To morrow or next day the Heer d'Amerongen goes hence for Cologne, from whence he is to pais to the Elector of Brandenburghs Court at Berlin. The Spanish Envoy Don Emanuel de Lyra, and the Imperial Minister the Baron d'Issola have frequent conferences with the Deputies of the States General.

London, Novemb. 29.
