*Stockholm, August 26, O. S.*

**T**HE King of Sweden returned to this Place last Saturday Night, having, during his Progress in the Country, not only been at Upsal, but also at the Palaces of Kongsholm, Stromsholm and Ekolfund. His Majesty met every where this time with a good deal of Diversion, having killed three Bears, three Eiks, some Wolves, and other Game. One of the Bears was so furious, when he found himself in the Toils, that he attacked one of the chief Huntsmen who was on Horseback, and wounded the Horse very much; and if the Dogs had not timely come in to rescue the Huntsman, he had been torn to Pieces: Nevertheless before the Bear could be killed, he assaulted several Peasants, and wounded three very dangerously. The King himself had also at the same Time a narrow Escape; for the Horse he rode on being frightened in the Hurry ran away with him in the Woods and threw him, and afterwards at a little Distance ran down a Precipice and was spoil'd: The King had no Hurt. There is at present no more Talk of the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel's Journey hither. Some few Senators being lately returned from the Country, the Senate begins now again to meet very regularly, and Yesterday the King was there present for near three Hours. Lieutenant General Ranck arrived here last Friday: It is said he has some Overtures to make from the Court of Prussia.

*Stockholm, Sept. 2.* The Weather being become more agreeable and warmer than it was

any time the last Month, the King and Queen of Sweden have therefore resolved to pass a Fortnight or three Weeks at the Palace of Ulricksdabl, whither their Majesties went this Day.

*Copenhagen, Sept. 16, N. S.* The King of Denmark has appointed a Commission, consisting of M. Wibe, M. Gabel, and some Members of the Chamber of Finances, to examine a Proposal made to his Majesty by the Bishop of Christiania for laying a new Tax on Lands in Norway. The Marquess de Monteleon's Son is expected here as Minister from the King of Spain. The Court continues at Fridensbourg.

*Berlin, Sept. 16, N. S.* The King, Queen, and Princess Royal, continue at Wusterhausen. The Margrave Lodowyck, who has been a long time ill of a Complication of Distempers, is at present something better, however there is little Hope of his Recovery. Major General Schwerin, who was formerly the King of Prussia's Minister in Poland, is appointed to go thither again.

*Ratisbon, Sept. 11, N. S.* The Election of a Bishop of Wurtzbourg is fixt to the 2d of next Month. The Vice-Chancellor of the Empire Count Schonborn makes great Interest for it. The Elector of Mentz, and all the chief Persons of the Family of Schonborn, are at Wurtzbourg to support his Pretensions.

*Ratisbon, Sept. 18 N.S.* We have Advice, that the Election of a Bishop of Wurtzbourg is likely to go in favour of M. de Hutten Dean of that Church, who has the Character of a learned, and with Relation to the Protestants a moderate

**rata Man.** The same Advices tell us, that Count Schonbõth, the other Candidate for that Election, being come as far Nuremberg on his Way to Wurtzbourg, and there receiving Intelligence of the general Disposition of the Canons to chuse M. de Hutten, seemed determined to proceed no further but to return to Vienna.

**Hague, Sept. 26, N. S.** The States of the Province of Holland separated on Saturday last. During their Session, a Committee to whom they had finally referred the Project for an Augmentation of the Forces of this State, having unanimously declared for it, it was agreed by the Assembly that the several Members should go and make Report of their Deliberations on this Affair to their respective Towns; and they are expected back here next Week with their Consent to the said Project. The Directors of the East India Company, who had attended here for some Days past, on Occasion of a Proposition made to them by the States General to advance a certain Sum of Money for the publick Service, with which they complied, are returned Home, after having made very pressing Instances to their High Mightinesses to protect their Commerce.
