**H**IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Sanderfon, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land-Tax, to be raised in Great-Britain, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty Five.

And to four private Bills.

Vienna, Dec. 9, N. S. Charles Harrison, Esq; Minister from the King of Great Britain, had his first Audience of the Emperour the 7th Instant Francis Colman, Esq; who is appointed His Britannick Majesty's Resident at the Court of the Great Duke of Tuscany, will set out from hence in a few Days for Florence Prince Eugene of Savoy having resigned the Government of the Austrian Netherlands, his Imperial Majesty has made him Vicar-General of all his Dominions in Italy. It is talked, that the Archdutchess Elizabeth, the Emperour's Eldest Sister, will be made Governess of the Austrian Netherlands: And that Field-Marshal Count Thaur, will go thither about the Middle of February, to take on him the Administration of those Provinces; which Administration is continued in the Hands of the Marquess de Prié, till that Count's Arrival. The Marquess de Westerlo was sent from hence a few Days ago, Prisoner under a Guard to the Castle of Neifst. We have Advice that General Bonnevall passed through Ratisbon about four Days ago, this Way: His Cause will be soon tried before a Council of War, of which the Marshal Thaur will be President, and the other Members are to be the two Generals Veterani and Hamilton, two Lieutenant Generals Locatelli and Jorger, and two Major Generals Dupillier and Neiberg. Letters from Constantinople of the 29th of October give an Account, that a few Days before an Officer arrived there with the News of the Surrender of Erivan, and carried the Keys of that Place through the City in great Pomp, upon which Illuminations, Firing of Guns, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy were continued for several Days. A Courier was also arrived from Muscovy, with Advice, that Major-General Romanstorf was coming to Constantinople with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary; upon which an Aga with some other Turkish Officers was sent to meet him on the Road and conduct him thither. M. Romanstorf was to bring with him the Czar's Ratification of the Treaty, and was designed to go Commissary to the Frontiers for marking out the Limits settled by it. The Turkish Army that took Erivan marched afterwards towards Tauris, which was not thought to be in a Condition to make any long Defence: So that the Port will probably soon be in Possession of all the Persian Territory that is to be given up to them by Virtue of their Treaty with the Czar. These Advices add, that the Port had deposed the Tartar-Han, and put a fourth Brother of his in his Place. M. d'Andrezel the French Minister at the Port, had had his Audience of the Grand Signior in the usual Form, and M. de Bonac had obtained likewise of the Grand Signior an Audience of Leave.

At 10 o'clock N. S. William Finch, Esq; his Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the rates General, arrived here the 16th Instant. Yesterday he

made a Visit to the Pensionary of Holland, and was this Morning with the President for the Week of the Assembly of the States General, to whom he delivered his Credentials. He will proceed for England in a few Days, and is expected to return after a short Stay there.
