The King's Most Excellent Majesty in
Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to Order, that the Parliament which stands prorogued to Thursday the 27th of this Instant August, should be further prorogued to Thursday the 24th of September next.

Turin, Aug. 23, N. S. Yesterday the Count de Genevill, Master of the Horse to the Prince of Piedmont, arrived at Rivoli from Savoy, being dispatched by his Majesty to inform the Queen, that on Saturday the 19th Instant the Princess of Piedmont embarked at Morges, but the Lake becoming very rough by a sudden Wind, it was thought proper that the Princess should return ashore and stay at Morges that Night. The next Day, at Ten in the Morning, her Royal Highness arrived at Thonon; and about an Hour after, the Marriage Ceremony was performed by the Titular Bishop of Geneva. It is said her Royal Highness's Sister whom she has brought with her into Savoy, is to be educated in a Convent at Annecy. It is uncertain when

the King will arrive here; but it is thought it will be as soon as possible, by reason of the extraordinary Expence his Majesty is at in Savoy; where, notwithstanding the great Price and Scarcity of Provisions, his Majesty is served with great Magnificence. This Morning a Proclamation was made here by Sound of Trumpet, by which the Chief of each Family (having the Small Pox in it) is commanded to give in to the Intendant-General of the Police, a particular Account of the Age, Sex, and Number of all such Persons as are at present ill of that Distemper; which Order is also fixed to the Corner of every Street. This Account is to be sent to his Majesty, who it is supposed will thereupon consult whether the Prince of Piedmont, who has not had the Small Pox, may venture to come with the Court hither yet. The Marquis d'Entraves, who was sent by his Majesty to Rothembourg, in order to wait upon the Princess of Piedmont into Savoy, was presented by the Prince of Rhinfeltz with his Picture set with Diamonds, a Couple of fine Horses with rich Furniture, and a Toilet Equipage of Plate for his Lady.

Madrid, Aug. 25, N. S. On the 22d Instant in the Morning, a Fever, with which King Lewis was attacked last Week, appeared to be the Small Pox, which is come out in great Abundance; but

But his Majesty is since not so violently attacked with the Fever. The Infante Don Carlos was taken the next Day with a sudden Fit of a Fever, which the Physicians took at first to be the Small Pox; whereupon he was removed from the Buen-Retiro to the Palace here in Madrid, but he is now pretty well recovered. The Infanta and the Infante Don Philip are removed to a large House here in Madrid, which formerly belonged to the Count d'Oropesa, but was confiscated upon his following the Emperour's Party in the late War, which House is at present inhabited by the Marquess Scoti Envoy from the Duke of Parma. The Queen continues at the Buen-Retiro, being resolved to stay with his Majesty during his Illness. This Morning arrived an Express from Cadiz, bringing an Account of the Arrival there of the Gallions from the West-Indies, which causes a publick Joy at this Place. The Cargo is computed to amount to 12 Millions, two of which belong to his Catholick Majesty.
