Turin, September 13, N. S.

A Few Days ago Baron Leitrum a German Nobleman, who attended the Princess of Piedmont to Savoy, arrived at Rivoli with Compliments from her Royal Highness to the Queen, and afterwards took Post for Chambery. The 3d Instant Mr. Moleworth the British Envoy returned hither from Savoy. The Court set out from Chambery on the 11th Instant, and come by very short Journeys to Rivoli, where it is proposed they will arrive on the 20th. The Provincial Regiment of Piedmont commanded by the Marquess de Carrail, is to march to Suza to receive the Princess of Piedmont there. The Marchioness d'Alinges, Daughter-in-law to the Marquess de Coudray, who was Governour to the Prince, has been declared one of the Princess's Ladies of Honour. Last Friday the Procession with the usual Ceremonies was performed here, (in Commemoration of the Raising the Siege of Turin,) but the Court being absent, there was nothing extraordinary upon that Occasion. Our Letters from Florence say the Drought is there so great, that all the Wells and Springs are dried up; so that they are in great Distress for Want of Rain.

For Relief of all Masters and Mistresses who have omitted to pay His Majesty's Duties of SIX PENCE IN THE POUND for every Sum of Fifty Pounds or under, and of TWELVE PENCE IN THE POUND for every Sum amounting to more than Fifty Pounds Given, Paid, Contracted or Agreed for with Clerks and Apprentices, within the respective Times limited by the several Acts of Parliament in that Case made; Or who have omitted to insert and write in Words at length in the Indentures, or other Writings, containing the Covenants and Agreements relating to the Service of such Clerks or Apprentices the full Sum or Sums of Money received, or in any wise directly or indirectly Given, Paid, Agreed or Contracted for; All such Masters and Mistresses are Acquitted and Discharged of and from all Penalties incurred by such Omissions, upon Payment of the said Duties on or before the Twenty Ninth Day of September, 1724. And for preventing the like Omissions for the future, the said Commissioners do hereby further give Notice, That the Times limited by the Act of Parliament, which grants the said Duties for the Payment thereof, are ONE MONTH after the Dates of such Indentures or Contracts as are executed within the Limits of the Bills of Mortality, and TWO MONTHS after the Dates of such Indentures or Contracts as are executed elsewhere throughout the Kingdom of Great Britain; and that on Neglect of Payment within the respective Times before-mentioned, Every Master or Mistress so neglecting, incurs a Penalty of Fifty Pounds with Costs of Suit, and the Clerk or Apprentice is made incapable of exercising the intended Trade or Employment, or of being made free of any City, Corporation, or Company. And the Indentures and Contracts are also void, and of no Effect. And in Case the full Sum or Sums of Money be not inserted, or written in Words at length in such Indentures or Contracts as aforesaid, the Master or Mistress thereby forfeits double the Sum which he or she really receives or agrees for. And all Persons neglecting or refusing to comply with the Terms of the said Acts of Parliament for the future, will be prosecuted for such Neglect or Refusal.
