THE 25th Instant the Ministers of the Mediators and of the several other Powers who form the Congress, had a publick Meeting at the Town-House, in which all the Plenipotentiaries signed a Declaration for reserving to every one respectively his Master's Right, on account of the Titles which have been made use of in some of the full Powers, or might be hereafter used in the Course of the Congress.

Hague, May 5, N. S. The States of the Province of Holland have been re-assembled here since the 3d Instant, having under their Consideration the Settling of divers Affairs, in particular the making an amicable End of the Differences that have some time subsisted between Denmark and this State, and the renewing a Treaty of Commerce with that Crown; in order to which they propose to send M. Buys to Copenhagen. The said States will likewise take into further Consideration the Project for augmenting the Number of Troops of this Republick

and the naming a President of the Supreme Court of Justice, which last will be done towards the End of this Month, by which Time Deputies from Zealand are to come hither, to joyn in disposing of that Employment. The Commissioners of the several Admiralties are arrived here, to confer with the Deputies of Holland on settling new Duries of Importation and Exportation, which the Province of Zealand has hitherto opposed. The Emperour has notified by a Letter to the States General the Birth of an Archdutchess. Prince William of Hesse, who has been here some time, sets out a Fortnight hence for Cassel.

Whereas Lancelot Jordan, Surveyor of the Customs at Lyme, was, in his Journey from thence to Dorchester, on the 11th Day of March last past, assaulted on the Highway between Hendon and Shaftsbury, by several Persons on Horseback and on Foot, supposed to lie in Wait for that Purpose, who knocked him off his Horse, whereby he was very much bruised, and fired a Pistol at him; For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Assault, His Majesty is graciously pleased to promise to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be apprehended

ended the said Offenders, or any of them, a Reward of Fifty Pounds, to be paid, on his or their Conviction, by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs; And His Majesty is likewise pleas'd to Promise His Most Gracious Pardon to any Person concern'd in the said Crime, who shall discover any of his Accomplices (except the Person who knocked the said Jordan off his Horse) so as they or any of them be Apprehended and Convicted.

His Majesty having lately receiv'd Information of Divers Complaints in relation to the Printing of Bibles and Common-Prayer-Books, upon bad Paper and with bad Letter, and also that due Care hath not been us'd in correcting the Press, and that the Books, when printed, have been sold at unreasonable Prices; And having caus'd the said Complaint to be enquir'd into, and also oblig'd the Proprietors of the Patent for printing the said Books to bring in Specimens of the several Sorts and Sizes thereof, printed upon good Paper and with good Letter; which Specimens have been duly consider'd and approv'd: His Majesty hath been graciously pleas'd, in order to do what in Him lies towards the remedying this great Evil, to give special Directions to the said Patentees, as follows:

1. That all Bibles and Common-Prayer-Books, which shall hereafter be printed by them, be printed at least upon as good Paper, and with as good Letter, as the said Specimens.

2. That they forthwith deliver four Copies of the said Specimens, to be deposited and kept in four several Offices, that is to say, in the two Offices of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State for South Britain, and in the publick Registries of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and the Bishop of London; to the end that ready Recourse may be had to such Specimens, upon any Complaint that shall be made in relation to the Paper or Letter, which shall hereafter be us'd by them in printing Bibles or Common-Prayer-Books.

3. That they shall employ such Correctors of the Press, and allow them such Salaries, as shall be approv'd from Time to Time, by the Archbishop of Canterbury, and the Bishop of London, for the time being.

And that if may clearly appear where the Fault lies, (whether upon His Majesty's Patentees, who print the said Bibles and Common-Prayer-Books, or upon the Bookfellers who sell them,) in case the said Bibles and Books of Common-Prayer shall at any time hereafter be sold at unreasonable Rates, His Majesty hath been pleas'd to give further Direction,

4. That the said Patentees for printing Bibles and Common-Prayer-Books, do print in the Title Page of each Book, the exact Price at which such Book is by them to be sold to the Bookfellers.
