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Venice, Novemb. 13.

Y a Vessel arrived from Dalmatia we receive the confirmation of the conclusion of the Treaty between the Turkish Bassa and Procurator Nani, for the determining the affair of the Limits, with all the advantages to this State, that were told us in our former Letters from thence; that several Presents having passed between the Turkish and our Plenipotentiary, they were parted; the Basia returning, after he had visited the several places belonging to the Port on the Frontiers, to Bossima, and Procurator Nani being on

his way hither.

By the same Vessel we have advice, of the Grand Signiors being at present at Adrianople; that he fiad got into his hands his two Brothers, whom he had caused to be put to death, the Sultaness being retired, none knew whither! That the Rebels in Asia, being grown high and infolent, through the success they had hitherto met with, had seiled on several places of importance, and that amongst others, they had plundered ferusalem, and carryed away with them all the Riches and Treasure of that place, which had much troubled the Grand Signior; and the more, because of an antient' Prophecy amongst them, that the loss of that City, should be accompanyed with. # decay of the Ottoman Greatness; but these particulars how confidently seever they are reported, feem to need a farther confirmation. week the French Ambassador took his leave of this Senate, in order to his return home,

Vienna, Novemb. 4. Here are at present raising in the Hereditary Countreys, two Regiments of Foot for the Crown of Spaines to be employed for the fervice of the Spanish Neatherlands. We are told, that the Turkish Chiaus who lately went hence, had received for unswer from the Count de Montecuculi, President of the Council of War, that his Imperial Majesty would punctually perform, whatever the Treaties between him and the Port should oblige him to; and therefore, if there were any just controversie concerning the Frontiers, which had not been yet determined, he would readily admit of an amicable Composure of it; but in case the Bassa of Offen or other the Grand Signiors Governors on the Frontiers, should go about to act by force of Arms, as this Chiaus had seemed to declare they would, if satisfaction, as they pretend, were not given them in several matters relating to the Frontiers, that then his Imperial Majesty would be forced to take such courle, as might secure his Subjects from any vio-Tence or oppression.

At Toppelçan, which was lately plundered by the Turks, leveral of the Inhabitants having been killed and carried away Prisoners, because they refused them Homage and Tribute, they are Building anew Fort by the Emperors order, for the better fecurity of the place for the future, which the Basia of Newhausell has been to visit, alleading, that part of it stands upon their Territory, and declaring at the same time, that if they desiled not from working on it, he should be obliged to pull it down

again by force; however our people continue to work, and as yet we hear not that that Bassa hath attempted

any thing to hinder them.

Dantzicke, Novemb 12. From the Polish Army in the Ukraine, we have Letters of the 21 past, which tellus, that they having had advice of a confiderable party of Tartars who were encamped between Dalko and Kalnicke, had immediately marched in two Bodies with great diligence, and so successfully, that they came upon them, that Morning, which was the date of those Letters, and engaging them for some hours, had at length wholly routed them a taken or killed all their chief Officers, and made a great Slaughter amongst the rest; that after this succels they proceeded to Kalnicke, but not being strong enough to gain that place by force, they had blocked it up, hoping by that means to force them after some time to render themselves.

The Army of Lithuania, which was with much earnestness expected to joyn with the other Forces of this Crown, is upon some dissatisfaction returned back again, which it is feared, will much prejudice the affairs in the Uhraine. The Court is very sud-

dainly expected at Warfam again.

Cologne, Novemb. 20. The Deputies of the Circle of Westphalia omit nothing of their former diligence for the reconciling these differences: the point which at present seems to meet with most difficulty, is that concerning the security this place desires in case of an accommodation, upon which those Deputies have formed a new Project, by which they offer the Guarrantie of the Emperor, and the two Circles of Westphalia, and the Rhyne; this seems to be the last way which is left to arrive to an accommedation, and many think, that our Magistrates may with some small alteration accept of it, and so at length conclude this affair, which hath of late so much disquieted these parts.

The affair of Hoxter is submitted to the Arbitrage of the Elector of Mentz and the Duke of Wirtenbergh, for the concluding whereof, they have

allowed the term of one whole year.

Hagne, Novemb. 14. This Morning went hence the Heer van Odycke for Zealand, in order to his being present at the assembly of those States. The Offi-cers of the Fleet continue in Town, and to mora row or next day are expected here the Deputies of the respective Admiralties, when it is thought, some resolution will be taken concerning the next years

We discourse much of the new Leavies, which is is thought, may now be fuddainly refolved on. The Heer van Haren is at length departed on his Embasly to the Crown of Sweden; though as yet we hear not any thing farther of the other publick Ministers intended to be fent to several Neighbouring Prin-

Several Passengers arrived from Cologne and the other places thereabouts; tell us, that those parts fill dayly with Soldiers, which together with the other preparations that are making, feem to confirm our former fears of a rupture...

Ditth, 27. We are told of four Proops of Horse that are ordered to march to Zusphen, two Troops

Troops to Doesburgh, three Troops to Swoll, as starty to Campen, one to Deventer, one to Nimme. gen, and another to Arnhem. It is faid that the Heer Amerongen is to go in quality of Envoy to the Elector of Brandenburgh.

