Edenburgh, June 12.

T Here are lately sent into *Leith* six prizes taken by Captain *Hamilton* and Capt. *Murray*, and a French *Pink*, by some other private men.

Falmouth, June 13. Yesterday seven great ships past by this Harbor, and stood up the Channel towards the East; what they are, or from whence, is not yet discovered.

Berwick, June 10. On Monday last a ship belonging to this place, bound for *Newcastle*, was seized by a French *Sloop*; several of them being reported to ply between *Tinmouth Bay* and this Port.

On Wednesday an *Offender* laden with French and Spanish Wines upon some *Scotts* Merchants Accounts, bound for *Scotland*, came safe into *Holy Island*, and on Thursday set sail for *Scotland*.

Rome, May 29. The Ministers of *Spain* have dispatched a Courier to *D. Louis Foxce de Leon*, to draw up the form for the Investiture of the Kingdom of *Naples*, being more then usually concerned at some expressions of the *Pope*; as if he would not receive the Annual Tribute of a Horse at the Feast of *S. Peter*, which is yearly payable by the King of *Spain* to that See for the Investiture. The *Spaniards* being the more cautious, lest by the omission, the French might in time, again revive their ancient pretensions, and occasion fresh disputes.

The Duke *de Carpinero*, eldest son to the Prince *Pamphilio*, is nominated at *Madrid* to perform the Ceremony of presenting this Tribute, and is for those two days to be qualified as Ambassador Extraordinary from his Catholick Majesty, in the absence of the Ambassador in Ordinary, the Marquis *de Sancto Romano*, whose affairs will not permit him to be there till *November*.

The great affair between the *Pope*, and the Dutchess of *Mantua*, who had much dissatisfied his Holiness in banishing an Inquisitor out of her Duchy, is at the last composed by the interposition of the Emperor, from whom the Cardinal *Tonghi* presented the Dutchess with Letters importing his desires, That her Highness would give entire satisfaction to the Court of *Rome*, severely blaming her proceedings, both in this business of the Inquisitor, and the other of the late contest with the Dutchess of *Modena*. To which she replied, That in what was done, she was surpris'd by her Council; but that she was resolv'd to give very speedy satisfaction to the Court of *Rome*, as was desired of her.

Dantzick, June 12. We are advised by Letters of the 4 instant, that the King of *Poland* is every day making great preparations for the carrying on of the War against the Confederates; and is now forming a Leaguer at *Blony*, seven Leagues from *Warsaw*, having lately received an addition of 3000 fresh men, and expects every day 6000 out of *Lithuania*, who are upon their march for his assistance. Those of great *Poland* did at their meeting frame a kind of Manifesto, by which they declare, that their taking up Armes, is so far from being intended against His Majesty, that they will assist him with their Lives and Fortunes, but with this addition, whilst he maintains their Laws and Privileges. They have ordered all their several districts to be in Armes at the appointed places for their several Rendezvous the 21 instant; and then they may resolve (as is believed) to hold a Parliament in the open field (if His Majesty hinder it not) where *Lubomirski's* Trial shall be examined; and according as they shall find it, to proceed either against him or his Judges: where 'tis not doubted but he will be found innocent, his Examiners being all of his own faction; and 'tis

feared will execute the sentence on some of his Judges, which they had decreed against him.

It is reported by some lately come out of great *Poland*, that *Lubomirski* hath 2000 Dragoons, and as many Horse sent to his assistance by the Emperor, who are joyned with 5000 Confederate *Poles*; and that he is at the head of them, on his march towards *Lowitz*, about ten Leagues distant from the Kings Leaguer: if so, we may expect sudden action.

Seville, May 27. The *Spaniards* are much troubled, that the nine Men of War sitting out at *Cadiz*, are not yet ready to joyn with the eleven already before *Lisbon*, to hinder the putting in of Provisions into the Town.

The Duke *de Veraguas* is on his journey hither from *Madrid*, who is to command and take the charge of the Armada, the Admiral and several other Officers of the Fleet expecting his arrival.

Elfenour, June 5. This week arrived 38 sail of Merchants, and a Galliot from *Holland*, and about 27 gone out from hence. The ships sent to *Stockholm* upon the French account, are said to be ready laden with their Naval Provisions, and are expected here with the first fair wind.

