Whitehall, November 29. Y Letters from Sr. Edward Spragge, dated the 23 Officer, in Tunis Bay, we have the confirmation of the late Revolutions at Argiers; with this farther advice, that the 23 September Sir Elward Spragge weigh-ed out of Argier Road, having had there very bad weather; in which the Newcastle Frigat was forced to Sea, after having loit an An-chor and two Cables. That the thirteenth of Offo-ber he arrived before Timis, and the next day fent his Majesties Present to the Dy, which was very kindly received by him; and returned to Sir Edward Spragge a Present of refresh nents, with great Protestations of a fincere and inviolable Friendship and Amity, which he would always maintain with his Majesty: That he was then, the day of the date of these Letters, setting sail for Argiers again.

The fame Letters farther tell us, that the Ar gier man of Warr, which was formerly faid to have been laid up at Suf., fayling lately from thence for Argiers, happen d to me thr " Spanish men of Warr, having in their company another Veffel laden with three thousand and oud barrells of powder, bound from Naples to Caliq. The Argering kept company with the all right, the next mor-ning finding the fail hip a grat way 'a flerne of the men of Wair, c app d her on boord, and af-ter forme refiftance, n at themfelves Mafters of her and cartied her to Ar crs; which Prize, was the welcomer to thos Ce tairs, by reason of the great want they had of power id, all other kind of

Copenhagen, November 21. Mr Bartue Envoy Extraordinary from his Ma (by of Great Brittain, having fully concluded hi N otiation here, may fuddenly returne from henc. This evening we expect here Monfieur Courtin from France, on his way to Swelcn.

Erom Holland they write, that the States General having thought fit to fend the Heer Van Haren directly to the Crown of Smeden, they were about nominating another to come in the fame quality hi-ther; and that it was thought the Haer Van Worekendam might be the perfon.

Warfaw, Novemb. 13. From the Ukraine they write, that the advice they had received of the Ar-my of Lithuania, which was already well advanced on their march towards those parts, being upon fome discontent amongst the Officers returned back, had much discouraged our Forces there, which are very much leffened by the Garrilons they are forced to put into the several places they have lately takenfrom the Rebel Collacks, and stand in much

need of a recruit; however, not to loofe the great advantages they have at prefent, they continue their progrefs, for the farther fubduing those Countries, and hitherto with good fuccess; the same Letters farther tell us, that Kalnicke was Surrendered, but with no great certainty; fo that we must expect a farther confirmation.

Against the 6 of Fanuary next, is appointed a Dyetto be held, here, the Letters to the feveral Palatinates, being already dispatched to that purpose: it is said, that their Majesties intentions are to go first to Samolab to visit the Kings Mother, and from thence to rerurn with their Court hither.

Hamburgh, Novemb. 24. The Prohibition of Brandy Wines in Holland, hath made Copper rife here, from 60 to 100 Rixdollars, vast numbers of Kettles having been made, as wel here as at other places, for the burning of Corn Brandy, to be fent into Holland and the other Provinces. Here are at prefent the Palzgraef of Sultzbach, and the Velt Marshal Wurtz; as likewife the Count de Conningf-mark, to look after the Leavies he is making in these parts for the Crown of France.

It is faid, the Dukes of Lunenburgh arme again. From Poland we hear of the great succels of that Crown in the Mkraine, but that they begin to be very much pinched for want of Supplies, and especial-ly fince the advice of the Army of Lithuania being gone home again, fo that it is thought, they will hatdly he able to finish the total subduing of those Countreys this winter.

Cologne, Novemb. 27: The Deputies of the Circle of Westplass continue very active and diligent in their instances, as well to our Elector as Magistrates, concerning their late Project; in the mean time the Bishop of Strasburgh seems relolved to adhere to the Proposals he lately made and delivered to the Bishop of Munster, in which, our Magistrates scem to meet with much difficulty; first concerning their being obliged thereby to renounce all Forreign succors : and to cause Collonel Bampfields. Regiment to retire from hence ; when at the fame time our Elector would continue tos erect Magazines, and make other preparations, to the great prejudice of their security; secondly; to submit our difference to an Arbitrage and to allow two or. three years for the determining them; however; to morrow our Magistrates are to return their anfwer to the feveral Projects that have been of late framed.

The Bishop of Munster is still at Kendernicke and may, as is faid, continue there, till Monfieur Verjus return out of France, whither he is fome days fince gone, as is faid, to inform that Court with the present state of affairs of these parts. Here is arrived the Prince of Naffam Governor of Limburgh, who hath fince had feveral conferences with the Marquis de Grana and the Popes Nuncio here, by whom he hath been very nobly entertained. We dayly here of more Forces being come into these parts, the general report being, that our Elector hath at prefent in his Service about 12000 Men, which he is bringing together.

Hague, Decemb. 1. Befides the Regiments of Cot-
