**T**HE last Letters from Cadiz advise, that two Dutch Men of War, belonging to their Mediterranean Squadron, sailed from thence about three Weeks ago, in order to join three Maltese Men of War, which lay upon the Coast of Barbary, and had kept the Algerines from coming out of their Ports for some Time past. They write from St. Ubes, that the Dutch Fleet is near laden, and will put to Sea the 7th Instant, under the Convoy of a Man of War, which is there waiting for them. On the 28th past Nossa Senhora das Ondas, a Portuguese Man of War of 60 Guns, sailed from hence for Oporto, having under her Convoy 17 Merchant Ships which came with the last Bahia and Pernambuco Fleets. On the 30th arrived here from the Bay of Lagos in Algarve, the Rosario another Portuguese Man of War of 40 Guns, and brought with her in Tow the India Ship that went from hence in Company with the Fleet the 22d of April, and sprung a Leak a few Days after, which obliged her to put into that Bay. Three Merchant Ships fitted out by the African Company here, together with their large Ship of 36 Guns, are ready to sail for Corisco; and on his Portuguese Majesty's Recommendation are to convoy a Ship from hence to Gran Para, having on Board the Bishop of that Place. The Abbot de Livry is very soon expected at this Court with the Character of Ambassadour Extraordinary from his

most Christian Majesty: The Palace of the Conde de Saure is hired and fitting up for his Reception. His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Dursley Galley continues still in this Harbour:

*Hague, June 20, N. S.* The States of the Province of Holland are to assemble here the Beginning of next Month, in which Session it is expected they will come to a Resolution upon the Conditions of Peace proposed by the Algerines. The King and Queen of Denmark continue at Aix la Chapelle. Upon the Representations of the West India Company, the States General have sent Orders to M. Hop their Minister at the Court of France, to make Instances for the Restitution of Fort Arquiens on the Coast of Africa of which the French lately possessed themselves. Their High Mightinesses have caused the usual Present to Ambassadors, to be delivered to the Secretary left here by the Count de Morville, in order to its being sent to him at Paris. The King of Poland's Minister who has for some Time resided here, is set out for Aix la Chapelle, to meet General Fleming there. M. Van Essen, who for many Years had been a Deputy from the Province of Gelderland to the Assembly of the States General, died here Yesterday Morning in the 82d Year of his Age. He was one of the Council for managing the Estate and Revenues left by the late King William, in which Place he is succeeded by M. Sigendorn another Deputy of Gelderland. Collonel Du Bourgay\* set out from Utrecht the 17th Instant, on his Way to the Court of Prussia.
