Lisbon, March 19, N. S.

Letters from Seville of the 22d past tell us, that City, particularly the Metropolitan Church, had suffered very much by a violent Storm the 18th in the Morning. On the 16th Instant arrived here the Fleet from Pernambuco, consisting of 13 Merchant Ships, under the Convooy of a Man of War. The Gold brought by them is computed at two Millions of Crusades; and that which came by the Bahía Fleet, which arrived here the 1st Instant, at Five Millions.

Madrid, March 22, N. S. The Marquess de Clermont, who was sent hither by the Duke of Orleans to congratulate on his Part the new King and Queen of Spain upon their Accession to the Throne, has had Audience of their Majesties; he has also been at St. Ildefonso to compliment the King and Queen there; and designs to set out in 10 or 12 Days on his Return to Paris. The Pope's Bull for abolishing several irregular Customs introduced among the Clergy of Spain, and for obliging them to observe more strictly the Rules of the Council of Trent, has been approved by the King of Spain, who has made a Decree, ordering the said Bull to be notified to all Ecclesiasticks in his Dominions, with a Proviso that nothing therein shall be understood to derogate from his Royal Authority and Patrimony. This Bull was brought from Rome eight Months ago, and by Cardinal Belluga Bishop of Murcia laid before the late King, who referred it to the Consideration of the Council of Castile, where it met with great Opposition by the Influence of the Clergy, who are unwilling to be bound to so strict a Duty as the Bull requires of them. On the 15th Instant his Excellency Mr. Stanhope had Audience of the King and Queen at the Buen-Retiro, to congratulate their Majesties on the Part of the King of Great Britain, upon their Accession to the Crown. The same Day the Envoy of Portugal had Audience likewise, and congratulated their Majesties in the Name of the King his Master, on the same Occasion. The King and Queen with the Infantes have been some Days at the Buen-Retiro; their Majesties will return hither a little before Easter, to assist at the several Processions which are usually made in the Holy Week, and after the Easter Holidays they design to go to Aranjuez. The Marshal de Tessé is confined to his Bed by a severe Fit of the Gout. The Marquess de Castelar Secretary at War, has been dangerously ill, but is now on the mending hand. This Morning arrived a Courier from Rome, dispatched by Cardinal Acquaviva to Sig. Orendayn Secretary of State, with Letters for the King of Spain, for the Pope's Nuncio, and for the Envoy of Portugal, giving an Account of the Pope's Death on the 7th Instant; whereupon the Portuguese Envoy immediately dispatched an Express to Lisbon.
