Falmouth, Novemb. 15.

Yesterday in the Evening arrived here the *Princess's* Frigate, Sir William Jennings Commander, having together with the Turkey ships had a Fleet of about 30 sayl of Merchant men under his Convooy from the *Streights*, which are all safely passed up the Channel; this Morning he put to Sea again, with intention to stop at *Plymouth*, and from thence to proceed for the *Downes*.

Portsmouth, Novemb. 19. Friday last was launched the *Anne* Yacht; having been rebuilt here, and may in three or four days be ready to sayl, to be Commanded by Captain *Gunman*. Thursday last arrived at *Spithead* the *Boston Merchant*, Peter Lunt Commander, from *Smirna*, from whence she came in Company of several others, who are passed by for the *Downes*, under the Convooy of Sir William Jennings in the *Princess*; the said *Boston Merchant* is bound for *Havre de Grace*, where she is to unlade.

Downes, Novemb. 19. Yesterday arrived in the *Downes* the *Mercemayde*, a ship of about 300 Tun from the *Barbados*; they report that Island to be in a very good and thriving condition.

Lisbonn, Octob. 17. The 7 instant arrived a Fleet of ten sayl of Merchant men from *Rio de Janeiro* in *Brazile*, seven of which came in hither, the other three proceeding for *Port O Port*; it is said, that these ships are not so rich as had been expected, some of them wanting of their full lading, which is most Wood, and nor having brought so great a quantity of Sugar as is usual.

The Friars of the *Trinidad* being returned from *Afgiers*, with 196 Slaves, which they had redeemed with the Moneys that had been here to that end collected, report, that there are yet remaining of this Nation in Slavery, near 400 more, for whose redemption those Charitable Collections are still continued; the Duke of *Cadaval*, the Marquis de *Mariz d'Alva*, and others of the chiefest quality in this Kingdom, going in person from dore to dore, to receive the Contributions of the Inhabitants towards so pious a work.

Ratisbonne, Novemb. 5. This Dyet is assembled daily, and labour with much earnestness for the concluding the matter of the Publick security, having proposed, that whilst this affair continues in debate, orders should in the mean time be sent to the respective Circles, to bring their Forces together, to the end, they may be ready to march as there should be occasion: farther resolving, that so soon as they should have finished the Instructions for their Velt-Marshal, they would proceed to the Election of a General of the Empire, for which appear already several pretenders.

Leghorn, Novemb. 6. This Evening arrived here from *Genoua*, Prince *Doria*, attended by four Spanish Gallies of the Duke of *Tursis* Squadron, to receive his Bride the young Princess de *Rossano*, who hath been here these two days from *Rome*, where she was Married by Proxy to this Prince, who lan-

ded with a very rich Trayn, having above 50 costly Liveries, and many persons of quality accompanying him; His stay will not be long here he intending in few days to return with his Lady for *Genoua*.

Venice, Novemb. 6. At length by a Vessel arrived from *Dalmatia* we receive the good news of the conclusion of the matter of the Limits, with greater advantages to this State than had been expected; for by the Treaty now concluded between the Turkish Bassa and Procurator *Nani*, we are, as we are told, not onely restored in several rights on the Frontiers, which formerly did belong to this Republick, but have stretcht out our Frontiers farther than they were before, and have obtained other matters very considerable to this State: by the same Conveyance we receive advice of the continuance of the disturbances in *Arabia*, and that the disorders and dissensions in those parts grow dayly greater, and begin to have but a bad aspect.

We daily expect here General *Bernardo*, having had advice of his being on his way higher from *Zant*, with four Gallies and two Galleasses, Wednesday last arrived here Prince *Frederick* of *Britanwick*, he having, as is said, thoughts of continuing this winter here.

Procurator *Nani* may suddainly be here from *Dalmatia*, having acquainted the Senate, that since his having so happily determined those matters, he would with all convenient speed return hither to give them a more particular account of what had passed.

Genoua, Novemb. 11. The 9 instant returned hither from *Leghorne*, Prince *Doria*, with his Bride the Princess *Rossano*, they having upon their arrival here, been received with the Compliments of all the persons of quality about Town, and conducted through the City to the Prince's Palace, attended with a great Trayn of Coaches; the Prince himself riding with 8 Bridemen on Horseback, very rich in their Habits, and attended with a very numerous and splendid Trayn.

Madrid, Novemb. 11. From *Malaga* they write of the 3 instant, that Captain *Holmer* continued cruising in the *Streights* with hopes of intercepting some of those Algerines, which we have advice are abroad on their return home. That they were certainly informed of two Brigantines of *Tangier* that had stranded, one belonging to *Tethan*; that they were in daily expectation of the arrival of Sir *John Chicheley* from *England*.

Marseilles, Novemb. 14. Here are at present in this Port, where they arrived through contrary winds, Captain *Watson* in the *success*, Convooy to the *Delight* of *Plymouth* bound for *Naples*; and the *Eagle*, Captain *Milberry* Commander, and the *Recovery* of *Falmouth* bound for *Leghorne*, from *Newfoundland*, from whence they came in 9 weeks, and tell us, that the other Convooy that is there with the remaining ships, might be ready to sayl in three weeks after their departure from thence: Yesterday dyed here Monsieur *d'Oppede*, first President of the Parliament of *Ain*.

Cologne, Nov. 17. From *Treves* they write that they

they had advicè there of Sixteen Piccès of Canon that were come down the *Moesel* from *Metz*, and that they were arrivèd at *Zurich*, the last place of *Lorraine*, whither it was said the *Mareschal de Crequi* was with his Forces to follow. That the Chapter at *Tribves* was at present assembled for the chusing a Coadjutor, and that they had proposèd the Dean of *Spizer* who is of the Electors Relation, but had not as yet determinèd any thing in it.

