said Committee having given their Opinion that the Augmentation proposed ought to be made, and that the several Provinces should first be obliged to compleat the Troops on their respective Quotas, the several Members took the Matter ad referendum, in order to be authorized on that Subject by their Towns at their next Meeting, which is to be on the 12th of April; by which time 'tis expected the Resolution of some other Provinces will be transmitted hither, no other than that of Gelderland being yet come. Major General Rechteren having some time ago been made Governour of Boisseduc, took the usual Oaths Yesterday, in order to go to his Government.