Another ship laden upon the same account at *Lubeck*, with Hemp and Platsks past the *Soundt*, the first Currant, and is sailed for greater security about Northwards; from which road there arrived several here lately from *St. Malo's* and *Rockelle*.

The Court is at present at *Fredericksberg*, where it has continued about twelve days. The people here begin to have a great distrust of the *Hollanders* assistance, especially since they make no greater hast with the ships designed for their assistance, or the Guns so long promised them.

Venice, June 4. The last Letters from the *Levant* tell us, that the Sultan who is still at *Adrianople*, has sent more forces against the *Cham* of *Tartary*, who is very valiant in the field, his Army much in heart, encouraged by some successes they have already had against the *Turks*.

'Tis likewise said, that ten Turkish vessels that escaped the *Venicians* out of the last encounter, put on shore some Janissaries and other Soldiers, about 1000 men, between *Sittia* and *Girapetra*, about 100 miles distant from *Canea*; and in their return towards *Rhodes*, were all of them taken by a Squadron of Christian Corsyres.

This Republick has declared *Procuradore Valiero*, son to the late Duke, their Extraordinary Ambassador to complement the Emperors at *Milan*, and to attend her through the *Venetian* Territories as far as *Trent*; who intends to appear in great State, with at least 300 persons in his Train.

In pursuance of our ancient pretences of Sovereignty in the *Adriatick Sea*, some of our Vessels have lately seized on a Vessel laden with a great quantity of Coin, belonging to the *Popes* Chamber, which we hear is very much resented in the Court of *Rome*.

Madrid, June 3. The Emperors continues still at *Gandia* near *Denia*; the Gallies not being yet ready to transport her, *Don John* of *Austria* though vigorously solliciting his entrance into the Council according to his place, having had several Conferences, and private Audiences from the Queen, and discourses with the Ministers of State, about several weighty affairs, was in the end desired to withdraw himself againe into the *Castilla*, his former place of retirement, about thirty Leagues from *Madrid*.

This day came to Town *Don Pascual de Arragon*, Archbishop of *Toledo*, who as soon as he is settled, is to take his place in the Junto of the Government.

Hamburgh, June 4. 'Tis said here by Letters from

Warsaw.

Warsaw, that the King is drawing all his Forces together about Cassimir upon the Vistula, and that 10000 men under the Command of General Pios, attend only the Kings orders, being ready to march and pass the new bridge, made for that purpose over the River: His said likewise with much confidence, that one of the best Regiments of the Confederates, has joined thir party, and submitted to the King, who by his kind reception of them, his thought, will invite several others to follow their example.

Bitto, June 9. The Lunenburg Army on the 20 of the last month began their march, having Rendezvoused in a large Heath, where they drew up in Battalia: being 9 Regiments of Horse, 6 Troops of 63 to a Troop in each Regiment; 8 Regiments of Foot, each Regiment consisting of 10 Companies, of 100 men a piece, in all about 12000 men: There being present at the Rendezvous the Prince of Brunswick, Duke of Lunenburg, the Prince D'Osnauburg, the Count de Waller, the Dutch Envoy, the Baron L'uffel General of the Artillery, and other great Personages; after the review, the Duke gave a Treat to the Princes and Lords, drinking the Emperors Health, which was celebrated with Drums and Trumpets, with the Thunder of the Cannon, and Volleys of shot. The 1. and 2. instants, the Cavalry belonging to the Elector of Brandenburg, under the Command of General Staff, took up their quarters in the Villages about Brunswick, the City furnishing them with necessaries; from thence they marched to Maglenburg, seizing on all the Boats upon the River near it; and are since (as my last told you, received) into the City, who (as is pretended) owe him homage, he himself in person being in few days expected to receive it.

Hague, June 18. The Dutch Admiral Adelaar seems willing to entertain the States motion, that the 8 ships designed for Denmark, may upon this Emergency be employed in their service, for the more speedy putting to Sea, offering his own assistance, but requires first the approbation of his Masters Ministers here; but by Amersongens Letter of the 16 from Amsterdam, they meet with some difficulties, the ships being already laden, and ballasted with Sea-Coales, which will require time to unlade, and furnish with necessaries, for which they require an extraordinary sum of money; upon which the States resolve to leave the whole management of this affair to the Heere Willem, and Van Amersongen, with the Admiralty of Amsterdam; and for the charge of sending them out, those of Holland are to interpose their credits; the Deputies and Admiralty of Amsterdam, North-Holland, and Friesland are likewise ordered to use all their endeavors, that all ships that are or shall come into the Texel, which may be fitted for service, shall be made ready, and furnished with all things necessary, and sent to the Fleet in the Westings, the men to be taken out of the disabled ships, to furnish those that are able; and that they make ready 12 Fire-ships at the least, and command all Officers immediately to repair aboard their ships.