The Bishop of *Munster* is still at *Kenternich*, where have been lately several Conferences held between that Bishop, the Bishop of *Strasburgh*, and the Deputies of this place, though with as little success as formerly, they not having, notwithstanding all their endeavors, been able to advance any thing toward an accommodation.

Our Elector continues to buy up vèry considerable quantities of Corn, and other Grain, and hath lately orderèd, as we are told, 20000 Rixdollars for Bisket to be bakèd at *Nutz*, and other places hereabouts.

On Saturday last was mustered here the *Marquès de Grana's* Regiment, consisting of a thousand Men; at which time the several Companies received their Colours.

The Deputies of the Circle of *Westphalia* continue to press our Magistrates to give an answer to their late Proposals, in which they insist to have *Colonel Bampheld's* Regiment removed out of this place, offering at the same time in their room, to furnish 1000 Foot and 500 Horse: But our Magistrates continue, as is said, resolvèd not to part with that Regiment upon any account.

Hague, November 20. The States of *Holland* and *West-Friesland*, are at present assembled, and as yet busied about disposing of several vacant places, as well Civil as Military.

The Heer *Van Haren* hath taken his leave of the States General, in order to his setting forward on his Embassy to the Crownes of *Sweden* and *Danemark*.

The Lieutenant Admiral *de Ruyter*, is at present in Town, together with the Lieutenant Admiral *Van Ghent*, and several other Officers of the Fleet, to consult with the Deputies to that end appointed by the States General, concerning the next years Equipage.

Here is a discourse of some Forces, as well Horse as Foot, that are to be sent for the reinforcing our Garrisons on the *Rhynè*.

The Parties concernèd in the late Duell in which the Heer *van der Myl* was mortally wounded, are summonèd by the States General to appear on Munday Seavennight before the Court of Justice, or in default thereof, to suffer the penalties which by the Laws of the Land are to be inflictèd on Offenders of that kind.

The Troop of Horse Commanded by the Heer *van Voorschoten*, is orderèd to march immediately to *Aernhem* in *Gelderland*, where it is to continue in Garrison. We are in much expectation concerning the new Leavies, which, it is said, will be in all 20000 Men, whereof 6000 Horse. We are told of some intentions of Building a Fort near *Rouveen*, and of cleansing the *Lower Rhyn* and *Issel*, to render the passage of any Forces the more difficult. Yesterday was published an order of the States, requiring all Governors and other Military Officers in their Service, to repair to their respective Commands, before the 23rd instant, on forfeiture of their Employments.

This Morning Don *Emanuel de Lyra*, Envoy from the Crown of *Spainè*, together with the Baron *d'Isola* the Imperial Minister here, was in conse-

rence with the Deputies of the States General; the particulars of which as yet we have not.

Paris, November 25. We are told of an Express arrivèd over-land from *Suratte*, from whence he came in *March* last, to give this *East-India* Company an account of the present posture of their affairs in those parts, which they lay go on very well; that *Monsieur de la Haye* was arrivèd there with 10 ships under his Command, being the Squadron, as we guess, which was some time since reported to have been lost in the *South Sea*; and that there went thence a little before his departure two ships; the one called the *Crown*, of 500 Tuns; the other the *Golden Eagle*, of 250 Tuns, both very richly laden, and homeward bound, for the account of this Company. By the said Express we have these further particulars; that the Governor of *Suratte* had desired to Treat with the Director that is there for our *East-India* Company, for the advancement of Trade, and to that end had already taken off several of the Duties formerly imposèd upon the French Commodities brought thither; & that the *Sieur de la Haye* was gone again from thence with 7 Men of war of his Squadron and four Merchant men, to take possession of the Island *Banca*, being a very fine Island about 25 Leagues in length and 15 in breadth.

The 15 instant was Consecrated the Bishop of *Lodeve* in the Church of the *Chartreux*, by the Bishop of *Viviers*, his Uncle, assisted by the Bishops of *Cominges* and *Mans*, in the presence of the Archbishops of *Paris* and *Tulaze*, and several other persons of quality.

His Majesty hath nominatèd the *Sieur Poncet de la Riviere* Master of Request, to be Intendant of *Alsacia*, whither he is gone this week to execute his Majesties Orders there. It is said, that the *West-India* Company have by Command from his Majesty, sent to give notice to their respective Governors and Officers in those parts, that they be watchful in their several Stations, and that they take care their Garrisons and Fortifications be in a good posture of defence against all accidents.

Portsmouth, November 21. This day will be Landed the *Tarmouth*, having been rebuilt here; in the room of which, the *Nonsuch* is to come into the Dock, to be likewise refitted for Sea.

Whitehall, November 21. The 16 instant *Monfieur Lindenow*, Envoy from the King of *Danemark*, having in an Audience acquainted their Majesties with the Birth of the Prince of *Danemark*, entertainèd several of the Nobility and other persons of quality, at a very Noble Supper at my Lady *Williams* House in the Palaceyard at *Westminster*, the ordinary place for the Entertainment of Ambassadors, which was attendèd with the sound of Trumpets and other Musick; a large Bonfire having been preparèd before the Gate of the House, and Wine running out of a Fountaine resembling an Elephant, with other demonstrations of joy.

Whitehall, November 22. This day His Excellency the Earl of *Sunderland*, His Majesties Extraordinary Ambassador to the Crown of *Spainè*, having taken leave of His Majesty, went hence for *Dover*; his Excellency intending to pass from thence to *Calais*, and so to proceed by Land on his journey to that Court.