Yesterday arrived here the Deputies of the respective Admiralties, and this day were in Conference with the Deputies of the States General, concerning matters relating to the Fleet. Here are at present in Town several Forreign Officers, in expectation of Command, at the railing of the new Troops, which may now be gone about very sudding

ly.
The Regiments of Collonel Pain and Col. Vin, are commanded to march for Wefel; and there to continue till farther order, so that our Frontiers will in a short time be sufficiently provided against

all accidents.

Chalons, Novemb. 24. The 19 instant arrived here the Duke of Orleans from St. Germains (to receive his Dutchess the Princess Palatine, who parted from Merz the 17) having been Complymented upon his arrival by the Magistrates of this place, as he was afterwards by our Bishop and Chap-ter, and welcomed with the Salutes of the Gentry and Citizens, who on this occasion appeared in Arms; The 21 his Royal Highness went artended by his Compagnie of Guards, the Officers of his House, and several other persons of quality to meet her Royal Highness, who was come within a mile of At her arrival here, she was Complymented by the Body of our Magistrates, and conducted to the apartment prepared for her; the Streets which she passed, having been richly adorned with Tapiftries and other costly Hangings, and Triumphal Arches erected in several places of the Town.

The 22 arrived here the Count de St. Aguan, to Complyment their Royal Highnesses on the part of their Majesties, as did the Marquis de Lussan in the name of the Prince de Conde and Duke u Enguien. That Evening our Magistrates presented Firework, which was accompanyed with Bon-fires, and other publick demonstrations of joy; and yesterday their Royal Highnesses parted hence on their way towards Paris.

Bruffels, Novemb. 25. The 18 instant arrived here Sir Robert Southwell, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britaine, having been received without the Town by Don Bernardo de Sakinas, Maistre de Camp of the Cavalry, at whose House he is at present lodged; the 20 he had Audience of his Excellency the Count de Monterey, by whom he was received with much kindness and

Notwithstanding his most Christian Majesties de2 claration, concerning the prolonging the term for the Arbitrages the work of our Fortifications and our other preparations are continued with all imaginable diligence; in the interim we are in expectation of farther directions from the Court at Madrid, concerning the new Leavies, till the arrival of which, it is faid, nothing will be done farther in that af-

Paris, Novemb: 28. The Duke de Chaulnes Governor of Bretagne, having in the Kings name demanded of the States of that Province, who are at present assembled, the summe of two Millions 500 thousand Livres, they readily consented to it, and Immediately relolved on the raising of that summe; of which the King having by Letters from the Duke had advice, it is faid, hath commanded him to let those States know a how much holis-satisfied

with this their ready concurrence to his delires; and that as a mark of it, he remit them the 500 thouland Livres, being pleafed at this time to content himfelf with the lumme of two Millions onely.

The Kinghaving been informed that the Sieurs

de Marillac and de Breteuit Masters of Requests, as also the Sieur Bignon, President of the Grand Confeil, had got themselves to be admitted into those places before the age of 37 years, contrary to his late Edists, which driedly forbid the same, hath or-dered them to be discharged their several Employments; it being faid, that a farther search will be made amongst the Officers of the Parliament and Soveraign Courts; upon which it is thought, many will be found to have forfeijed their places upon this account, which being fold again, will arile to

a very confiderable fumnic of Money.

The Officers of the Artillery have orders to march with two feveral Trains, to the general Rendezvous at Metz and Domay. It is faid, that the King hath nominated Monfieur Courtin, at pre fent his Ambassador to the Crown of Sweden, to be President of the Parliament of Ajx, in the room of Monsieur d'Opede lately decenied. The old Troops now in Garrison in the Conquered places in Flanders, are Commanded to march thence the first of December, to take their quarters about Charleroy, and in the Country of Liege, in whose room the new Troops which are and shall beraifed, are to march into Flanders, to continue in Garrison there; we are told of a hundred Commissions more for Horse, that will be given out in Junuary next. It it said that directions have been sent to the respective Officers at present employed in Forreign Leavies, that they return home with such Forces, as they shall have raised by the 20 instant, the King intending they should finish their Leavies by that time, Several Troops at present quartered in Picardy and other parts of France, are ordered to march into Lorraine,

Here hath been made about 300 Bridges, which are, as is said, to be fent into Flanders, and are so light, that they may be easily carried on

Wagons.

Legorne, November 13. This day failed hence, the Love, the Britaine, and the Experiment, Merc autmen, for England, in company of a Venetian Ship bound for thuland. Two ships are now coming in, which are supposed to be the Hamp-shire Frigar, with the Owen and David Merchantman.

Paris, Decemb. 2. Yesterday their Royal Highnesses at-rived at St. Germains, where they were Constitution and the Nobility and other persons of the most eminent quality in this Court. The Count of Linguin hath been lately by the Kings order taken into Custody, and since sent under a Guard to Pignerol, where it is said, he is to remain Prilipher.