Paris, June 19. On the fifteenth instant, the King with the Queen, the Dauphine, Madam, and many Ladies of the Court, went out to the review of some Bregades, at a Rendezvous near the City, composed of his several Guards, and Men at Arms, who were drawn up and exercised before them.

The Sieur Lanchau sent formerly to Lions to levy Taxes from the Chamber of Justice, was set upon in his Coach with his Lady, by seven persons in disguises: He and his Lady both hurt, but is conceived neither of them mortally. Upon which, the King had designed some forces to be sent thither to assist the Levies: but the Magistrates, to deprecate the Kings displeasure, have sent their Deputies to the Court to justify themselves, and assure his Majesty, that the City had no hand in the Action.

Order is given for the fortifying of Rochelle, upon the an-

cient Foundations; the Town and its Dependencies being to raise 30000 Livres towards the Work.

The Fortifications of Bourdeaux go on vigorously, 2000. men every day working at them; but the Town is not a little jealous of the Thing, seeming to command them, as well as secure the Port.

The Garrison and Townsmen of Amiens have been lately in so high a Dispute, that falling to blows, several persons have been killed on both sides.

Bitto, June 26. The King has commanded Tents to be made for the Lodging of 15000. men, which are to be pitched upon the Plains of Meret, the Tenth of this Month, and the Army to be divided into two Bodies, which are to be drawn up in Battalia, and to counterfeit an Engagement, changing one another with Powder only, without Bullets; for the diversifements of the Ladies of the Court.

Madrid, June 9. The sixth instant, the Earl of Sandwich, Lord Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, had private Audience from the Queen, and is preparing for his Publick, which is expected in few days.

The Andalusian Post, newly arrived, brings us news, that the Portuguese have lately besieged and taken Ayamore; but of this we expect a further confirmation.

Downs, June 16. Yesterday came in the Norwich, with a prize laden with Wine, which is sent into the River towards London.

Edenburgh, June 14. There were Yesterday brought into Leith two Ships laden with Wine, and another with Bay Sails; All three taken by Capt. Alexander.

Harwich, June 19. Of the Ships sent hither to be repaired, four sailed from hence, some days since, and four or five are now ready, and got into the Rowling-grounds. The Lilly coming in hither last night, informs us, that in his Cruising he met with a Vessel of Newport, which told him, that the Funerals of Everston had been very Publickly and Solemnly performed in Zealand. That there was very great Complaints and Lamentations of Widows, and Wives of wounded Persons about the streets of Amsterdam, and other Towns of Holland: That the great Distraction of the People amongst themselves is now, of the loss of Men, but especially of Ships, which they reckon to be 300000 at last insisted that they are not upon the pursuit of the English, as they were for some time made to believe.

Plymouth, June 17. The French Man of War of 28 Guns, formerly taken by the Resolution and Oxford, is now fitted for His Majesties Service, and ready to sail with the first Wind; she is now the excellent Fregat, and carries now 36 Guns, and sails extremely well.

Waterford, June 9. The French Vessel come into this Fort a Vessel from the Barbadoes being one of the Fleet arrived here, the Master and Company, though differing in their accounts of some Particulars, affirm in the generall, that on the 23 of April last, the Lord Willoughby, Governor of the Caribbee-Islands, commanded 23. Voy of Merchants, whereof this Vessel was one, to take aboard them 700. Soldiers, and to carry them to St. Christophers, for the Assistance of the English Colony, who had some apprehensions of the French design upon them; that they calling at Antego, according to their Order, the Inhabitants informed them, that the French 170 on the 16. of April, had put 500. Negroes into Armes, (to whom they promised freedom for this service) and altogether fell suddenly upon the English Colony, putting them cruelly to the Sword; the French Governor declaring, He would give Quarter to none of them during his Life; but he being killed, some few of the English remaining, were saved and sent over to Mevis: Upon which news, the Merchants according to their Order, left the Soldiers at Antego, and pursued their Voyage. A more perfect Account we must expect hereafter.
